The outbreak of Covid-19 and its necessary restrictions struck at the heart of the fellowship of our believers. Handshakes and hugs were replaced by social distancing or Zoom, one on one conversations frustrated by muffled voices and half covered faces. community singing sanitized by the use of pre-recorded worship songs the pleasure of congregating with the whole community limited by group size restrictions, and (some might say) worse, the downer of no coffee during the break between services! Some have felt unsettled with this kind of disruption and have found it necessary to stay away. We trust that 2021 will see us returning to the pre-Covid normal, allowing us again to enjoy the warmth and closeness of the fellowship of the believers.

Our Church programmes in 2020 did not stop however, and we thank God for a switched-on core of leaders

and technicians who were flexible and savvy enough to facilitate them within the confines of the often changing Covid restrictions. From the outset, the Sunday service continued to be streamed with ever increasing professionalism, and mid-week small groups and community contact groups (Hands and Feet food distribution, Jesus Club, Shift youth group) continued with social distancing measures in place, or via Zoom.

The leadership continued to meet regularly during 2020, and some plans in the pipeline were brought to fruition. The Filipino portion of the church ably led by Pastor Ariel decided to change from a monthly Filipino flavoured service to building their own church community and meet separately and weekly as the Christ Centred Community Church (see page 8). They use the church building on Sunday afternoons and there remains a strong tie between the two communities. >8



Misconceptions of God can be costly, because they can be very defeating. For example, it's agonizing to me how many people think "Cleanliness is next to godliness" comes from the pages of Scripture. If this is indeed a word from God, then homemakers have every right to feel guilty that their house is not always tidy. In fact, depending on how far you carry it, people soon become more concerned about their furniture than they do their family. And what about "God helps those who help themselves"? I've seen this used as a basis for many people thinking they can work their way to heaven. They therefore miss the Biblical teaching that eternal life is free; "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord". (Romans 6:23).

I know of five other misconceptions of God's Word you'd be wise to spend a Sunday addressing. In fact, I think you'd be wiser to give one Sunday to each of them.

They are:-

- 1. "If you don't know the date you were saved, then you are not saved."
- "If you want to be saved, just invite Jesus into your heart."
- "When you miss opportunity to share Christ

- with someone, it's your fault if that person goes to hell."
- 4. "If you come to Me (God), I want either all of your life or none of it."
- "If you're not willing to confess Christ publicly, you cannot be saved."

I assure you, these five are so rampant that you could easily give a 30-minute message discussing each one.

Most unfortunately of all, every single one of them in some way adversely affects our outreach to non-Christians. Below, the first two are dealt with this month, and the others will follow (DV) in the June and August editions.

1. "If you don't know the date you were saved, then you are not saved."

Unfortunately, evangelists have been the worst at propagating this first misconception. The fact is, there is a split-second when a person goes from darkness into light. After recognizing you're a sinner and that Christ died for you and rose again, you place your trust in Him alone as your only way to heaven.

However, just because you don't know when that particular splitsecond was doesn't mean you aren't saved. When Scripture gives ≥16 assurance of salvation, it doesn't go back to a date or a moment; it goes back to a fact. Who are you trusting right now? If you're trusting Christ alone as your only way to heaven, you are saved, regardless of when you crossed the line. After all, John 3:16 does not say, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, and whoever believes in Him and knows the date should not perish but have everlasting life."

This idea is critical, because if a person buys into this misconception, it's a tremendous hindrance to their outreach for Christ. How can I talk to someone else about their salvation if I'm not entirely certain of my own?

True, some people come to Christ from a very sudden and dramatic experience, like the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts 8:26-39; he could have easily given you the date. And there's no doubt the same thing was true of Paul the Apostle in Acts 9:1-22, 26-28; I'm sure he not only could have given the date, but he could have testified of the specific hour he trusted the Saviour. But there are those whose conversion is not as dramatic. They may have been raised in a Christian environment, where Christ was spoken about frequently. Certainly at some point of time they came to clearly

understand their sinful condition and trust Christ, but they may not know exactly when the moment occurred.

Minister deeply to your people and free them by telling them that as long as they're trusting Christ alone, they are saved, regardless of when they crossed the line.

