

Perhaps my mind has been biased in that direction by the background events in Australia as it's been compiled in the late March - early April time-frame. The footy season has begun and, overlaying all other sports, has been the 2018 Commonwealth Games held on the Gold Coast of Oueensland from the 4<sup>th</sup> to 15<sup>th</sup> April. Who could escape the news from "the Games" on TV & radio, in newspapers and magazines, and streaming to our mobile phones and computers? Of course it helped that we, the host country, topped the medal tally with 80 Gold, 59 Silver and 59 Bronze!

In the 1820s a group of like-minded Christians in Dublin became frustrated with the established churches, and decided to begin anew. A leading figure in these meetings, clergyman John Nelson Darby, took the fundamental principles of these early meetings and founded a new gathering in Plymouth in 1831. In 1848, the Brethren movement divided into the Exclusive Brethren, who followed Darby, and the Open Brethren, who preferred to retain their congregational autonomy.

The Brethren have a long history of evangelism and missionary work, and Brethren assemblies have been established in over 100 countries. Today, the Open Brethren have an estimated 2 million members worldwide, and the Exclusive Brethren number 46,000.

The Christian Brethren Archive was established in 1979, in Manchester (U.K.), and is now the world's largest

archive relating to the Brethren. The collection consists of four parts.

#### **Printed Material:**


There are just over 17,000 books, pamphlets and tracts, some purchased, and donated by Christian Brethren organisations and individuals. It is one of the most comprehensive collections of printed material produced by and about the Brethren.

#### Periodicals:

There are over 300 periodicals and journals, dating from the early 19<sup>th</sup> century to the present, a number of which are still active, and accrue new issues on a regular basis. There are many periodicals relating to Brethren mission work.

#### Archival Material:

This includes records of Brethren assemblies and organisations, and of individuals of significance. There is unique material relating to the formation and early days of the movement. There is also a large collection of correspondence with Brethren mission workers around the world, and visual materials, including photographs, lantern slides and paintings.

#### **Digitised Material:**

The collection's digitised material includes the correspondence and scrapbook of John Nelson Darby, the Fry manuscripts, the journals of Dan Crawford and E.H. Broadbent, and a collection of lantern slides relating to mission work. All are available to view via our website.

#### The Brethren in Australia:

The Christian Brethren Archive contains several publications on the history of the Brethren in Australia, and notes meetings and ministry around the country. The periodicals include reports of Australian mission work, and there is also correspondence relating to the work of the Brethren in Australia.

All readers are welcome to visit the Christian Brethren Archive to consult the material that we hold.

# Young Adults: are our church leaders,

# doing right by them?

Data shows that young people tend to leave the Church in their late teen years. Keeping them in our congregations at this time in their lives can be a real challenge – a challenge that we need to embrace because young adults are the 'engine room' of the church, but how do we do this?

So often doctrine is the basis of the discipleship process that we undertake in our churches. This can be a positive thing as good Bible teaching is an essential element to any local church or Christian organisation. However, when we look at the life of Jesus and the discipleship journey that He took His disciples on, we see a remarkable thing. Jesus was all about relationship and He gave doctrinal teaching in the context of relationship. Firstly, Jesus wove the truths that He wanted to convey into the everyday realities of His life with His disciples and He used simple (as opposed to simplistic) examples from their lives to teach and instruct. Secondly, Jesus allowed them to lead.

It has been said before that: no one, ever, would launch and build a locally impacting, as well as internationally reaching, ministry and then just leave it in the hands of their apprentices after three years, but Jesus did exactly this.

Jesus built and discipled through relationship and then left His ministry in the hands of those He had sowed into. I find this very challenging and it has some real implications for us, I would suggest that Jesus' life and way of ministry challenges us to

make relationship our primary form of discipleship, it also challenges us to step back and allow those who are younger to succeed (if need be by trial and error). Doing what Jesus did and journeying with people, allowing them into our very lives, homes and families is intimate. It costs us something, but it is so richly rewarding for them and for us.

When it comes to young people who are struggling to be 'regular in church', can I kindly encourage us all (myself included) to not give them doctrinal realities, but rather to reach out through relationship: a coffee, a house repair, oil change, baking session etc. Let's do discipleship as the Master did, allowing people into our worlds and trusting God to build the relational collateral and then to, in key moments, steer their life into the light.

Acts 2: 46-47

Purpose Driven Youth Ministry. This was the title of an international best-selling book by Ps Rick Warren a few years ago. This book posited the idea that purpose drives the healthy Church forward. The emerging generations are very much moving away from traditionalism – 'I go to Church because my family did'. They are looking for a purpose, a cause.

