

As forecast by Brad Scott at the last Coordinating Conference in February, the SRE & Primary School age Youth Training program has now been held in several places in NSW. The course started in Sydney and was then run in Newcastle, ACT, Ballina, Lithgow and again in Sydney. The training has been fun and well received. It was a great opportunity for children's workers to further develop skills that help them communicate the great story of Christ to the children they work with.

The course is appropriate for SRE teachers, Sunday School teachers and Youth Group leaders. It will be held again in Orange (27th June) and perhaps, if the demand is out there, it will be taken on the road again later this year?

It is always sad to hear of an Assembly or church having to close down but that's what has been necessary at Cooma Community Christian Church.

The situation arose because of a lack of numbers in fellowship in the assembly. Over a considerable period the church has functioned with some related numbers-challenges. This is not an uncommon situation affecting other small assemblies. In the case of Cooma it became clear in February there were insufficient personnel to handle even the day to day administration (finance, correspondence, activities and decision making for insurance, Department of Fair Trading, and Oversight), apart from the Bible ministry to the church. Those who remained discerned it was the Lord's will for the work to close and for all the assets (including the chapel and grounds) to be sold and distributed through the Stewards Foundation the present trustees for the property. Please pray for the brothers who have to do all this.

Memories of Ray Dupen (22/4/1935 to 9/3/2014)

Compiled from material graciously provided by several family members and friends via Philip Weldon, who officiated at the graveside and chaired the Memorial Service afterwards.

Ray Dupen, a well-known dear brother in the Lord, was taken into heaven on Sunday, 9th March 2014, whilst in Lady Davidson Hospital, North Turramurra. He had faced severe health problems for over a year before this, and was facing the prospect of yet more chemotherapy. Nevertheless he was in good spirits, at peace, trusting his Saviour Jesus Christ, and with his dear wife Emily at his side, plus close family and friends right until his passing.

On Thursday, 13th March, a moving grave-side service was held at the Castlebrook Lawn Cemetery, Rouse Hill, followed in the afternoon by a very well attended Memorial service at West Pennant Hills Community Church, his 'home church'.

In prior months, Ray had discussed funeral arrangements with family members, chosen some of his favourite hymns, and asked Philip Weldon, a dear friend, to take both services.

Many family members spoke at the Memorial Service – including Ray's brothers Arthur and Hilton, his sons Stephen and David, and most of his grandchildren. Close friends Tony Folland, Ted Davis and Col Millar also took part, and Mr Bill McCrindle gave the Bible message. What follows here is an amalgam of many of their thoughts and reflections in memory of Ray Dupen, and perhaps these will remind many readers of their own experiences with this hardworking, kind, thoughtful man of God.

The younger son David gave the first

and most extensive eulogy. He gave credit to his father for having documented much of his family history in the last year or so, thus making David's task easier. It was found on Ray's laptop with the title "A Privileged Life".

David said:- "Dad was born on the 22nd April 1935 to Arthur and Eileen Dupen, the youngest of four sons, Arthur, Hilton, and Douglas. Gran and Pa were hardworking God-fearing people, having moved in 1933 from Hurstville to a new home at 3 First Avenue, Epping, which enabled Pa to work at Hazlewoods Nursery.

"Gran and Pa subsequently purchased the adjacent land at 1 First Avenue, where Pa began a small nursery to subsidize the family income. This meant a lot of after-hours and Saturday work for the family but, apart for watering, no work was done on Sundays as they were taught to rest on The Lord's Day.

"This extra land was eventually to be Mum and Dad's new home where Stephen and I were first brought up.

The family attended Eastwood Gospel Hall walking the 3 or 4 km each way, completing the journey three times each Sunday.

Dad's schooling commenced in 1940 at West Epping Primary School, and then to North Newtown Intermediate High School. So at the age of 12, Dad would walk to Epping station, catch the train to Strathfield, change trains and alight at McDonaldtown station and walk to school. Intermittently, to >> 8

help with the family income, Dad was also required to take fresh flowers, particularly gardenias, from home to florist shops on Wynyard ramp and Martin Place on his way to school. He also worked as a delivery boy around the eastern suburbs for the florist shop in the school holidays.

