

Once again I am writing to say a big "thank you" for the recent gifts I have received through NSW AEM. They are much appreciated and a real blessing from God.

I received a very encouraging email this year from a young girl ("K") who was teaching SRE with me at one of the schools last year. Well, encouraging and sad, as we are losing her as a teacher. She said "sadly I won't be teaching scripture this year. I've recently accepted a job at Year 13 so will be working there full time. Just wanted to take a moment to say what a privilege it has been to teach alongside you - especially because you led me to Christ when you taught me in Primary School." It's these glimpses from ex-scripture children that make teaching worthwhile. She is now working at Year 13 which is the Anglican Gap Year program. God is good.

My classes are in full swing and again children are absorbing God's Word. Please continue to pray for responses like K above in the lives of many other children.

I have had a busy start to term 1 – the school I volunteered at has finally employed me for 7 hours a week. This is great news and I'm hoping the hours might increase. The work is Special Learning Support and I have been working with kindergarten and thoroughly enjoying this. I have been able to continue to work with the little boy I have

helped over the past 2 years. I have also had some casual office work in a local Christian School office. This has been a wonderful provision from the Lord in the last few weeks as we have had quite a lot of "house maintenance" projects, some expected and some unexpected. So again I repeat – God is good.

Firstly, thank you for the gifts we receive, we appreciate and greatly value the support.

Many things have changed recently, after 14 years teaching Scripture in a local Christian school, the school decided that class teachers would now teach Scripture each week.

It was a fantastic opportunity to share the Gospel with children from many religious backgrounds, and being able to answer lots of difficult questions. I loved it.

Irene continues teaching classes each week with a team in two local primary schools. Pray this opportunity in our public schools continues.

Radio work is busy; recording and editing etc, to fill a request from a number of Victorian stations for programs to be broadcast daily instead of the usual once a week. We continue the weekly Communication radio program with George and Rita Galieh on other stations as well.

Last December the community channel TVS closed in Sydney. The program ≥12

Christian Media screened there each week was a major outreach in the wider Sydney area. We are waiting to see if TVS reinvents itself in another form.

However Satellite TV broadcasts continue and, as many will know, we broadcast to a third of the world's population through two Christian satellite providers, we have one hour every night of the week broadcast time. At the moment we are broadcasting across Australia, NZ, North Africa, the whole of the Middle East, Turkey, parts of Europe and the whole of North America. Putting it mildly, this is a huge task. Jamil Choucair is producing all the Arabic programs and I am looking after the English programs.

Over the past few years I have been using many of the messages preached here at Campbelltown, but this year I am also producing other types of programs with a Christian message.

For example last week I interviewed David Maddock (Cartwright Assembly). David is a senior flying instructor of many years experience and I also used footage of instrument and normal flight procedures with the emphasis on faith.

Recently I went to Gundagai to get local footage for a program about the Aboriginal people who warned the Europeans not to build their houses on the flood plains. In 1852 there was a huge flood; 89 died and 50 or so were rescued by two Aboriginal men in bark canoes. It is an interesting story with a Gospel application.

Pray that people will tune in to these broadcasts and respond to the message.

Our family has grown, now with seven grandchildren. They are all doing well.

Both our Mothers are 92 and struggle with health issues and we are thankful they are both in the same health care centre.

Thank you again for your care and support. Please pray that we will continue to be effective communicators of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.




Derek also presented a Certificate of Appreciation to the previous Chairman of CBCS, Tony Folland.

Dorothy Jessie Glover (nee Tulloch)

July 6,1919 to March 19, 2016

Dorothy was born in Cammeray, the first child of Robert Tulloch from the Orkney Islands, Scotland, and his New York born wife Susie May Cousins. A younger brother Ken followed, and then twins, Heather (Logan) and Roy.

The family grew up in the Enfield and Burwood areas and were closely involved with the Victoria Hall Assembly in Burwood. Dorothy was an active participant and taught Sunday School for many years. It was there that she met and, in 1943, married Ken Glover.

The family moved to Hornsby in 1949, with daughter Sue and later a son, Ian was born. They commenced a long association with Waitara Gospel Chapel. Dorothy was instrumental in establishing the Waitara Ladies' Luncheon which, after more than 60 years, continues as the Waitara Friendship Luncheon. Dorothy tirelessly supported the luncheon for many decades often welcoming people at the door or chairing the meeting. She would still rise early when well into her eighties to bake six of her famous sponges for each luncheon.