2. If you want to be saved, just invite Jesus into your heart.

Well-meaning people often use the phrase "invite Jesus into your heart." They often base this on Revelation 3:20 where we're told, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me."

With the phrase "stand at the door and knock" in mind, many picture the heart as a door where Jesus stands begging us to let Him in. Therefore, the lost are exhorted to "invite Jesus into their heart."

However, that verse is addressed to Christians, not non-Christians. Verse 19 reads, "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten." *Chasten* means "to discipline" and is used of believers, not unbelievers (Hebrews 12:5-6). The passage addresses the church of Laodicea, one of the seven churches of Asia Minor in Revelation 2 and 3. Their wealth at the time had lulled the church into spiritual sleep; Jesus Christ

described this distasteful condition as "lukewarm" and invites them to repent of their condition and make Him the centre of their love and worship.

Additionally, in Revelation 3:20, the Greek translation of *in to* means "toward." In a figurative language, Jesus is saying to Christians He will enter the Church and come "toward" the believer for fellowship. The word *dine* referred to the main meal of the day to which you invite an honoured guest. It was a meal given to hospitality and conversation. Again, the issue is fellowship, not salvation.

Why is this phrase so dangerous to use in evangelism? There are those who "invited Jesus into their heart" and sincerely meant they were trusting Him as their personal Saviour, and they are forever His. However, there are some people who think that by simply saying a prayer in which they "invite Jesus into their heart," they're saved. In this case, their trust is in a prayer, not in a Saviour who died on a cross.

Ninety-eight times in the Gospel of John, the one book whose purpose was to tell us how to receive eternal life (John 20:31), we're told to *believe*. It means "to trust in Christ alone as our only way to heaven." There's nothing wrong

with someone praying to tell God they're trusting Christ alone, but he/she must be aware that saying a prayer doesn't save; it's trusting Christ that saves.

Teach your people to use the right terminology. They should ask lost people to do what the New Testament asks them to do—believe—and this means to trust in Christ alone to save them.

Conclusion

Misconceptions can be damaging and defeating. The above five can be a particular hindrance in our outreach to non-Christians. The result is a confusion of the message, the questioning of our own salvation, and even a lack of boldness in speaking to others about the Lord. Consider giving a series of messages addressing the above things God never said. You may free people up to evangelize—and encourage them to do it out of grace, not guilt.

Can we disciple another person effectively -- remotely?

by a Christian full-time teacher in the USA

Many believers who want to continue to grow in Christ are looking forward to gathering face-to-face with others again, after the Covid-19 situation comes under control. But in fact, I disciple (or mentor) more men outside of my home town in North Carolina, (where I live and teach) than I do when home. Here are some of my reflections about those experiences.

- 1. Many of us who disciple will be forced by our mobile society to consider discipling remotely at some point in time. "Mentees" (the people I mentor) often move. They get distant jobs. God calls them to other places. For many folks, long-gone are the days when they stayed in one area their entire lives. We must be ready to disciple from a distance.
- 2. Almost all of my remote discipling relationships began with at least one face-to-face, in-person meeting. Some of my mentees were my students. I met others while speaking briefly in collegiate conferences. Geographic distance now makes it hard for us to meet in person, but we still meet regularly, remotely.
- 3. Almost all of my remote mentees also have someone closer to their home who walks beside them. Most of the time, it's somebody who attends their local church with them. It's often a pastor or campus ministry director. In any case, I'm not their only mentor—and I think this is ideal.
- 4. Frankly, it's sometimes easier to catch up with someone via phone than it is to meet in person. That's especially

the case in these pandemic days, but it's often the case at other times, too. You can accomplish a lot via a short phone call (in my estimation) more than you can with a text message.

- 5. We still can have honest, hard, needed conversations virtually. I have a concern that it's probably easier to avoid honesty over the internet or phone, but that doesn't mean hard conversations never work. A genuine relationship allows for honesty, no matter the medium.
- 6. We can still talk about Bible passages, discuss sermons, pray, and consider life together. It's different when we're not in church together, or hiking in the woods together, but we still can have the same kinds of conversations.
- 7. What I most miss are the times of doing ministry together in a way that models and encourages others. I miss it because I enjoy my ministry time with these men, but they are getting ministry opportunities where they live. I serve now more as a resource than a guide for them.
- 8. I have the blessing of a ministry that allows me to visit some of my mentees when I'm on the road. I'm grateful, for those times are sweet, indeed—but it's the remote discipling I can do the rest of the time that keeps the discipleship relationship current.