It is important to footnote that the Gospel is much more than a cause, it is the redemptive message of God for all humanity. That said, presenting missional work in the context of a cause can be very beneficial, especially when dealing with the younger generations.

Recently a number of movements have arisen out of various causes: 'Me Too', 'March for our Lives' are examples of fast moving movements that arose around social causes. Young Christians should be encouraged to rally around the 'cause' of the Gospel, the message of help for the hopeless, love for the unloved and ultimately reconciliation with God through Christ, via us.

In 2 Corinthians 5:17 to 20a, the apostle Paul says the following:

"All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us."

Notice the phrases: "and gave us the ministry of reconciliation" and "God making his appeal through us".

Living and sharing the message of Christ is the mission of the Church and a worthy 'cause' for young Christians to give their lives to.

Can I encourage us to think through making this the purpose that drives our Churches and the primary 'cause' that we put in-front of our youth, as opposed to 'accidentally' asking them to adhere to various traditions or liturgical methods. I love the saying: marry your mission and date your methods. I believe that any youth or young adult group that has a missional purpose at its centre it going to be effective and "bear much fruit".

The 'cause' of the Gospel is best thought of as something that is part of our very selves: we want to avoid the idea that our purpose exists in a program, that mission is something done through an outreach initiative each week.

Mission is something that we are; it is to be interwoven into our daily realities and become as seamless and natural as breathing.

# Sports Ministry and Evangelism

Rev Samuel Ashe, an 18th century English clergyman, clearly saw the need for interaction between church and sport. He used to spend his Sunday afternoons hiding in the trees by the local sports field. He would bide his time until the football came near him - then he would catch the ball and pierce it with a pin. He could then go home pleased to have stopped his parishioners from sinning! <sup>1</sup>

Hopefully, this article (written in 2014) identifies more constructive ways of engaging with the world of sport!

No reasonable person can deny the importance of sport in the modern world:-

- The FIFA Football World Cup takes place in Brazil in June-July this year 2014.
- The 2010 World Cup was shown on TV in every single country and territory on earth, with 3.2 billion people around the world, or 46.4% of the global population, watching at least part of it.<sup>2</sup> **Theological catch-up**

Christian ministry to sport largely began in the 1950s but has grown exponentially to the point where there are currently over 50 ministries with a specific engagement with sport in the UK alone. Some form of Christian ministry to sport exists in 180 countries of the world. However, the growth has been spontaneous and often uncoordinated. This process has had certain consequences, for example, in terms of theology.

Jim Mathisen, from Wheaton College, has written, 'The fact that the current [sports ministry] movement still operates in the absence of any clearly articulated theology of sport is troubling . . . no theology or hermeneutics

is broadly shared within the movement' While Mathisen's comment remains true in the sense that sports ministry still operates from no generally accepted common theological foundation, more and more material on sport and Christianity is being published at an academically respectable level.<sup>4</sup>

#### Broad scope

Sports ministry broadly falls into two categories: ministry *to* sport and ministry *through* sport.

- Ministry to sport means serving sport in the name of Jesus; sports chaplaincy<sup>5</sup> is a good example of this. The term 'serving the people of sport' is also used. This is helping the (often) elite sportsperson to practise their sport Christianly as well as bringing church to them when competition stops them getting to a local Sunday service.
- Ministry through sport is seeing sport as an evangelistic opportunity. This might involve running sports events with an evangelistic purpose, starting a church sports team to draw in outsiders, operating a fitness centre for the community as part of the church's programme, or distributing leaflets or video material with a gospel message >18

in the language of sport, often using the testimony of high-profile Christian athletes.

Sports ministry works at all levels and age groups. The following vision statement of one UK ministry summarizes well the task that the majority of Christian sports ministry organizations are engaged in:

- Christians *everywhere* living out their faith in sports clubs and teams.
- Churches *everywhere* engaging with their local sports communities.
- **Sports people** *everywhere* having the opportunity to hear the good news of Jesus Christ.<sup>6</sup>

### Major event ministry

In recent years, Christians have seen the potential of a major event in their country or city as an opportunity for service and witness. This type of ministry began in the 1990s and has grown significantly over the years, particularly at the Olympics and football World Cups:

- A £2 million campaign around the 2012 London Olympics and Paralympics involved over 2,000 volunteers from 40 countries serving on mission teams, the production and sale of 500,000 Christian resources and the distribution of half a million free bottles of water.
- The athlete family home-stay programme hosted 280 guests from 20 nations for 2,000 nights of free accommodation.
- Church-organized events attracted over 500,000 people.<sup>7</sup>

Major event ministry has often been

very effective but can sometimes lead to problems with the event's organizing committee. They may feel that a particular Christian publication conflicts with official publications or could mislead the public into believing that there is an official relationship between the publisher and the organising committee.