Dorothy and Ken were closely involved in the building and furnishing of the Waitara Chapel and Dorothy was committed, reliable and constant in her interest and support for the Chapel community and in its endeavours. She had a gift for hospitality and regularly over many years welcomed guests to her home for Sunday lunch and on many other occasions. 



Rallies, Stewards Foundation and the Combined Elders Committee.

Edgar is a 56-year-old Filipino brother in Christ who works as a deck fitter. mostly onboard bulk carriers. Edgar is married to Susan and they have three sons and one daughter. The family lives and attends church in Las Pinas in Metro Manila.

Edgar is a man who is extraordinary faithful in establishing and leading evangelistic

Bible Studies onboard each ship he joins.

I met him for the first time in 2011 when together with John Krishna, the SCFS representative in Port Kembla, I visited Edgar's ship, mv Pos Topas, while it was loading coal in that port. John and I were delighted to discover

that seven or eight crewmembers were regularly attending Edgar's weekly Bible Study. We also had the joy of meeting Cyril and Miguelito, two crewmembers who had made professions of faith in Christ as a consequence of attending Edgar's Bible Study.

Christian seafarers such as Edgar are

uniquely placed to proclaim Christ to other men on board their ships and, for that reason, SCFS endeavours to do all it can to encourage, strengthen and support these brothers. We do

Edgar in the first since we is nity to see each other again since we first met in 2011. In the last five years Edgar has been assigned to ships that have not traded to Australia. Nonetheless, we have remained in contact with each other, by email, telephone and text, and from time to time I have been able to mail resources to Edgar at some of the ports his ships have visited.

Seafarers are contracted to remain onboard their ships for periods up to 9 months, after which they spend a period of perhaps two months at home before being assigned to other vessels. When seafarers' contracts end, they return home and other seafarers join the ship to replace them. All of this means

it is difficult for seafarers to be able to keep in regular contact with one another and, more particularly, it is extraordinarily difficult for Christian seafarers to be able follow-up men >18 who make professions of faith in Christ onboard ships.

In 2013 Edgar was working aboard a bulk carrier called Pos Azurit. As usual, Edgar had established a Bible study on that ship. While he was

onboard he contacted me with a specific request to follow up an AB by the name of Jerry, who had made a profession of faith in Christ. I agreed to do what I could and began to correspond with Jerry by email and to provide him with a number of resources.

In the grace of God, in September 2014, Jerry and

I were able to meet for the first time when his ship, mv Aquamarin, visited the port of Newcastle. The two or three hours we had together did much to strengthen our relationship with each other.

Since that time, like Edgar, Jerry and I have not been able to meet again but we have nonetheless remained in contact with each other. It is a great joy for me to see Jerry growing in Christ and also reaching out with the Gospel to the crewmates on his different ships.

When a seafarer, who was a Roman Catholic, is converted, while onboard his ship, this often causes tensions when he returns home. It is often difficult for the seafarer's wife to comprehend what has happened to her husband and for the seafarer to communicate to his wife why it is


important for them to leave the Roman Catholic Church.


This was the case for Jerry and his wife Mitzie. Their recent vacations together have not been happy ones and their hearts were anxious and heavy

> when the time eventually came late last year for Jerry to yet again join another ship.

> Jerry has prayed much about this situation and now it seems God is answering. Mitzie agreed to study some of the Bible courses that Jerry studied whilst on his ships. She also agreed to study two courses that, with Jerry's

permission, I mailed to her in the Philippines. One of these is the course entitled, The Woman who pleases God' and the other is 'God's Blueprint for your Marriage.'





It is a cause of much thanksgiving that, in his most recent email, Jerry told me he and Mitzie now 'have a good >

relationship again.' Both Jerry and Mitzie are looking forward to Jerry's next vacation in three months time. It seems that as both of them have drawn closer to God, God has at the same time drawn them closer to each other.

What is the significance of all this? Because Edgar was faithful in holding forth the Word of Life on his ship to his crewmates, Cyril and Miguelito were drawn to Christ. On another of Edgar's ships Jerry was drawn to Christ. Now it seems that Jerry's wife Mitzie is also being drawn to Christ.