"At fifteen Dad was apprenticed in the trade of Carpentry and Joinery with the firm of J.W. Dunn Pty Ltd and worked mainly on the upper North Shore on custom designed homes. He also attended Meadowbank TAFE for a half-day and two nights per week and continued to do an Advanced Carpentry course, followed by the Building Foreman and Clerk of Works Course at Ultimo college, often getting home after 11pm via public transport.

"In his 4th year as an apprentice he was made responsible for a Joinery Shop at Pennant Hills, where the Holden Dealership is now. Later Dad was promoted to Building Supervisor, and given responsibility of managing up to 5 or 6 contracts at a time. These included Woolworths and Coles Stores, several Commonwealth Banks, a mansion in Amaroo Avenue Wahroonga and major renovations on two floors of 321 Pitt Street in the city.

"How did Mum & Dad meet? Along with his family Dad attended Eastwood Gospel Hall where he dedicated his life to Christ at an early age.

"In his late teenage years, Dad met Mum as they attended common church activities in FSY and Camps etc. Mum attended Burwood Gospel Hall, and taught Sunday School at a little rundown public hall in Camperdown.

"They married at the Eastwood Gospel Hall on the 19th April 1958 and moved into their first family home which Ray's Mum and Dad had personally built at First Avenue Epping, with the help of his brother & good friends. They continued to worship at Eastwood Gospel Hall and were fully involved with the church, Sunday school teaching, boys club, youth work and often Dad had preaching responsibilities. He loved to share his knowledge of the scriptures.

"It was during this time both Stephen and I entered their lives, and like Dad, started our schooling at West Epping Public School.

"In 1969, to the shock and sadness of Gran and Pa, Mum and Dad moved the family 'way out into the bush' to 10 Graylind Avenue, West Pennant Hills.

"Along with this move, and being such a long way to travel back to Eastwood, we joined West Pennant Hills Gospel Chapel, and later Dad became an elder there.

"From 1960 to 1972, Dad moved to work for FL & FG Sattler Pty Ltd. During this period, he worked with Fred Sattler, mainly on commercial buildings which included:

- Houses at mental institutions and hospitals around Sydney.
- A hostel for the aged in Marion Street, for The Leichhardt Methodist Mission.
- The first Lifeline Centre in Flinders Street, Darlinghurst for the Central Methodist Mission [which I recall visiting with Dad].

• Churches at Panania, Oatley, an extension to Bankstown Gospel Hall, and Emmaus Bible College.

"In 1972, Mum and Dad formed the company RAYEM Constructions Pty Ltd and began to build mainly for the light-commercial field. Projects included – St Paul's Anglican Church, Carlingford; Yurana House, Cherrybrook; Telopia Church of Christ, Eastwood Police Station (where Stephen and I were the first to be locked up) and Stonequarry Lodge, at Picton, which won the AKROD Award in association with the architect Mr Keith Sawdy.

"RAYEM's office was in our home at Graylind Avenue, and our garage and back yard stored materials. Mum worked in the office during the day and at times Dad would come home late from the job. But, mostly it was dinner at 6 around the kitchen table, followed by a short Bible reading. Stephen and I actually tried to get seating positions at the table to enable us to watch the TV with the sound turned down .. not sure if Dad knew that – Mum does now !!.

"In 1980, after Dad had been a director of Lutanda Children's Home for many years, Mum and Dad decided to offer their services to become House parents at the children's home.

"Our first period was in the boys end of the old main building, and while we were there Pennant Hills Christian School, was commenced at the other end of the building.

"Mum and Dad soon realised that it would be impossible to be in private business and provide the necessary home life to the children. They therefore closed down RAYEM Constructions and Dad applied for and was accepted as a teacher at Hornsby College of TAFE.