A ministry report on a recent major sports event referred to a plan to distribute over 500,000 pieces of spiritual literature with testimonies of faith at three community fan zones in the city. While one may rejoice at this evangelistic enterprise, one might also question how the city authorities view the task of picking up the discarded leaflets and whether the reputation of the Christian community has been enhanced by this exercise—or the reverse.

One may also ask how the organizers of a Christian conference would feel if a commercial or political organization were to leaflet delegates to their event. The potential longer-term effects of a major event evangelistic bombardment and the effectiveness of, say, handing out 'tracts' to people who are just wanting to have a fun day out at a sporting event, need to be considered.

#### Sports chaplaincy

The chaplaincy programme at the London Olympics was arguably the most comprehensive ever conducted at an Olympic Games, with 162 chaplains accredited in three separate categories to serve the athletes and others in the Olympic Village, the workforce and volunteers and the media. This was



an excellent example of servant-hearted Christians working with the Olympic organizing committee to add value to the event.

The chaplaincy opportunity was created by the foresight of the Bishop of Barking who had created the post of 'Church of England Olympics Executive Coordinator' five years previously. The person appointed, Duncan Green, describes his journey of service to the organizing committee in a forthcoming book.<sup>8</sup>

#### Sports outreach

At the grassroots level, some Christian-based sports outreach projects are being recognised by secular sporting networks as valid forms of engagement through sport to tackle problems in society. A good example is the Ambassadors Fathers' Football project, which won the Beyond London 2012 Innovation award for reaching out to support poor, marginalised immigrant fathers in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets.<sup>9</sup>

When the Africa Cup of Nations was held in Egypt in 2006, the organizing committee was short of volunteers. The Christian community rallied round and recruited the required help. A Christian leader was given the role of Head of Volunteers and a place on the organizing committee.

He said afterwards, 'It was an incredible opportunity that God gave to the sports ministry in Egypt, to be at the heart of such a big sports event. Ninety percent of the people I was working with—volunteers, organizing commit-

tee, government—were not Christians. But all of them knew I was from a Christian church. I believe this is real sports ministry—not just working in the church but taking the church outside'.

The London 2012 and Egypt 2006 experiences show how an attitude of servant-hearted support for the organizing committee of a major sports event is often appreciated and can build bridges between the Christian community and the sports administrators.

#### Disability sport

At the 1992 Paralympics, admission was free. The organizing committee did not think that anyone would pay to watch disability sport. In 2012 in London the Paralympics were virtually sold out for every event. The quality and the profile of disability sport have increased dramatically over the past few years. However, the Christian community has largely ignored disability sport. In the UK perhaps 2 of the 50 sports ministries explicitly include disability sport within their programme of activities.

If the theological reflection on sport has been sparse, the Christian thinking about disability sport has been almost nonexistent. The publication of a book later this year will represent a welcome contribution to the field.<sup>10</sup>

### Prophetic engagement

Christians have been criticized for failing to have any prophetic engagement with sport. Tom Krattenmaker,<sup>11</sup> for example, has lamented the lack of interest in issues like racism, exploitation of women, financial corruption,>20

or excessive violence in sport. When the 2014 Winter Olympics in Russia brought Russia's anti-gay legislation into world spotlight, there seemed to be silence from the Christian sports ministry community.

#### Theological implications

The increased application of theological reflection to sport is to be welcomed. However, it must be recognized that the process has only just begun:

- Ministry underpinned by a sound theological base will be stronger and hopefully more effective.
- Greater theological understanding will help Christians to interact positively with sports' governing bodies and to serve them rather than appearing simply to want to use the sports event for their own purposes.
- It will also help Christians address and give leadership in relation to the ethical issues which pervade sport.
- Ministry which respects the integrity of sport without compromising the integrity of the gospel is likely to reap long-term fruit.

#### Lessons and suggested responses

The 'incarnational' model emphasis of sports ministry, where Christians enter the world of sportspeople, reflects the Pauline emphasis in 1 Corinthians 9:19-23 with a playing, participating, and supporting level of involvement that requires a huge commitment in terms of time, vulnerability, and intentionality in relationships. This is a lesson for other spheres of evangelism that can sometimes emphasise a programme/event/'come to us' approach.

Being open to supporting an incarnational approach in evangelism, and in envisioning, equipping, and supporting any sportspeople in the congregation to be the church's evangelists to their sports friends and local sports club, can be an effective strategy to help the church engage with its local sports community. Supporting Christian parents of sporty children as they engage with others around their child's sport, through alternative church meetings and visiting children at their sports activities, for example, is also essential.

