Brad has also been involved with SRE Accreditation Training at many places in NSW to help ensure we as a church network conform to the latest requirements for SRE in the public schools. It's become apparent some of our churches are doing this without having Green Cards which is illegal. The Green Card lasts for 3 years and then needs to be renewed.

The DET asks us to sign an official document each year ensuring that all our SRE teachers meet their minimum standards which include, Child Protection, Working with Children checks and teaching from an approved curriculum. Please contact Brad if you have questions about this.

The mundane amidst the sublime! Our team, partnering with local churches on the Gold Coast, have been meeting with schoolies for several days. The teams at Lorne and Philip Island Victoria are beginning today. The team at Byron Bay on NSW North Coast is launching on the weekend. Mobilising 160 students to multiple locations around the country has been a monumental task, but I look forward to sharing with you the exciting stories of what God does through them.

'Dare to Be a Daniel' youth camp at Yarramundi



The Billy Graham Evangelistic Association's (BGEA) first, five-day 'Dare to Be a Daniel' camp in Australia, held recently at Lutanda's Camp Site at Yarramundi, was attended by sixty young Australians aged nine to thirteen. They had come to learn how to 'Dare to Be a Daniel', a reference to Daniel in the Old Testament who stood up for his faith, despite being in exile in a foreign land. Chad Miller, Director, Children's and Youth Evangelism Training for BGEA International, visited Australia to attend the camp.

"We witnessed a mighty move of God on the last evening as nearly everyone stood and committed to following Jesus, even when times are difficult, so that they might win their friends and family to Him. It was not an easy invitation," Chad said.

Chad went on to say, "Pray for a groundswell of evangelistic enthusiasm and that these young people might be strong and boldly speak about Jesus to their generation."

Rodney Trinidad, BGEA Australia's Youth and Schools Relationship Manager, ran the camp with the help of trained volunteers and Lutanda

Yarramundi camp staff. "Who better than youth to reach their friends with the Gospel of Jesus? That's what the 'Dare to Be a Daniel' camp is all about," Rodney said.

"Our goal was to equip youth, who already know Christ, with the tools they need to stand strong as young Christians and to effectively share their faith with their friends," he said.

"I will never forget Jiordi, a 12 year old student standing up and saying: 'For a long time, I have been bullied at school and it's been really hard on me. I met new friends at camp who will stand with me by praying for me. I have also learned that, like Daniel, I can be a fearless Christian, knowing that God is always on my side,'" Rodney said.

"Our vision is for the 'Dare to Be a Daniel' experience to spread throughout Australia in partnership between the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association and the local churches. It is critically important that we equip this nation's young people for Christ as they approach their teenage years in an increasingly secularised society," said Jorge Rodrigues, Executive Director of BGEA Australia.

Should Christians celebrate Christmas?

My personal response to this question is that of a hearty YES! My reason is that it is a great annual and public remembrance of this world's most important event of mankind when the Mighty Creator became a perfect human-being for the first time.

He did appear several times in the Old Testament – these are called Theophanies or Christophanies. But this time "veiled in flesh, the Godhead see; Hail the Incarnate Deity!" My heart jumps with joy for "the Desire of the nations has come." Surely we should rejoice with the angelic host in praising God for His unspeakable (inexpressible, inestimable, indescribable, incomparable, beyond words) Gift! Even if it is difficult to properly translate this Gift!

BUT...BUT...BUT, some might say:-

1. Christmas is not a command to observe. But do we really need to be commanded? Cannot we respond with appreciation from our hearts and with jubilation? Remember when Queen Esther saved the Jewish massacre as recorded in the historical Book, where God is not even mentioned, and how that particular day was celebrated and became an annual Festival. There was NO instruction from God for observing that day. But the amazing truth is that our Lord Jesus joined the nation of Israel in celebrating it!!