"Soon after, they moved into a Lutanda family group home in Dean Street, WPH. After nurturing the children's development into young responsible adults, they relocated back to Graylind Avenue with Michael, whom they considered was too young to be relocated with new house-parents so he moved in with Mum and Dad. At that time, Dad achieved a degree in Bachelor of Education.

"During his TAFE years, Dad chaired a task force of representatives, from a number of Government departments in conjunction with the Aboriginal Land Councils, to train young Aboriginal people to build houses. These houses were built in about 19 centres across the State as far South as Dareton on the Murray River, West as far as Bourke and Broken Hill, and to Moree and Collerenibri in the North West.

"Later, Dad was appointed as Head Teacher of Building at Granville College ≥10

of TAFE. In 1992 he was appointed to the position of "Head of Studies, Property and Transport". This appointment was equivalent to Deputy Principal and it was from this position he retired in 1997.

"But, Dad never actually retired from work. His real work and passion was in his family and church life.

"Throughout his life Dad was fully involved in church activities. He organized and provided spiritual leadership in:—

Boys Rally and Sunday School; WPH Youth Group, including weekly Friday night–Fun nights, Bible study nights at "the Dupen's", Bundanoon Camp – under the stars and riding push bikes, and Salt Ash Camps – sand-dune bikes and water skiing.

"Also he was involved in Church Family Camps at Toukley and Budgewoi, plus CYC Boys Camps at Eltham Park & Seniors Camps or Festival Camps.

"Regarding Lutanda, at various times he was a House-Parent, Board Member and Board Chairman.

"He was on the Building Committee for the 1979 Billy Graham crusade at Randwick race course, and the Leighton Ford crusade at St Ives Show Grounds.

"He officiated at weddings and funerals and was involved with the Sydney Festival Male Voice Choir.

"Dear to his heart was the work of Lutanda Children's Homes and also the aged care facilities of CBCS. From its beginnings Dad was fully involved with Elouera Gardens, which we just called "the village". Dad became a Board member of CBCS in 1980—serving thus until, with tears in his eyes, and on his hospital bed on 29th January 2014, Dad formally resigned from that Board.

Although he had resigned he still wanted to be involved in the building work, and as late as last week the plans for the new development at Cherrybrook were alongside his hospital bed after he reviewed them.

"So, who was Raymond Lindley Dupen, Dad, Ray, Grandad, Uncle Ray, and as mum occasionally called him "Raymond"? He was a Provider, a Father and a devoted husband, a family man, a leader, and a counsellor, but most notably a man of practical faith who obeyed his Lord and served His people."

Hilton spoke of his affinity with Ray as a practical man. Ray helped Hilton, and his wife Ruth, build their first home at Epping, where the Channel 7 studios are now located. In turn Hilton and others helped build Ray & Emily's home in Graylind Avenue. Ray & Hilton worked together on several projects, including Camp Toukley from its very beginnings.

"He was a great brother" Hilton affirmed, "and a great Bible student. He would urge everyone to not dismiss the Bible as rubbish." Hilton mentioned another hymn Ray loved was 'Face to face with Christ my Saviour' and now Ray IS actually in that situation!!

Ray's eldest son Stephen mentioned that PEOPLE were important to his father. He was always helping people and caring for people. Stephen read portions of letters he had recently received from people who knew Ray >26

The **RIGHTEOUS JUDGE** instructs all to be seated and declares His Court to now be in session. He then addresses **THE ACCUSED** -

'It is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment' (**Hebrews 9:27**)

This is why you now stand in the dock. You are charged with having committed great and terrible acts of high treason against the Most High God.

Without any delay, **SATAN** stands and addresses the Court. He states that the record will show you have broken every one of the Ten Commandments.

On countless occasions you have lied, you have stolen, you have used God's Name in vain, you have hated your brother and thereby committed murder (1 John 3:15) and you have not put God first before anything else in your life - and these are only a few of your sins.

