In the coming weeks please remember in prayer and in practical ways those who have been affected by the terrible Bush Fires experienced in NSW during recent months.

Please also remember all those affected by the terrible typhoon in the Philippines in November.

Please pray for Don & Gae Fleming, who live in Brisbane but are also well known in NSW because of their previous missionary work, starting in Bangkok, Thailand, and then in recent years by their operation of Bridgeway Publications.

We know that Gae has been unwell for many years. In May this year, Don wrote that the time had come when they must move to a retirement village with good care facilities for his increasingly frail wife. "I have for some time been Gae's full-time carer and I am no longer able to make any interstate visits, or in fact visits anywhere that require me to be away at nights."

In November, Don shared that he has a carcinoma at the junction of his stomach and oesophagus. He has started a 3-stage chemo treatment, after which there will be surgery, sometime in the new year. The tumour is in a particularly difficult place, which will necessitate more surgery than might otherwise be expected. His general good health and exercise regime are in his favour, but he welcomes our prayers of course.

On each table there was a gift for everyone – a cleverly crafted envelope decorated with a teacup, embroidered with painted flowers and mini pearls – and inside a tea bag! All purple of course except for the tea which was all different flavours. These special touches add to the evenings.

Dawn Scott interviewed Julie Loudon at Kings Park, and suggested she could have her own "Getaway" show. Julie was quick to point out that it wouldn't be five star accommodation! At Oatley Julie was introduced by her sister, Faye, with an entertaining and enlightening slide show!!

Julie gave a meaningful update on the extensive work she and Noela Elvery have been so influential in developing. We heard of travel problems landing at a burnt-out Nairobi airport, and how they were prevented from entering the Democratic Republic of Congo because they were unable to get a visa, and of God's answers to prayer.

It was wonderful to see the church in Rendille country with so many people attending. It was started as a result of audio recordings and because people prayed. It was also great to hear that a 100 year old lady has prayed every day for the safety of a Congolese doctor who was taken by rebels – and that

now news has been received that he is alive.

In particular, Julie updated us on the Ituri Forest pygmies telling of the two schools that have been started on either side of the river and the joy the pygmies have in owning their own land and harvesting crops. What a thrill to hear of many pygmies being baptised. Julie also spoke about the Manzali School and the work of Acira and Berocan in this very unsettled area of the DRC. The DR of Congo situation is distressing and she believes the love of Jesus can transform the Congo. Please pray for this country.

Tamara Filmer, working in Nepal, looked the part in her Nepalese outfit. She has two little girls, Jasmine and Mikayla, and husband Leigh. It was a surprise to realise she is Paul Kulikovsky's niece. (Paul and Gerrah work on the island of Samar, Philippines, and thankfully survived the recent typhoon tragedy which destroyed their home, church and buildings.)

Tamara works as a Pharmacist Advisor and gave us a glimpse into a day in her life in Nepal. She travels everywhere by bicycle and has become

skilled at riding as she dodges potholes, crowds and buffalos – usually with one daughter as a pillion passenger and the other strapped to her back. Tamara drops her girls at school then heads to the hospital where she is working. She is learning the Nepalese language – each day she writes down new words she has heard in order to memorise them.

Tamara and her family try to live and eat like the Nepalese so they can integrate more into the culture and their neighbourhood. She mentioned that Nepal is the fastest growing church and there is an explosion of church planting. There is need for Bible based teaching and discipling. Tamara, Leigh and daughters plan to return to Nepal next year.

David - A Team Player

I don't think that we Aussies could take exception to anyone who said that as a nation we are sports crazy. Just cast your mind back to the time of madness when we hosted the Olympic Games. To me the Olympic Games became the Olympic pains.

In my lifetime I played a number of sports in the top grade. I think the ones that I enjoyed the most of all were the team sports. There is an old sporting adage that goes something like this.

"A champion team will always beat a team of champions." I once played basketball with a team of champions,

but we did not play well together as a team. We had some notable wins but we did not win the competition.

I want to talk about a favourite character of mine, King David. The

thing I like about him perhaps more than anything else is that he was a "Team player".

Even in the defeat of Goliath he acknowledged that it was a team effort, it was God and him. But my main interest in this article is his relationship to his team.

He was wise enough to realise that the best way to succeed in almost anything you wish to accomplish is to be part of a good team. So he developed the concept of a champion team. Rather than a team of champions. And as such they were almost invincible.

I love the incident at Ziglag, on that occasion there were those who were

on the cutting edge of the battle, in the thick and thin of it. And there were those who stayed with the stuff.

At the conclusion of the battle there were those amongst the fighting men who complained at David's plan for the sharing of the booty. They said that the noncombatants should not share in the spoils of the battle.