Then, there is the clear instruction that we are "not to judge in respect to an holy day" or, as translated by the TCNT*, "in the matter of annual or monthly or weekly

festivals" (Colossians 2:16). Furthermore it is strongly taught in Romans 14:4 onwards that "he regardeth the day unto the Lord" and that "every man be fully persuaded in his own mind." While the subject in that verse may be the Sabbath, the principle does apply in a broader sense.

or 2. The original "Christmas" was actually a pagan festival. So in effect we are to consider a proper "Replacement Theology!" Praise God for the mighty transformation. People were delivered from SUN worship to SON worship! This is evidence of true conversion. Funnily enough this pagan belief is propagated by well-meaning Christians who are writing articles on those false gods! It is very wrong to accuse Christians of following pagan practices where the Lord Jesus is being exalted as the Saviour of the world. Celebrations with Father Christmas. Christmas trees, giving of gifts and feasting all have new applications.

or 3. It is too commercialized!

Certainly it is. But the glorious Gospel of our Lord is blazed abroad. Read the messages on Christmas Cards. See the pictures depicting the wonderful birth of our Lord. The Gospel narratives are being read by millions throughout the world in many languages. Christmas carols in parks and in churches, Christmas Plays etc clearly herald the true Christmas message of the Saviour who is Christ the Lord. His virgin birth; His true humanity and deity; the purpose of His birth to be the Saviour; the fulfilment of prophecies supporting the inspiration of Holy Scripture; and His

return, are some of the precious truths being proclaimed. Let us then rejoice with the apostle Paul that the Gospel is being preached irrespective of the motives of people; Philippians 1:18.

Praise the Lord for the opportunities presented to the Church Universal at this Christmas season to proclaim the "REASON for this season". Modern technology will be advancing the glorious message worldwide.

Christmas means so much to those in hospitals, to the poor and needy, to children in various circumstances, to the lonely, to the Armed Forces, all places where Christians are actively involved to bring love and cheer with their gifts. There is no doubt that the spirit of giving and reaching out in compassion is an outflow from the Greatest Giver Himself. Truly there is "joy to the world, the Lord has come."

May my simple article deliver some people from uncertainty and negativity to join with the many who celebrate Christmas with great joy and thankfulness for the Saviour who is Christ the Lord.

Nicodemus – a Pharisee who came to Jesus

This is the fourth in a series of six Pen Portraits which Mr Stormer has written about people mentioned in John's Gospel. The first was published in the June 2012 issue of this magazine.

Who was

The apostle John wrote about Nicodemus on three occasions.

In John 3 he is a man in the dark. In John 7:50 he appears as a man in the shadows. At the time the Lord died we see him as a man who comes into the open.

When we think of Nicodemus we think immediately of the visit to Jesus by night. John records the visit in these words: "Now there was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews. This man came to Jesus by night and said

to him,

'Rabbi, we know that vou are a teacher come from God, for no one can do these signs that you do unless God is with him."

Immediately prior to telling the story of Nicodemus John comments that many people were interested in Jesus because they saw the signs he was doing (2:23). Jesus did not entrust himself to people who were looking for no more than displays of miraculous power. Was Nicodemus one of these people? Probably not. The word translated 'now' sometimes has the force of 'but'. Jesus did not entrust himself to certain people, but (or, on the other hand) there was Nicodemus. Jesus saw that there was something deeper in this Pharisee. The effect that the signs had on Nico-

demus was to make him realise that behind the signs there was a teacher who had come from God. No one could perform the signs Jesus was doing unless God were with him.

Who was Nicodemus? He was a man of the Pharisees and therefore was an upright man, a citizen of good standing in the community. We're told that he was a ruler of the Jews; he was a member of the Sanhedrin. Jesus also referred to him as the teacher of Israel, an indication that he had a

> recognised and important role in teaching the Law to Israel.

> Nicodemus came to Jesus by night. Why? As a teacher in Israel (or probably, "the"

Nicodemus? 9 teacher in Israel) it is possible that

he was too busy to come during the day. On the other hand there are indications that the rabbis did much of their study and debating in the evenings. Others suggest he did not want fellow Pharisees to know what he was doing, so he came "secretly".

We don't know his motives; in the end they were not of vital importance. The Lord did not change his message to suit the visitor; the teacher in Israel still needed to learn he had to be born again to enter the kingdom of heaven.