Satan will prove your guilt on all accounts. There is indisputable video evidence, as well as reliable witnesses, to attest to the facts in this case.

Even your thought-life stands as testimony against you. The Scripture says, 'And no creature is hidden from His sight, but all are naked and exposed to the eyes of Him to whom we must give account' (**Hebrews 4:13**)

'After the prosecution's case is >14

made against you there is a hush in the Courtroom. The Prosecuting Lawyer has shown that you have indeed committed acts of high treason against God. It seems inevitable that you will be found guilty.

SATAN then addresses the **RIGHTEOUS JUDGE** and says, 'A good God must be a Just Judge. The facts are clear. You must find this man guilty. Your own record states, 'He who justifies the wicked and he who condemns the righteous are both alike an abomination to the LORD.' (**Proverbs 17:15**)

For you to acquit this man would mean that You are not righteous Yourself. You must find this man guilty as charged. I rest my case.'

The **RIGHTEOUS JUDGE** then calls upon your **DEFENSE LAWYER** to address the Court.

THE LORD JESUS CHRIST begins His defence:

'Righteous Father, the case made by the Prosecution is indeed true. I will not dispute the charges made. However, I will submit to this Court two pieces of evidence in the defence of my client:

Exhibit A: THE PASSIVE OBEDIENCE OF CHRIST

Let the record show that on Calvary's cross, the sins of this one were transferred to Me and I bore the full punishment demanded by Your high and holy Justice. I was wounded for his transgressions, bruised for his iniquities, the chas-

tisement that brought him peace was upon Me and by My stripes he was healed. cf. (Isaiah 53:4-6)

Exhibit B: THE ACTIVE OBE-DIENCE OF CHRIST

Let the record also show that I, the second Person of the Trinity, became a man, was born of a virgin, and lived a perfectly righteous life on earth, always pleasing You, righteous Father. I lived the life You demanded in Your High and Holy Law.

Just as this man's sins were transferred to Me on the cross and I suffered the penalty due to him (in his place), so also My righteous life was transferred to his account.

'For his sake You (God) made Me (Jesus Christ) to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Me he might become the righteousness of God.' 2 Corinthians 5:21

Righteous Father, your records will show that this man's sins have been paid in full and in fact the only record concerning this man now is that He lived My life – for My life was imputed to His account, legally and at Your good pleasure. For it was decreed this should happen in the Eternal Council of the Divine Trinity, before the foundation of the world.

GOD THE RIGHTEOUS JUDGE:

'Having checked the eternal records and the validity of exhibits A and B, the case made by the Defence is both true and satisfactory to this Court. I therefore dismiss all charges made against this man.'



Would THE ACCUSED please stand:

'Because My Son has borne your punishment in full and has imputed His righteous life to your account, I declare you **NOT GUILTY**.

More than that, I declare you to be counted as **RIGHTEOUS**, to possess the perfect righteousness of My Son.

I do this because My righteous anger and the punishment you deserved for breaking My Holy Laws were taken by My Son. He has paid for your sins in full. My justice has been satisfied.

You are **JUSTIFIED** in my sight. Forever I am at peace with you. Your sins I will remember no more. By grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone, you are justified.'

The Court is dismissed.

Romans 5:1 - 'Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.'

If salvation depends on the believer's deeds, our salvation is only as secure as our faithfulness.

Justification is a legal word (from the Court Room) and for the believer in Christ it is a past and completed event – through the person and work of the Lord Jesus Christ ALONE!

This peace with God is not a temporary ceasefire in hostilities but is the eternal, immutable and irrevocable standing of the believer with his God.

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life." (**John 3:16**)

While this entire Court Room scenario is the certain expectation for those who repent and trust in Christ, it must be said that **rejecting God's free gift of salvation** will result in something entirely different, horribly different in fact; one that provides no Defense Lawyer in the court whatsoever, but instead, the full bearing of the punishment of your crimes against God in Hell forever.