How to Worship in times of Sorrow

Some of the hardest yet most inspiring times of worship occur during funerals. The raw emotions of sadness and loss are mixed with a sense of hope and eternal perspective.

The book of Ecclesiastes says, "It is better to go to a house of mourning than to go to a house of feasting, for death is the destiny of every man; the living should take this to heart" (7:2^{NIV}).

In our fast-paced culture, funerals give us the rare occasion to reflect on the brevity of life and how each of our days are numbered. There is a sense of "coming to terms" with reality that our life on this earth will end. As Christians we find assurance in the promise of God's Word that Jesus Christ did indeed die for the remission of our sins and rose again with the invitation to live forever through Him and with Him.

Songs of worship can be the most encouraging aspect of a funeral service or a time of intense grief. Part of my role as a worship pastor is to show up and "pastor" those who are grieving. Several times last year I was called upon to lead worship during memorial or grave-side services. Silence can be powerful. Stillness consoling. Yet when a simple chorus or hymn begins with a guitar or human voice, you can feel something change in the air. Timely words sung at the right moment can bring a wave of comfort and release His faithful presence.

"Blessed be Your name when the road's marked with suffering, when there's pain in the offering, blessed be Your name." "Open the eyes of my heart Lord, I want to see you." "I can only imagineI will rise when He calls my name, no more sorrow, no more pain." These are just a few of the songs that have served the moment and brought hope to those who have lost loved ones.

Sometimes we aren't sure how to bring comfort in situations where someone is fighting an illness or recovering in some way. Often my wife and I have gone to someone's bedside in the hospital or at their home and simply sung to them. With sensitivity to the moment, we pray for them and ask if they mind if we sing quietly and worship in their room. Some of my most profound moments with God have been during these times as tears flow and faith is released in prayer and song.

Scripture is filled with passages that exemplify praise in the midst of pain, promises of joy as we walk through profound sorrow.

"Why are you so downcast, oh my soul? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise Him, my Saviour and my God," (Psalm 42:5-6a).

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for You are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me ... my cup overflows. Surely goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever." (Psalm 23).

Shortly before a crazed gunman murdered her, Virginia Tech student Lauren McCain wrote in her diary, "Show me Your purpose for me at Tech, and on this earth. But, if You choose not to, I will still praise you and walk where You lead, not because I am selfless, or holy, or determined to sacrifice myself for what is right

but because You are the delight of my heart; and I cannot live without You."

Lord, please give us all that same heart as we seek to console others in their time of mourning. For one day we will wish for someone to sing over us and help us to worship in the midst of our sorrow.

When is it OK to break the Law?

There are times when the laws of man and the law of God are in conflict.

In these turbulent times, there's a lot of talk about whether Christians should be bound by government edicts. Enquiring minds want to know—can we ever break the law in good faith?

Do I HAVE to wear a seat belt or bike helmet?

Do I HAVE to wear a face mask or wash my hands?

I'd suggest that as Christians, our ultimate moral guide is not the law of the land, but God's clear command to love Him, and love our neighbour as we love ourselves.

A few historical examples show that the law is a blunt instrument at best, and sometimes a very poor moral guide.

Think of the things that historically we have decided as a society were perfectly cool and legit at the time. Slavery was lawful. The holocaust was legal. Apartheid was hunky-dory. Segregation was legally sanctioned. Yet all were plainly wrong.

Historically, the most terrible things - war, genocide and slavery - have resulted not from disobedience, but from obedience.

On the other hand, heaps of things that are deemed illegal today, are the right thing for a follower of Jesus to do ... e.g. Protesting against war; Dismantling injustice; Caring for those who are mistreated, such as refugees and asylum seekers.

Pursuing these types of love for our neighbours, may bring us into conflict with the law. Simply put, the law does not dictate our ethics. God does. And as St Augustine said, "An unjust law is no law at all."