What was the Lord's message to Nicodemus? First, he had to be born ≥16 again, or born from above, in order to enter the kingdom of God. Nicodemus would certainly not have been expecting a message like that and he immediately had difficulty in understanding it. For him, entry into the kingdom of God came through faithfully keeping the law. As a Pharisee, an upright man, a citizen of good standing and as a member of the Sanhedrin, he would have had no doubt that he was well qualified to enter the kingdom. But the Lord said he needed to be born again.

To Nicodemus' credit, he didn't

argue that he was morally fit for the kingdom even though he had difficulty understanding Jesus' message. But his reaction to the Lord's message was no different from that of

thousands of others since. He tried to understand spiritual truths in physical terms. How, he asked, can a man enter his mother's womb in order to be born a second time?

This brought the Lord to the second part of His message. He carefully explained that He was speaking of spiritual matters. One had to be born of water and spirit in order to enter the kingdom of God. Since Nicodemus should have understood what the Lord was referring to, the meaning of this disputed metaphor must be found in the Old Testament Scriptures.

Passages like Ezekiel 36:25-27 suggest the need for cleansing from impurity (water as a symbol for cleansing from impurity is common in the Old Testament) linked with having a new heart and a new spirit – the regenerating work of the Spirit of God.

In the same way that human beings give birth to human beings (that which is born of the flesh is flesh) so the Spirit, and only the Spirit, gives birth to spirit. Being born of water and spirit is the equivalent of being born again or being born from

above. And all this is a process which we do not understand. In the same way that we can hear the sound of the wind and yet not know the full extent of all that is involved, so those who have only

experienced human birth cannot understand the effects of the work and operations of the Spirit.

Nicodemus was puzzled by all this. Some even suggest that he was sceptical. "How can this happen?" His question was met by another. In effect, the Lord asked "How is it that you don't understand?" Nicodemus' standing as a recognised teacher did not give him the insight needed to grasp spiritual truth. He didn't even receive Jesus' testimony when he spoke about the things he had seen. And since they (Nicodemus and his fellow Jews) couldn't believe

the earthly things about which Jesus was speaking, it was highly unlikely that they would believe heavenly things. If they couldn't understand the necessity of being born again while on earth in order to enter the kingdom of God, how could they appreciate the truths that relate to the coming kingdom when the kingdom is realised in all its glorious magnificence?

So we come to the crux of the third part of Jesus' message – the importance of faith. No one has ascended into heaven to appreciate the coming beauties of the kingdom ex-

cept the one who came from there – Son of Man. Eternal life will depend on the Son of Man being lifted up in a manner similar to the way that Moses lifted up the serpent in the

wilderness. Then all who believe in the Son of Man will receive eternal life. Faith is what makes the new birth a reality.

Did Nicodemus believe the message that he heard? At that time? It is very doubtful that he believed that evening but his subsequent actions indicate that he did come to faith in the Lord Jesus.

The second time we read about Nicodemus he comes out of the dark into the shadows. The chief priests and the Pharisees had sent some of the temple guards to arrest Jesus. They returned to their bosses emptyhanded. They had been so impressed with the Lord's words that they didn't arrest Him. They reported that "no one ever spoke the way this man does".

When some of the Pharisees condemned the guards for being so gullible Nicodemus asked "Does our law condemn a man without first hearing what he has to say?" Though he did not openly acknowledge the claims of Jesus of Nazareth, he risked the wrath of his fellow Pharisees. In abusive terms they asked if he too were from Galilee for "a prophet does not come out of Galilee". Their hatred

of Jesus blinded them to the truth that occasionally a prophet did come from Galilee. Or had they not realised that Jonah came from there?

The third time we read

about Nicodemus he's more openly a follower of Jesus Christ. When the Lord's body was taken down from the cross, Nicodemus was with Joseph of Arimathea helping him to prepare the body for burial. Now; we may think this would not have been a very difficult thing to do. But it did require great courage. The chief priests and the Pharisees knew where the body of Jesus had been buried – they arranged for soldiers to guard the tomb. They would have known whose tomb was used and therefore they knew who was involved. The actions of Joseph and Nicodemus can only mean that >18

they were secret disciples no longer; they were now proclaiming their allegiance to Jesus of Nazareth. And it would not have been easy to align oneself with a man who had been crucified as a criminal.