John 3:36 says, "Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life; whoever does not obey the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God remains on him."

Dear reader, you are a precious soul, made in the image of God. O may you make haste in coming to Christ! The Scripture says, "Now is the Day of Salvation." (2 Corinthians 6:2)

Tomorrow is never promised to anyone. The risen Lord Jesus Christ summons you, even now, to repent of your sins and to trust fully and only in Him. Come to Him then, turning away from all you know to be wrong and trusting only in the finished work of the perfect Saviour.

Mother's Day and the Christian connection

Mother's Day Second Sunday in May

Celebration of Mothers over the centuries has appeared in varying forms and traditions since, and possibly before, Roman times.

In the 1600s' the Church of England instigated Mothering Sunday in recognition of Mary the Mother of Jesus. Later this religious celebration was expanded to include honouring all mothers. As time passed, this celebration slowly disappeared from the church calendar.

The seed for Mother's Day that we celebrate today had its beginning in 1858 with Ann Marie Reeves Jarvis a Christian lady who was working to heal the nation after the Civil War. Her strategy was to promote and elevate the important role of mothers and help them to create healthier and more hygienic homes.

From this she instigated a 'Mothers Friendship Day' which eventually developed into a national movement called 'Mothers Friendship Clubs'. At these clubs Ann would teach the mothers basic nursing and safe sanitation practices to be used in the home, which she had learned from her brother who was a famous M.D.

This resulted in many lives being saved and by offering this service to both sides of those involved in the Civil War it was instrumental in facilitating the reconciliation process between Union and Confederate neighbours.

When Ann Marie Jarvis passed

away after a long illness, one of her two daughters, Anna, decided to dedicate her life to her mother's dream of a Mothers Day to honour all mothers around the world.


Anna missed her mother greatly and felt children often neglected to appreciate their mother enough while the mother was still alive.

As a Sunday school teacher for twenty years at her church, she was very aware of the Fifth of the Ten Commandments, "Honour your father and mother" and she no doubt would have taught this to her students.

She shared her desire to bring to fruition her mother's dream and it was readily accepted by her friends. The first such service was held at her church and she handed out her mother's favourite flower, the White Carnation. At first, people observed Mother's Day by attending church and writing letters to their mothers.

After much letter writing and lobbying the Governors of Oklahoma and West Virginia in 1910 proclaimed the Second Sunday in May to be celebrated as Mother's Day. The acceptance of this celebration throughout the USA was breath-taking. By 1911 there was not one State in the USA that did not have its own observance of Mother's Day.

On May 9th 1914, President Woodrow Wilson, proclaimed the Second Sunday in May as Mother's Day and >

a national holiday. It was not long before the Mother's Day celebration was embraced by other nations as far away as Australia, Japan, China, Africa, South America and some Asian countries.

Within ten years, the rapid commercialisation and exploitation of this sacred and joyous celebration for Mothers caused Anna much grief. She went on to spend her inheritance fighting against the abuse of this Christian based celebration and said that she 'wished she would never have started the day because it became so out of control...'

Despite Anna Jarvis's misgivings, Mother's Day has flourished all around the world. In the USA the Second Sunday in May has become the most popular day of the year to dine out, and the telephone lines record their highest traffic.

However, let us not forget the original intention as set out by God to celebrate and honour the mothers in our families, in our churches and in our society.

All of us involved closely with the NSW Assemblies Evangelistic Mission are sad at the passing of Mrs Cynthia Riseham (nee Goddard) on March 4th whilst a patient in Concord Hospital. But, at the same time, we rejoice in her now being with the Lord whom she sought to serve so well!

No doubt the customers and suppliers who regularly phoned or visited the Mission Office in Burwood Chapel will also be sad, and will miss her kind helpful ways. She was an unpaid volunteer with the Mission for over 36 years, and was the Book-keeper and Treasurer for the organisation for about three decades. For much of that time she was also the primary sales person in the Christian Outreach Book Service (COBS) supplying books, greetings cards, stationery items and Sunday school gifts for many individuals and assemblies in NSW, as well as at Ladies Meetings, Houseparties and Conferences.