But what did David the team player say? "The share of the man who stayed with the supplies is to be the same as that of him who went down to the battle. All will share alike."

It has pleased God to call some

to be on the cutting edge of things. To do the preaching and the teaching. To evangelise, to nurture, to plant churches and so on.

And it has pleased God to call others to

mind the stuff. To do the organising, to sell books, to wrap parcels, to type letters etc. But in that day when the King we serve distributes the spoils of the battle what will He say? I think it will be much the same as what David said. "All will share alike."

To reinforce the concept of a team effort let me remind you of another incident in the life of David.

Things began to turn sour between Saul and David. King Saul, who appeared to be suffering from paranoia, pursued him relentlessly. Perhaps the nadir of David's life was when he hid from Saul and his enemies in the cave of Adullam.

While he was there his team was with him. It was comprised of his family and friends, and they appeared to be a rather motley lot – all that were despondent, distressed, depressed, in debt and destitute. But they were his team and they stuck with him in his hour of need.

Later on when David was crowned King and extolled and honoured by all, he gathered around him his family and friends to share in his glory. It was the same motley lot that was with him in the cave of Adullam.

We often sing the words of James McGranahan's hymn:-

"Our Lord is oft rejected and by the world disowned,

By the many still neglected and by the few enthroned;

But soon He'll come in glory! The hour is drawing nigh,

For the crowning day is coming by and by."

We who have been the team who identified with Him in His rejection will be the team who will share His glory!

Youth Worker opportunity at Cumberland High

High school students are faced with many issues (loneliness, depression, broken families, abuse, bullying, friendship issues, eating disorders, just to name a few) as they seek to work out who they are and where they belong in the world. They are looking for something to fill the void/answer their questions/take their pain and unfortunately most of them look to the world and its answers (drugs, alcohol, sexual relationships, pornography), which are not really answers at all.

Hi, our names are Brendon and Sarah Walker, and we are really excited that I (Brendon) have the opportunity to go into Cumberland High School and build relationships with the students and staff there so that they will know about another option - that they can drink from the water of life (Jesus Christ) and that only He can fill their need. This position presents amazing opportunities to show Jesus to many high school students who otherwise wouldn't know Him.

Fact: 10 to 18 year-olds are 80% more likely to engage in a relationship with Jesus than at any other stage in their life.

Fact: By law it is compulsory for every child in Australia to attend school (or be registered for home schooling)

Therefore as Christians, it makes sense to be showing Jesus' love in school communities around the country.

We both attend West Pennant Hills Community Church (WPHCC) where I've been the Youth Pastor for four

years. We have recently joined Youth Ministries Australia (YMA), which is an arm of Campus Crusade for Christ, Australia, in order to join in the schools ministry which



seeks to see a transformation in every school community.

Cumberland High has accepted Brendon for the position of Youth Worker, two days per week, beginning in January 2014, so that he is ready for the beginning of the school year. The remaining three days, he will continue as Youth Pastor at WPHCC.

However, because Campus Crusade for Christ Australia, like many other mission organisations, does not have a central fund to pay its workers, we first need to develop a team of people who are committed to financially and prayerfully supporting us so that we can begin this new ministry. It's been some time since I have written to update you on my work.

Thanks to all who contributed in the past to my support through the Home Workers Fund. Over the years it was very much appreciated. With recent changes to the Ministry Fund I no longer receive financial support but I really value your prayer support. I am so encouraged when people tell me they have been praying for me. One lady at Church prays every Wednesday while I am at Scripture and that is as valuable as my teaching, actually probably more valuable.

I continue to teach eight classes a week, five on a Wednesday and three on a Friday. The classes vary in size – some have 15 children and others have 28, so in all a total of over 160 children a week. What a privilege and responsibility. The children are listening and, I trust and pray, soaking up God's Word. One young lad moved in two doors down from me with his mother and sister. His sister does not attend SRE, but he decided to go to SRE classes. Pray for him, I have been privileged to teach him for three years now and he asks questions and knows what it means to trust Jesus. He is one of many children that need to really understand and trust the Lord. So please pray.

It's often hard keeping up with new technology and the different ways children enjoy learning today. Please pray for me in these areas.



A young lady turned up at one school as a replacement SRE teacher. What a thrill to realise not only had I taught her SRE but she had come to Holiday Bible Clubs and Girls Rally at our Church. Her family were not Christians. She has gone on for the Lord, attends another church and is teaching SRE along with me at a School.

I am still excited over teachers who are in the classrooms, who listen and who I can have an input in their lives, whether by chatting, going out for a meal or just giving a hug when they are going through hard times.