Space precludes me from describing how, on yet another ship, Cyril has likewise held forth the Word of Life to his crewmates and has seemingly been used to draw Fernando to Christ. It also now seems that Fernando's wife Lanie is being drawn to Christ as she, like Mitzie, studies Emmaus Bible Courses we have provided.

Please give God great thanks that **Edgar** is faithful in holding forth the Word of Life to his crewmates and that God used Edgar to draw **Cyril** and **Jerry** to the Lord Jesus Christ.

Book review "The Church of Irresistible Influence"

Part of a review from the publisher

This is not a new book. It was first published by Zondervan in 2001.

It is not set in a typical Australian context. It is written by an American pastor, Robert Lewis, who describes a dramatic change of operation chosen by the already large congregation who worship in the Fellowship Bible Church (FBC) which is in Little Rock, Arkansas, USA. They decided to become a "bridge" between the church and their local community; a well travelled link between heaven and earth for those they lived amongst.


The principles described have since been taught to many churches in the USA with much success and some failures - all of which gives lessons on how to serve the Lord better. The same can happen in Australia.

Jesus used compelling metaphors to describe the church and its impact on the world. For example "a city set on a hill" - inescapably visible; and "a lit lamp" illuminating the darkest room. And indeed, the early church, filled with the Holy Spirit, demonstrated a spiritual energy and depth that transformed the surrounding culture.

Using bridges as a metaphor for "irresistible influence", or i² as Robert Lewis calls it, he shows how any church can become a link between God and its local community.

He tells stories and shares experiences and lessons from FBC to show:-

- what it will take to reconnect your church with your community;
- the how-to's of 'incarnational bridge building";



- true stories of i² in action;
- how to expand the i² effort through new partnerships and adventures;
- requirements of the church in the 21st century.

The book has a 'must-read-first' preface which starts with "Imagination is a wondeful asset. It allows us to see realities as they 'could be' and 'should be'. It challenges us to go beyond our experiece of what is, to those higher realms of the improbable."

Further on it reads "If the church of Jesus Christ is important to you, let me ask you to *use your imagination* as you ponder some questions:-

Can you imagine the community in which you live being genuinely thankful for your church?

Can you imagine city leaders valuing your church's friendship and participation in the community—even asking for it?

(... plus 4 more questions ... then ...)

Can you imagine the spiritual harvest that would naturally follow if all this was true?"





a movement-building approach

to evangelism

At Ambassadors for Christ International (AFCI), our vision for EvangelismSHIFT is: a movement of churches across Australia and beyond whose congregations have a culture of living as witnesses in their daily lives and relationships.

For many years we had a vision for multiplication, but it was a multiplication of effective materials. We saw thousands of people turn to Christ through our *LifeWorks* materials, and that was our goal. Our goal is much bigger now, although it will take us longer to realise it. Now we want to see people saved, learning to live as witnesses for Jesus in normal relationships, then developing into those who can take others through this same process elsewhere.

Most efforts at movement building today focus on church planting, but our focus is on transforming the culture of existing churches to follow Jesus' pattern of multiplication. We want to help churches move from leader-owned, event-driven evangelism to congregations with a culture of living as witnesses for Jesus.

EvangelismSHIFT is a two-year process, plus the multiplication phase. There are a total of three phases to the EvangelismSHIFT process:

Phase 1

For culture change to take place there has to be deep 'buy-in' from the leadership. Not just buy-in to the concepts but personal commitment to learning this way of life. During the first year of EvangelismSHIFT we work only with the leadership. This broad group of leaders includes pastors, elders/church council, ministry leaders, and all small group leaders. This may be up to 15% or more of a church that has a large small-group ministry involvement.

During this year with the leaders we do not talk about their ministry role at the church, nor about the church's evangelism strategy. Our total focus is on their own personal lives as they learn to be witnesses for Jesus in their daily encounters. We have been amazed at the eagerness of pastors and church leaders to be trained in this lifestyle. We challenge them that in the second year they need to be able to say to their small groups, as Jesus said to his small group, "Follow me and I will help you become fishers of men." Isn't this what the Apostle Paul said in 1 Corinthians 11:1, just after describing his approach to evangelism when invited into the home of an unbeliever—"Imitate me, as I imitate Christ"?