From the start of 2013 Cynthia had to gradually reduce her hours at the Mission office, due to increasing illness, and difficulty with using public transport, but she still took calls at home to help provide the items people wanted, and she still attended Board meetings. It must be stressed how helpful Gracie Newlands (another faithful volunteer and friend from way back) has been working with Cynthia. Particularly in recent years Gracie did all the tasks that required a lot of walking, for example going to the Bank, Post Office, and shops in Burwood.

Cynthia's funeral was held on Mon-




Cynthia in the office at Burwood Chapel

day, 10th March, at 10.30am in the West Chapel of Woronora Crematorium, Sutherland. The chapel was packed with family, friends, and neighbours. Mr Robert Laycock, an elder at Panania Christian Church, conducted a lovely Thanksgiving Service.

Those present were reminded of many facts and events in Cynthia's life – by those who knew her well, including her brother David Goddard and her daughter Tracey. A summary of this information follows:-

As a child Cynthia grew up in the inner Sydney suburb of Earlwood and had attended the local Church of Christ Sunday School. It was here that Cynthia >22



heard the good news of God's saving grace and, without any family that shared her new-found faith, she was baptised as a believer. In 1957 Cynthia married Alan Riseham and they settled happily into their new home in the suburb of Peakhurst.

They had one child, a daughter Tracey, who joined the Girls Rally and Sunday School at Oatley Gospel Chapel. Cynthia enthusiastically encouraged Tracey to become involved – with the prayer that her much loved daughter would also hear that she was loved unconditionally by an all knowing, all powerful, God.

Cynthia was an enthusiastic person and as she visited the activities of the Chapel and the Sunday School she became Betty Hayden's friend (see the August 2007 issue of this magazine) and a committed supporter of all that was happening in Oatley Assembly, and for a long time she ran the Children's Club.

Also Cynthia quietly dedicated herself to serving the Lord in whatever way He led her, which included volunteering her time and talents to supporting the outreach at the NSWAEM Opportunity Shop which had opened in Mortdale in the Spring of 1976. It was run by Graham and Betty Hayden as a means of raising funds to support Home Workers in NSW Assemblies.

Cynthia served as a volunteer assistant in that shop from the start until it closed at the beginning of 1981. She was a multi-talented lady and gave herself tirelessly to the continued operation of the Shop, where she learned to appreciate the importance and the value of

marketing high quality Christian literature. Her colleagues found they could depend on her in many ways.

The central office of the NSWAEM (then in Newtown) was at that time a major centre for the distribution of Christian books, and Cynthia was warmly welcomed to join the many volunteers there who worked tirelessly in all areas of business management and administration with a shared commitment to assist and support the activities of the many full-time faith workers in New South Wales. She and Barbara Swan looked after all the bookshop operations.

Cynthia was of course involved when the office moved to St Peters, then to a portion of Kirrawee Chapel and finally to a room off the rear hall of Burwood Chapel. The team took carloads of stock for sale at special events at Elouera Gardens Retirement Village, Cherrybrook, and other places around the state, like Ladies House-parties – see next page.

God blessed Cynthia as she continually found Him to be her all powerful, all knowing Saviour, friend and Lord. This was certainly the case when her husband >>

Alan had kidney problems and had to have extensive dialysis treatment. In his latter years, they had a dialysis machine in their home and Cynthia handled all that with a smile – albeit perhaps with an aching heart too.

In later years she joined with the Assembly at Panania which was closer to their home. After Alan died in 2008, Cynthia decided to down-size and in January 2011 she moved to a small ground-floor unit in Riverwood, near to shops etc.

All the volunteers and Board of NSWAEM will miss Cynthia a great deal, as also will a good number of people around NSW with whom she kept in contact because they sold Greetings Cards etc to support Home Workers. We are VERY thankful for all the time and effort she gave to serving God through the Mission.