I am still involved in Kids Club at Church and the children love coming. They are regularly enjoying fun together and growing in their faith.

We are having an interesting time with our neighbours at the moment and would value prayer for them and for both Julie and myself as we relate to them. One wants to go to Congo with Julie, one is the family I talked about already whose son is in my SRE Class, one has had a miraculous conversion and needs encouragement, and the Chinese neighbours treat us as family. How we would love for them all to be following Jesus.

Thanks for being able to share all this with you and please keep praying.

Last Friday, Student Life at Macquarie Uni was recognised for making an "Outstanding Contribution to University Life".
Our student leaders got all dressed up and headed off to the award ceremony held by the University.



One student club from each of four categories of clubs (including sporting clubs) was recognised. Student Life was presented the award in the "Religious Club" category. Clubs had to be nominated and we didn't nominate ourselves!

This award is a recognition of the hard work our team of missionaries and students puts into ministry on campus day in and day out. The profile activities that attracted attention - the Thursday lunchtime festival and the Wednesday lunchtime Chai giveaway - are built on the solid foundation of building relationships with students, helping them learn more about Jesus and discipling them to follow Jesus better.

I also see this award as a signpost of encouragement on the road we began more than two years ago. Student Life's Leadership Team met in 2011 to work on a national strategic plan. We engaged our leaders, some students and some church leaders to help us think through the issues we face. Some of the issues we wrestled with included how to increase our effectiveness in evangelism when students start with no Christian understanding; how to disciple students more effectively when they are coming from increasingly broken backgrounds; and how to be seen to add value to the university community. We talked about the need to engage in evangelism and discipleship in the context of community. We brainstormed ideas like forming "communities of love" (too churchy) or "missional communities" (too cliche). Eventually, way past bedtime one night,

we realised that what we need is for the gospel of truth and grace to infuse our communities. This resulted in a strategic plan focus on "redemptive communities."

The Macquarie Uni Student Life ministry is not perfect. And they aren't geniuses who just stumbled across a magic formula. They've thought hard about how to develop redemptive community in their context. They actually copied the Chai tea giveaway from Student Life at Newcastle University. They've also worked hard at making these activities work in terms of building community where the gospel is lived out. Students are accepted no matter their spiritual or moral background, which is grace. They are also encouraged to explore the gospel by reading the Bible with someone and to apply the gospel to their lives, which is truth.

Our team at Macquarie Uni has done all this in the context of our national ministry, where our leaders observed broader trends and initiated steps to increase our effectiveness.

"One award does not a summer make," but I take it as a signpost of encouragement that at least on one campus the proactive steps of change we began two years ago is making a noticeable difference.

Thanks so much for your partnership with us in this ministry.

Gideon - God's Courier



Island Chief is a small container ship that trades between three ports in Australia - Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane - and three ports in Papua New Guinea - Port Moresby, Lae and Lihir, an island 900 km north east of Port Moresby. Occasionally the ship also visits Honiara in the Solomon Islands. Island Chief visits each port approximately once every month.

Island Chief has a crew of 20, made up of men from China, the Philippines and Papua New Guinea. One of the Papuan crew members is **Gideon**. He has been a seafarer for most of his working life and is currently employed as an AB. We first met in 2009 when

Gideon was working onboard mv Papuan Chief, a sister ship to Island Chief. Since that time Gideon has completed 12 different Emmaus Bible Correspondence courses.

Gideon and his wife Francisca have 2 teenage daughters and a 5-year-old son. Their home is on Fergusson Island, approximately 30 kilometres offshore from the eastern extremity of the PNG mainland. It is one of the Islands in the D'Entrecasteaux Group and part of the Milne Bay Province of PNG.

Gideon and his family are members of the United Church of PNG, a merged denomination consisting of the former London Missionary Society, the Presbyterian Church and the Methodist Mission.

Late last year Gideon asked me if I could possibly provide him with a box of Bibles that he might take to a church in one of the remote villages on Fergusson Island. Seemingly, for both financial and geographical reasons, it is often difficult for churches such as this to obtain Bibles. Often only the pastor and a few other members actually have their own Bible.

Happily, I was able to provide Gideon with some Bibles for this particular church.

As many readers will be aware, part of the ministry of Gideons International is to place Bibles in motel and hotel rooms and similar places. Periodically, as these Bibles become somewhat 'worn and tired,' they are removed and replaced with new ones. For some >20

time the Gideons in Australia have been willing to provide the 'removed' Bibles, many of which are still in very good condition, to the Seamen's Christian Friend Society (SCFS) for distribution to seafarers.