Perhaps surprisingly for some, the Bible has examples of clashes over laws laid down by unjust rulers. Here are ten examples of civil disobedience straight from Scripture.

1. Gutsy Grannies: The Case of the Hebrew Midwives. In Exodus 1:15, the vicious old King of Egypt commands the Hebrew midwives, Shiphrah and

Puah, to kill Hebrew babies if they are boys. But, in perhaps the first recorded instance of civil disobedience in all of human literature, these gutsy grannies refuse to obey the king's edict. "The midwives feared God; they did not do as the king of Egypt commanded them, but they let the boys live."

- 2. Feisty Fighters: The Case of Saul's Unjust Edict. In 1 Samuel chapter 14, King Saul decides that everyone will have a compulsory fast for the day. Unfortunately, Jonathan doesn't hear about the new law, and he tucks into a yummy honeycomb that he finds in the forest. Saul is incensed and puts a bounty on Jonathan's head. Luckily Saul's soldiers recognize that this is unjust and refuse to comply. Jonathan lives to see another day!
- 3. Gutsy Queen No. 1: Vashti and her refusal to be Objectified. King Ahasuerus goes on a bender for seven days-stuffing his face with food and drink and carousing with his friends. In a drunken stupor, the King demands that Queen Vashti come and show off her body, wearing nothing much beyond her royal crown. Vashti is shocked, and outright refuses his unreasonable edict. Of course, the king is very upset! "According to law, what must be done to Queen Vashti?" he asks (Esther 1:15). Ultimately she pays a high price for her civil disobedience. The king strips Vashti of her royal position and banishes her from his presence, possibly ordering her killed.
- 4. Gutsy Queen No. 2: Esther and her Kairos moment. After Vashti

- is banished, Esther becomes queen. Luckily she's got courage as well. Her mentor Mordecai is very troubled to hear about a new law calling for the destruction of the Jews in that country. He asks Esther to intervene with the king. But unfortunately, approaching the king without an invitation is against the law of the land. Esther decides to intervene in this great injustice anyway, saying, "Then I shall go to the king, though it is contrary to the law; and if I am to perish, I shall perish" (4:16).
- 5. Fearless Friends: The Case of the Golden Statue. In Daniel 3, King Nebuchadnezzar (notice a pattern of tyrant kings here?) erects a massive golden statue for everyone to bow down to. An edict goes out that when the bell rings, everyone must bow down and worship the king's image. Of course we know the story from Sunday School, three courageous buddies, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, refuse and get tossed into the fire for their efforts.
- 6. Daring Daniel: The Case of Outlawed Prayer. In Daniel 6, King Darius puts out a tough new law stating that no-one can pray to anyone other than the king for 30 days. Daniel says, No way! He openly flaunts the new rule by praying in his bedroom with the windows open for all to see, and ends up being tossed into the lions' den for his troubles.
- 7. Cunning Gurus: The Case of the Foreigners who will not comply. The first to practice civil disobedience in the New Testament are the foreign Wise>26

Men who come to worship Jesus. King Herod commands them to return and tell him where Jesus is located (so he can have Jesus "taken out"). But they ignore this order and return home via a different highway. It's interesting to note that these men were rich and powerful, carrying a lot of stuff. They wouldn't have been travelling alone. So perhaps these foreigners also led the first act of mass civil disobedience?

- 8. Heroic Preachers: The Case of Outlawed Speech. In Acts 4, Peter and John are commanded to stop preaching the gospel. It seems their efforts to speak of an upside-down kingdom, which will be good news for the poor and bad news for the rich and powerful are "treading on some toes". They keep speaking of Jesus, and ultimately in Acts 5 they end up being thrown in prison.
- 9. Audacious Apostle: The Case of a Muzzled Missionary. Christians will sometimes quote Romans 13 to demonstrate why we should obey the law of the land. However, this passage asks us to submit to the government, not obey the government. These are two different things, as I have written here. In fact, the author of Romans, Paul, defied the civil authorities, was arrested for preaching the good news, and witnessed to the guards while he was in jail (Acts 16:16–40).
- 10. Jesus: our Ultimate Guide and Role Model. Finally, and most importantly, we have the example of Jesus.