A letter from a prisoner to ECS

As reported in previous issues of this magazine, Emmaus Correspondence School (ECS) provides free Bible lessons for prisoners in NSW who request them, and a team of Christians marks the lessons and corresponds with each student to answer their questions and help them understand the Bible.

With permission from the writer and ECS, here is a letter from one of those prisoners, written in October last year. He was born in South America and English is his second language. The letter was originally in handwriting and all in capitals – making it relatively easy to read.

Hello brothers and sisters,

I want to give thanks to all of you for your good works in the Lord's Name. Thank you for comforting, loving and teaching us, thank you for giving us teachings of life, not just life but Eternal Life in our Saviour, but first of all thanks God for proving to you the light and the wisdom to put in a clear and simple way His love, care and guidance, through you and material you send to us in jail.

With sincere love, Thank you!

"If it weren't for our Lord, I don't know where I would be." He saved me from darkness and He is giving me freedom while I am in jail. It sounds illogical. I am just a human and my logic is not enough to try to understand God's unlimited wisdom. All I know is that whatever He is doing right now in my life, will have eternal results not

only for me but for many around the love of Jesus that is in me. This love is a love we can't see and is not physical, not touchable, but no bars, no walls, no prison can stop it from coming to many hearts going through affliction and sorrow, and I was one of them and I've been comforted and loved and I am willing to share this love with the ones around me because at the end LOVE is the only one thing that will endure forever!

(Don't know if it makes sense but it was written from my heart and my spirit).

I would like to send a special hug and blessing to my brother (one of the ECS team, but whose name is withheld for privacy reasons – Ed).

He changed my point of view in many ways and he taught me what Love in Action means. I felt the same Jesus coming to visit me, you can't imagine how loved and cared for I felt, in my situation without family (blood family). I understand in a deeper way what means 'family in Christ', the meaning of the Church, is not about a building, but is about a relationship with God and with anyone. It is about caring, sharing, comforting, loving with another - in their circumstances. I want to let him know that the crown that God has prepared for him is Huge and he will need help to carry it. So I want to be there to help you, so if I don't see you anymore on this earth, I will see you for sure in Heaven, my brother, Love You.

This verse is for you, with love, H. >26

Matthew 25:34b-36, & 40 "Come, you blessed of my Father; inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you took me in; I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me; I was in prison and you came to me." 'The King will answer and say to them, "Assuredly I

say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to Me."

Thank you Brother. I assure you that your visit is already written in my heart and also in my diary, so when the time comes your name will appear in the book of my walk with Christ. For now I guess is the path is still long and too many kms to go through, but we are not alone, Amen!

Thank you in Christ.

Stephen said "Total strangers have walked up to me in hospitals recently and, having only had minimal contact with Dad, they told me that they couldn't explain why but they had to tell me there was something special about my father."

Stephen mentioned that his father liked to paint (in oils mainly) in his spare time – especially Australian landscapes. (Some of his works were on display in the Chapel's corridor for us to view after the Service). Stephen concluded by saying "And of course Dad couldn't have followed his own dreams, ambitions and passions if it wasn't for his-life long soul mate – MUM; the love of his life, his solid rock. Mum and Dad were always a team. They were inseparable!"

Ray's nine grandchildren then combined to give delightful expressions of their love for him.

Ted Davis, a long-time friend and brother in Christ reminded us of Ray's

huge contribution to the three CBCS retirement villages. "Every building and facility had Ray's touch on it in some way." He too stressed how Ray loved and cared for people, showing generosity, goodness and godliness. Ted also mentioned the recent book that Ray worked on with Emily and Mary Arnold, and affirmed "Ray will be sorely missed."

Bill McCrindle knew and worked with Ray in the church for over 50 years. He spoke movingly from Psalms 23 and 78:70-72 and noted Ray was a man after God's own heart - like King David. He shepherded people and minded the flock. He had a gift from God.