Another lesson applicable to other spheres of evangelism is that the serving emphasis within sports evangelism can break down many barriers and open up doors for other evangelism opportunities. Such an approach may not yield short-term results but the long-term favour that emerges (eg through sports chaplaincy) can lead to real growth of influence for the gospel.

Churches should also be open to serve in the community through sport, for example in providing volunteers, coaches, pastoral care, or a meeting place for a local sports club, school, or college. There should also be a conscious decision to value and prioritise disability sport more that has happened up to this point.

Seeing sport as a gift from God, valuing it, and seeking to engage with sport as those who care about it, must represent a fundamental part of how Christians see the world of sport in future. Let us get involved in the world of sport and win it for Christ!

# What our teenagers need most

# Now isn't an easy time to be both a teenager and a Christian!

Sure, in some ways it's never been an easy time to be a teenager and a Christian! The gods of approval, of pleasure, and of an autonomous lifestyle have often grown more appealing in the teenage years. For many generations youth have had to weigh up whether Jesus is really worth it.

But it's no overstatement to say that the present generation of youth are growing up in a range of hindrances that no previous generations have had to overcome.

Australian culture has moved over the last two decades from being relatively irreligious yet tolerant of religion to being religiously intolerant of tradition religions. Youth are no longer told that they are free to believe whatever they want as they were in postmodernity, but are now told what they must and must not believe. It is now considered immoral by our culture to believe in Jesus of Nazareth and to adopt His views on life, community and sexuality.

Technological advancements have put pornography into the hands of every child in the form of an smartphone. Whereas previous generations had to sneak and steal to get their hands on a dirty magazine, almost all teenage boys are now exposed to pornography between the ages of 9 and 13.

Genuine friendship and community, once provided in the church, now has to compete with artificial online community. Youth group games of dodgeball cannot hope to compete

with the dopamine rush that teenage boys get from a night of playing high intensity video games online.

Teenage girls on Instagram and Snapchat are consuming more images than ever before which portray unrealistic standards of beauty. Tragically, at a younger and younger age, they are urged to view themselves as sexual objects.

Teachers at most high schools, once upon a time, were relatively silent on issues of faith and morality. Now they are vocally opposed to the Christian worldview and teenagers are made to feel foolish for believing the claims of the Bible.

Our youth need help! They are in a perilous situation.

When Jesus looks out at the crowds in Matthew 9 we are told that "He had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd." (Matt 9: 36). This word rendered 'compassion' in English - literally carries the meaning of a twisting of the spleen! It is not a light compassion - Jesus' gut is wrenched at the state of the lost crowds.

So too should ours be by the state of our youth. They are like sheep – vulnerable to these many attacks; so often with nobody to lead or protect them. ≥24

Jesus urges His disciples to "pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest."

So then we ought to be praying for workers to rise up to care for this generation of Australian youth.

Our youth need leaders.

Leaders to give them care and guidance in how to stand firm in the way of Jesus in an extremely difficult time.

Leaders to engage with them on their level and not to shy away from dealing with the difficult issues that they are facing. Our young people need leaders who love them enough to share the

gospel with them in a way that paints a picture of Jesus that is more compelling than any alternative worldview that the world tries to sell them.

Our teenagers need this more than games, or activities, or trendy music.

# How to Answer: "Science proves that God

# is not real. How can you say he is?"

The rise of science has led many to believe that Christian views are outdated and ignorant. For this reason, you need to know how to respond to people who say that science proves that God isn't real.

When the Dark Ages gave way to the Enlightenment in the late 1600s, the Western world was changed. So many things that had seemed mysterious and magical/spiritual could now be explained by science. Although none of the claims of Scripture were set aside by science, many of the beliefs of Christians were. This led great segments of society (particularly those 'enlightened' by education) to the conclusion that through science all spiritual explanations of life would eventually be set aside. For centuries, humanists expected that any reference to spiritual realities would die away as science progressed. They predicted that the Bible itself would be discarded and forgotten.

How wrong they were. As westerners have been exposed more to eastern and animistic cultures, they have encountered and personally had spiritual experiences. In our day, the existence of spiritual powers and beings is accepted. Yet the view still persists that science rules out God.

When you encounter someone with this view, point out that our experience of the universe is so tiny that it is impossible to rule out the existence of God. All a person can say is, "I personally have not yet experienced God." Let the person know that while they may not have experienced God, you have! Share your story with them. Talk about answered prayer and what God is doing in your inner life.