What do we learn? There are two important lessons. First, the way of salvation is not grasped by the natural man. He fails to see the necessity of the new birth. He can only think in terms of human experience; he fails to grasp spiritual realities. But unless he comes to faith in Jesus Christ – unless he is born from above – he cannot enter the kingdom of God.

Second, it is important that we come out of the shadows and proclaim our loyalty to Christ. Many of us can empathise with Nicodemus. We know from experience that it's not easy to take a firm stand. Yet a time comes when we must stand and be counted. God worked in Nicodemus so that others clearly knew where he stood. God works in us too, strengthening us to be bold for Him. We also need to encourage those who, because of natural reticence, find it difficult to talk about their faith. Perhaps, we need to give expression to our faith by means of our deeds. This is just what Nicodemus finally did when he assisted in the burial of the Lord Jesus - he showed his faith and his love by what he did.

And there are ways in which **each one of us** can "spur one another on toward love and good deeds" (Hebrews 10:24).

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Dr Victor Wilson has written this 160 page, A4 sized, book (with easy-to-see print) in which he traces the subject of Almsgiving generally from a Christian point of view based on the prominence given to this subject both in the Old and New Testaments of the Bible.

His book covers from very early days, the caring of the elderly, the sick and the infirm in the home situation, and then progressing onto institutional facilities even as far back as one thousand years ago. The narrative continues up to the present in the Western World, especially in the British Isles with the appearance and maintenance of Almshouses. Dr Wilson then continues the subject in the Sydney (Australia) scene from the early Colonial days and on through the intervening years, dealing with the evolution of the Care of the Aged in the context of the Assemblies of Christians commonly known as Open Brethren, with the establishment of BETHSHEAN, New South Wales Home FOR AGED CHRISTIANS, at 67 Floss Street, Hurlstone Park, in November 1949.

Finally, Dr Wilson describes how, in order to satisfy accreditation standards, as changes inevit-

ably developed in the Aged Care scene, and to fulfil the completion of Elouera Gardens Retirement Village, Bethshean was relocated in 1999 to a new facility built on large sunny acreage set aside thirty years previously in Cherrybrook. This book is dedicated to the brothers and sisters in Christ who have given of their talents, treasures, and time in the spirit of true Alms Giving for the purpose of providing Spiritual, Physical, Mental Comfort and Happiness to those in the twilight vears of their lives.

I was working in my study when I heard our clock that is a family heir-loom, and is over 100 years-old, strike the hour of three. This signalled a coffee break.

I had just begun to enjoy my caffeine hit when someone knocked on our front door. When I opened the door I was delighted to see one of my younger grandsons standing there.

It just happened that I was wearing a short sleeve shirt and I noticed that his eyes were transfixed upon the tattoo on my right forearm. He raised his eyes and looking straight into

mine said, "Awesome Pop, you're real cool." He was referring to the obvious obsession of the younger generation with having the greater part of their bodies

covered with this ancient pagan art form.

The object that attracted his attention was a small 6cm x 6cm green, red and black tattoo on my arm. His interest stirred my memory to a day many years ago when I went to a Tattoo Parlour in King Street, Sydenham, and had the tattoo indelibly etched into my arm.

It was a Saturday afternoon and by 2pm I was, with a friend of mine, anything but sober.

He made the suggestion that we should catch a tram to Sydenham and get a Tattoo.

When we arrived there we picked out the design that we wanted from a

large folder of different options. The cost of our choice was 7 shillings and 6 pence, or 75 cents.

Just on that point, recently I was waiting in a line to purchase a newspaper that I like to read each day just to keep up with things. There was a young man standing behind me and I noticed that he had both arms covered with Tattoos. Out of curiosity I asked him how much they cost. He replied \$6,000 and they were not yet completed. I mentioned that mine cost me just 75 cents!