Born in the middle of an oppressive Roman Empire, even the words used to announce his birth were considered provocative, to say the least (Luke 2:10–11). By adopting language usually used to announce a new Emperor, the angels 'illegally' claimed that Jesus, not Caesar, was the true King, responsible for bringing peace and justice to the earth.

The very first public act of Jesus and the disciples was to break the law of the land by picking grain on the Sabbath (Mark 2:23). This was just the first of many provocative, rule-breaking actions.

Ultimately, Jesus was executed as a rebel by the 'establishment', who found Him too great a threat. The God of the entire universe chose to be killed as a criminal on a cross, between two felons. It was the ultimate act of subversive love and vulnerability. That one beautiful act changed literally everything. So, how then should we live?

We follow a 'subversive' Jesus and a host of 'feisty' saints. Jesus commanded us to follow God's law first and foremost—to love God above all else. And the litmus test of that love for God, is whether we love our neighbours (as ourselves). And the litmus test of whether we love our neighbours, is whether we love our enemies.

Man's law cannot dictate our ethics. There will be times when it is designed to stop us from pursuing God and His law of love. Then we each will have a choice to make!

The Problem of Good: When the World Seems Fine without God. Edited by D. Marion Clark

With the increasing attention it is receiving the doctrine of "common grace" seems to be coming of age in our day. It's a delightful doctrine, reminding us that despite human sin God's purpose to bless His creation has not been repealed. It points us to the many displays of His kindness to all humanity, even unbelievers indeed, even through and by means of unbelievers. It calls us to see that God provides generously both for the just and the unjust. It reminds us that unbelievers also are God's imagebearers, that however that image may be defaced it is not erased, and that we should not be surprised to see unbelievers carrying out the creation mandate in marvellous ways to the good of humanity generally. And once we've said that much it very quickly becomes evident that the doctrine deserves exploration and the effort to trace God's "common" goodness in places we may not yet have noticed. This is the purpose of this little volume.

The book is a team effort, each contributor addressing some aspect of common grace. The opening chapters give the book its strength, providing the theological framework for what follows. Steve Lawson surveys the impressive array of means by which God, according to Scripture, restrains sin in humanity. And Sean Michael Lucas takes the positive side of the doctrine, surveying God's bestowal of good and His continued care for

all of humanity, including unbelievers - indeed, even through unbelievers. These two chapters are worth the price of the book.

The following chapters apply the doctrine of common grace with reference to worship (D. Marion Clark), gospel witness (John Leonard), loving our neighbours (Ruth Floyd), living in the world (David Skeel), learning from the world (Gene Edward Veith), and even taking pleasure in the world (Paul Tripp). Clark concludes with some reflections on the question of "good" people perishing in hell.

A recurring theme is the reminder that we should not hesitate to embrace and appreciate the goodness displayed and provided by God through unbelievers. Whatever their motivations and even though their hearts may not be given to the service and glory of God, there is goodness to be appreciated nonetheless - goodness from God in common grace. Unbelievers are not as evil as they could possibly be, and despite their heart of unbelief they often excel in activities that promote human flourishing. Observing all this ought to occasion praise - God's grace is more extensive than we generally take time to notice.

Given the title - The Problem of Good - we might expect some tracking of the implications of "goodness" for apologetics. As Ryken hints in his excellent Foreword, the so-called problem of evil so often brought>28

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against Christianity is matched by the problem of good. Where does all this "good" come from? On what ground can we account for the category? What naturalistic assumptions can account for the soul and its enjoyment of spiritual pleasures? And we also might have expected a chapter addressing Christians who are sometimes puzzled by the bad things that happen to good people, and providing some re-directing of our minds to consider the much bigger question of why so many good things happen

to bad people. Despite its title, the book does not track these lines of thought. However, as the subtitle (When the world seems fine without God) anticipates, it does direct us to see God at work in ways we might otherwise have overlooked.

We would all do well to notice the pervasive goodness and kindness of God throughout His creation, and The Problem of Good is an enjoyable guide in that pursuit. It is a helpful introduction to the doctrine of common grace.