Phase 1 is accomplished through:

- * 18 sessions of 90 minutes each, usually taught in six seminars (one every second month)
- * The *Live As a Witness!* journal with 365 daily devotions on living the lifestyle of a witness for Jesus
- * The Ambushed by God book where each chapter is the story of a redemptive encounter with someone, written by a man who lives as a witness.

* Sent Connections (groups of 3-4 leaders who get together regularly to share what God is teaching them about the life of a witness, to pray by name for the redemptive relationships in their lives, and to talk through the conversations they have had with these people.

Phase 2

Two things happen concurrently during the second year of Evangelism-SHIFT. First, we continue meeting with a smaller group of the leaders (those responsible for setting ministry strategy). We take them through a study of Jesus' approach to building a spiritual movement. They evaluate their current ministry strategy against this and together they form a new strategy going forward that creates a balanced environment for developing witnessing disciplemakers. We help them expand their vision from simply making their own church healthy and

strong, to multiplying disciplemaking communities in new areas.

At the same time, the larger group of leaders from Phase 1 takes the congregation on the EvangelismSHIFT journey. The church embarks on a campaign, trying to include every person in the congregation in the small group process for the year. In the first two terms small groups use EvangelismSHIFT materials to learn how to build redemptive relationships towards the gospel. In the third term, each small group member has the faith goal of bringing a person or a couple they have been building a relationship with, into their small group to do LifeWorks together. Then in the fourth term groups do GrowthWorks together to establish new believers in their faith.

Phase 3 – This is where Evangelism-SHIFT becomes a movement!

Two EvangelismSHIFT Facilitators take a church through the entire EvangelismSHIFT journey. At the end of the ➤

two years, several of the leaders from the church (leaders who are beginning to live the witnessing lifestyle and are beginning to apply Jesus' movement building principles) will become Apprentice Facilitators and go with the Facilitators to another church that they themselves have a relationship with, to take that church on the same journey to develop a culture of living as witnesses for Jesus. When they have finished the two-year process there, they will become Facilitators and take new Apprentice Facilitators from that church to yet another church and start the transformation there.

How is it going?

After several years of development, we launched EvangelismSHIFT in 2015 at our pilot church, a sizable church in Perth. Over 50 leaders came through our Phase 1 training in 2015, with deep life-change happening in many lives as

they began to live as witnesses. Now we are in early 2016 and have begun Phase 2 at this church. Already five leaders have asked to be considered to facilitate EvangelismSHIFT at other churches next year, including the Senior Pastor, Evangelism Pastor, National Director of OAC Ministries (who attends the church) and two other lay leaders. They see how God is changing their own church and they want to pass it on. The seed is bearing fruit and our first multiplication has begun!

At the end of our seminar last month the Senior Pastor commented "where were you guys 15 years ago?". This was a great encouragement to us.

This year we have started Phase 1 in five new churches in NSW, three of these are Christian Brethren churches at Wollongbar, Ballina and Raymond Terrace. There has been an amazing >24

response from all the leadership teams involved. It's exciting to see churches across denominations deeply feel the need for this kind of change and are getting started with Evangelism-SHIFT— Brethren, Baptist, Anglican, and Church of Christ...so far.

We have also recruited a pastor from the Philippines who is traveling to Australia six times in 2016 to be a participant in EvangelismSHIFT in both Phase 1 and Phase 2 churches. In 2017 an experienced Facilitator will travel to the Philippines six times to help him plant the EvangelismSHIFT seed in several Filipino churches and start the multiplication over there.

We believe that we are on a path that God has set us on. The multiplication is slow, taking place every two years. But the impact is deep and the multiplication effect will soon take hold. We will see a movement of churches across Australia and beyond with a culture of living as witnesses for Jesus!

"EvangelismSHIFT has been a breath of fresh air to my walk with Jesus. It's been reminding me of things I'd forgotten: the importance of being intentional in building genuinely loving relationships with people, the power of asking insightful questions, and my own need to pray. Can't wait for the rest of the course!"