The actual tattooing was anything

but a pleasant experience. From memory there was something like 20 needles going into my arm driven by an electric vibrator. After a day or so, the

entire wound scabs up and is rather sore. I might say that the operator never once asked us if we'd reached the mandatory age of 18. In point of fact we were only 17. However the greater pain was yet to come.

I arrived home and announced to my mother that I had just been tattooed. To say the least, she was anything but happy with me! She made me promise that I would never get another. Her anger was slightly appeased when I told her that it was her name that I had placed on my arm, and not a girlfriend's name, past or present.

Just a thought about hygiene: When I was twenty-three and married, we ➤

were on holidays at Forster when I developed a painful infection called Prostatitis. It was so painful that I went to a local doctor. When I explained to him the problem he noticed my tattoo, which prompted him to ask me a rather embarrassing question. He asked, "Have you ever had VD"? I indignantly replied that I most certainly had not.

He explained the reason for his question. Prostatitis can be a consequence of several types of venereal diseases. Then he went on to explain, that sailors are renowned for being

carriers of this disease; they are also fond of tattoos. They come into a parlour and get a tattoo, then they walk out and you walk in, and the operator uses the same machine and needles on you that

he used on him. He explained that this was a common cause of these diseases.

There are some things in my life that I regret. One of them is the day that while half drunk I got that tattoo on my arm. I am so embarrassed about it now that I always wear a long-sleeved shirt when I am involved in ministry for the Lord.

With the life-changing experience of being Born Again behind me, my knowledge of the Bible has grown exponentially. So I thought that I should see if the Bible offered any advice about tattooing your body. I wasn't surprised to find that it did have something to say. The verse that came readily to mind was:-

Leviticus 19:28 (RSV)

"You shall not make any cuttings in your flesh on account of the dead, or tattoo any marks upon you: I am the LORD."

This verse appears to forbid God's people to be tattooed. Some wise person once said that a text taken out of its context becomes a pretext. So what was the context in which this verse appears? God was forbid-

ding His people from copying the cultural practices of their pagan neighbours.

While the specific things mentioned no longer have the same cultural significance they did at the time of writing, however, the

practice of doing the things that the pagans by nature do, are still forbidden for the Believer.

I also noticed that in Genesis we are told that we were made in God's image.

Genesis 1:27 (NIV) "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them."

I wonder if our God and Father would be happy with His image being marked by tattoos?

Then again, we are reminded in Paul's message to the Corinthians ≥24

6 ... this was a

these diseases. 9

that our bodies are the Temple of the Holy Spirit.

1 Corinthians 6:19 (NIV)

"Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own;"

I ask myself the question, "Would the Holy Sprit like His temple to be covered with tattooist's ink graffiti"? Then, to the tattoo enthusiast I would suggest that you leave room on your foreheads and hands to make room for the Tattoo of the number of the Beast, the Antichrist. In conclusion, if you were to ask me if it is OK or not for you to have tattoos on your body, I think that my reply would be – "If I could roll back the hands-of-time and I had the opportunity to say 'Yes' or 'No' to my tattoo, – because of my Christian faith – I would say "No".

Remember -

tattoos are like spouses; they are yours until 'death do you part.'

When Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane before He went to the cross, He was in emotional agony. He moved away from His disciples and prayed alone. He also asked His followers to pray for Him. When He came back to them, they were asleep. He challenged them with the words "Watch and pray."

In the June 2012 issue (page 30) of Uplook Magazine (PDF version) Crawford Paul wrote a brief article about **Using Social Video to Reach the Lost.** The following is an extract:-

"According to its own statistics, YouTube has 800 million unique users who visit every month. Over three billion videos are viewed every single day! More video is uploaded to YouTube in one month than the three major US networks have created in 60 years! Those numbers only refer to YouTube and don't include other video hosting sites. Video is one of the best ways to share information. It provides the opportunity to reach millions through a medium that grabs

the heart of the viewer.

"One question that I hear is, "Isn't video expensive and hard to do?" When it comes to professional video production, that might be true, but it's not true of social video.