Talk about the evidence of millions of people around the world who have had their lives totally transformed by Jesus.

Point out that many of the greatest scientists in the world today are firm believers in God and, in fact, see God as the only explanation for the realities in their fields of science! A quick search on the internet will show you many of the stories of these scientists. Forward some links of these scientists' testimonies to the person you are talking to.

As you discuss God with people, be sure to remember that your goal is not to win an argument, but to help this person open their heart to God. If you see that the person's heart is hard and not open at all to you or your discussion, then stop pursuing the topic.

When you find someone whose heart is open and seeking, then spend a lot of time with that person and look for ways to remind them that it is not just about discussing things to a conclusion, but there is a living person named Jesus Christ who is reaching out to them and waiting for them to trust him.

# The 'Awake Sydney' Prayer Summit

This article comprises major portions of the Summit's official report.

Prayer Summit key scripture (John 3:17):

"For God did not send His Son into the world that He might condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through Him."

#### Preamble

The Awake Sydney Prayer Summit was held at the Salvation Army National Headquarters in Redfern on Saturday, March 3<sup>rd</sup>, for a day of prayer and connection. The Youth Directors of Sydney's largest Protestant denominations, who in-turn represent thousands of local churches, gathered together with a delegation of key leaders from their respective movements to ask God to move with power in our city.

The gathering was formed around a Vision Document that was jointly created. The central idea of this document and the gathering is as follows: "To understand on a citywide scale, the true heart and message of both Jesus Christ and His followers. A 'reformation' within our city of what Christianity actually is, namely: a force of love and not hate, an institution that protects and does not harm, that is essential to daily life and spirituality, rather than being irrelevant."

#### The Gathering

The keynote address was given by Rev Dr John Dickson from the Centre for Public Christianity. He spoke from Matthew's Gospel about conviction and compassion, these two working together as a framework for cultural engagement. Dr Dixon climaxed by presenting prayer as the most essential element of evangelism. Ps. Sean Nolan, who convened the gathering, spoke from 2 Corinthians 5 and Luke

1 about how we are called to be ambassadors of the reconciliation that God brought about through Christ. That representing the name (identity) of Jesus and all it encompasses is our primary task.

There was a brief panel MC'd by Jeanette Nolan with Dr John Dickson, Mark McCrindle and the Honourable Paul Green MLC.

The NSW Premier, the Honourable Gladys Berejiklian was welcomed to the Summit. Jeanette Nolan and Rev Steve Dixon prayed for her personally and her Government. The Premier addressed the Summit, sharing about her personal faith as a Christian.

Ps Nolan then presented the Premier with a Bible that had been signed by the leaders present, including all the denominations' Youth Directors.

Ps Nolan shared the desire of the Church to support her and to, in line with Biblical teaching, honour her and her government as God's appointed leaders. The Premier was thankful and moved. Importantly, nothing was asked of the Premier, she was prayed for, honoured and encouraged.

The Summit climaxed with the head Youth Directors of nine major denominations kneeling in prayer, jointly asking God to move afresh and anew in our City, State and Nation. The devotional booklets were handed out (see below), including one to the Premier, and copies for her cabinet. >28

#### Forward vision

After the main Summit, a private meeting was held between the nine Youth Directors. The following points were recorded:-

- 1. The group agreed, strongly, that this had been a monumental day of prayer, influence, unity and networking.
- 2. The group agreed to meet every six months to pray together, hosted on rotation. Rev Craig Roberts offered Anglican Youth Works to host the next gathering. To be assessed yearly.
- 3. The group agreed to organically support each other through resource sharing.
- 4. The group agreed to centre prayer around organic growth through existing denominational youth infrastructure.

Additionally, there was mention of the Franklin Graham outreach in early 2019 and that a number of the Youth Directors would be willing to partner together to support this event. This was seen somewhat as an answer to prayer, and also seen as an evangelistic opportunity that could utilise this key Youth network.

The combined Youth Directors would like to thank the Salvation Army for hosting the gathering, as well as the Bible Society for preparing and printing the devotional booklets, Inspiring Hope for managing the operations, administration and event management, and the Hon. Paul Green MLC for arranging the visit of the NSW Premier. Leaders were in attendance from:

CCCAust(NSW), Baptist Union, Churches of Christ, Salvation Army, Adventists, Australian Christian Churches, Hillsong Church, Presbyterian, Anglican, McCrindle Research, Bible Society, and the Centre for Public Christianity.

Others committed to the vision but unable to attend were Hope 103.2, C3 and the Uniting Church.

A booklet of devotionals from 13 of the leaders was published.