JOHN and LIZ YOUNG – Ballina Bible Centre say:

"ESHIFT has been the main catalyst in giving me clarity about WHY I am here today - to represent Jesus to everyone I meet. My sense of SENTNESS has definitely grown and a conviction that He is in charge of those I rub shoulders with today and that some may indeed have hearts ready to hear. As a church, it has given



us a lot more 'togetherness'. We ALL are representing Him. We ALL have a story to tell when we meet."

JOHN FLEMMING – Wollongbar Christian Church says:

"For some time I have been intentional about sharing Christ with people in my life but as a result of the teaching at the recent EvangelismSHIFT seminar, sent connection accountability and the Witnessing Journal (and of course the Holy Spirit) I have been more conscious and prayerful about looking for every opportunity to share Christ with people in my life. Only this week I had a business meeting over lunch with a client from the Gold Coast and I was prayerful beforehand about looking for any opportunities to share my faith. I was excited when God clearly gave an opportunity to share the scriptures but I was really touched when the following day the client phoned to ask how he could find out more about having a relationship with God. He has already agreed to meet on a weekly basis to study the Bible over lunch. God is at work in an amazing way because this person was the exact individual that I had been praying for early on the day we met. I am so excited to see the transforming work of the Gospel and the power of God displayed over coming weeks. All the glory goes to God but thanks guys for the encouragement and the push to be more intentional. An intentional attitude and personal specific prayer are both essentials in leading people Christ-ward!"

I hope you readers can see the real significance of what God is doing in people's lives through EvangelismSHIFT. Today, will you join with AFCI in accelerating the spread of the gospel through the local churches?

We have some partners already, including NSW Assemblies' Evangelistic Mission (AEM), but we need more.

We've probably all heard the saying, "If God closes a door, He always opens a window." That implies that as soon as we see the door is closed, it's time to move on.

But Jesus tells an interesting parable in Luke 18. He tells of a widow who goes and beats on the door of a wicked judge over and over until she gets justice. He then says if even a wicked judge answers the persistent, how much more so will God.

That made me wonder, "What if closed doors are just an invitation to keep knocking?" I know there are times when the door is not only closed but there is also a big "Keep Away" sign plastered on the front. I'm not talking about those times. I'm talking about the many grey closed doors that are not clearly a "no" from God but we take them that way.

Why would God want us to keep knocking on the door? I think it's

because He wants us to come to Him over and over. We serve an intensely personal God. He wants us to be part of the process.

Perhaps a closed door is really just an invitation to press in, knock harder, ask louder, and draw nearer to Him.

Perhaps He knows that we're building spiritual muscles by banging on that door—muscles we will need when it finally swings open.

Perhaps He's building perseverance and strength in us.

Perhaps He knows we will value what we receive on the other side of the open door more if we had to really seek after it rather than just having it given to us.

I don't know what all of God's purposes may be for closed doors, but I do know I just may start knocking longer and louder than I ever have before. You too?

What follows is some advice from a website which publishes many reviews and therefore can be more 'fussy' than I will be. Nevertheless, I hope the advice is helpful to YOU.

How to Write a Compelling Review

- 1 Reviews should be honest comment whether positive or negative.
- 2 Share how you've been challenged to apply the book's content to your life and ministry, actions you've taken, or changes you've made as a result of reading a book (see examples below). "A book review written well will serve and strengthen the church in its task to advance the Kingdom of God." ¹
- 3 Don't over-summarize. Spend more time on interaction and reflection.²
- 4 For Christian book reviews especially, engage with the question of whether the book is biblical and whether it helps the reader grow in the gospel.³
- 5 You can post reviews on your own blog, and you also can post your review on a consumer site. (Amazon.

com, barnesandnoble.com, booksamillion.com, borders.com, buy.com, christianbook.com, familychristian.com, costco.com, goodreads.com, lifeway.com, overstock.com, walmart.com, and WTS.com all have a section on each book's product page dedicated to customer reviews.)

The following are examples of questions you can try to answer in your review. This is just a starting point, we don't want to dampen your unique voice and creativity.

- 1 Did the book change how you think about God, the church, or this world? Draw a connection to your job, relationships, or devotional life.
- 2 Were you compelled to implement something new as a parent, spouse, friend, student, or employee? Share where God's grace is at work.
- 3 Are you seeing new ways the gospel affects your hobbies, your past, your dreams?
- 4 Do you have fresh ideas for serving your local church or community?