From time to time the SCFS also purchases Bibles from the Naval Military & Air Force Bible Society (NM&AFBS) in the UK. This Society has produced a blue covered NIV version of the Bible specifically for merchant seafarers. It has a picture of a bulk carrier on its front cover. Some of these Bibles, together with some from the Gideons, were the ones we supplied to Gideon onboard Island Chief for the village church on Fergusson Island. The Bibles can be seen in the photographs on the next page.

A few months ago Gideon returned to Sydney onboard another ship and it was then that he described to me how the Bibles eventually reached their destination. It is an interesting story.

Each voyage, on its way from Port Moresby to Lae, Island Chief passes through China Strait between Samarai Island and Sariba Island. China Strait is 7 kilometres long and 1 kilometre wide and connects the Solomon Sea with the Coral Sea. It is close to Alotau the capital of the Milne Bay Province of PNG.

Ships passing through the Strait often do so at reduced speed as this provides an opportunity for the crew to obtain fresh fish, fruit and vegetables from the small boats that put out from Alotau to meet the ships. This is also sometimes an opportunity for a seafarer to arrange for a heavy item – such as a box of Bibles! – to be taken from his ship to Alotau to await subsequent collection by the seafarer after he finishes his contract. I assume that such an arrangement eliminates the necessity for the seafarer to travel with excess baggage.

When Gideon's contract onboard Island Chief eventually came to an end he was repatriated to Port Moresby. From there he travelled to Alotau and retrieved the box of Bibles that had been taken from Island Chief when it passed through China Strait.

Together with the box of Bibles and his other luggage, Gideon then travelled overland to Awayama, a coastal village on the southern side of Goodenough Bay on the northern side of the PNG mainland. From Awayama Gideon then made a 5-hour journey in a small boat across Goscheu Strait - this time as a passenger! – to his home in Kukuya on Fergusson Island.

After several days with his wife and children Gideon then set out to take the Bibles to the village church, some 25 kilometres away, around one of the headlands. Gideon told me that he had the option to either walk for about eight hours along a coastal track, carrying the Bibles as he went, or to travel for five hours paddling an outrigger canoe. Not being a landlubber, he understandably took the second option!

When Gideon eventually arrived and presented the Bibles to the church, there was great rejoicing and thanksgiving.





Gideon told me he stayed two days in the village and took several photos while he was there. The photo above shows the pastor and his wife and some other members of the church happily holding their newly acquired Bibles.

Some time later I received a letter from the pastor of the Boluada United Church expressing his sincere thanks for the gift of 30 Bibles. However, all the thanks should really belong to Gideon – God's courier who oversaw the carriage of the Bibles on their long journey from Port Botany in Australia to Fergusson Island in PNG!

In his letter the pastor not only thanked me for the Bibles; he also requested 30 more Bibles, 5 Bible Dictionaries and a book of sermon outlines!! It looks as though God's Courier will perhaps be making another trip!

Please thank God for Gideon's willingness to serve the church on Fergusson Island and please ask God that those who have received the Scriptures will, through reading and study, '... become wise about salvation through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ ...'

Bulli Beach Family Mission

Beach Mission has been meeting in the Bulli area for over 50 years. It is planned to have a mission again this year at the Bulli Beach Tourist Park, Farrell Road, Bulli. This is on the NSW coast, about 11 km north of Wollongong.

The Beach Mission team has been meeting for planning and prayer throughout this year in preparation for commencing on Thursday, 26th December when we will once again put up the big tent in which activities are held. The Beach Mission will run until Monday, 6th January 2014. It is

co-ordinated and advertised by Scripture Union but each team is financially responsible for the costs of running their mission.

Team members are committed Christians

from a variety of churches and give their time in a variety of ways. Each team member pays fees to attend Beach Mission. The fees go towards the cost of hiring the site, accommodation and meals as well as support towards the cost of running activities.

The Beach Mission team at Bulli provides outreach activities to a range of groups including:

- Keenites for school-aged children up to Year 5;
- Graft Youth from Years 6 to 12;
- Adult from young mothers through to seniors, e.g. Coffee

and Dessert night, and Morning Tea for young mums and their toddlers;

 Family – some events at mission are planned around inviting the whole family to attend. e.g. a Family church service held on the beach at Bulli; Family movie night; BBQ dinner evening; cricket game and a sausage sizzle.

Activities are run in the mornings, afternoons and evenings.

The mission teams are supported by the Services and Hospitality team which looks after the campsite and pre-

pares breakfast, lunch and dinner for the team members. They also help with hospitality in catering for events.

All events planned as activities for Beach Mission are structured

around reaching out to the people at the campsite and the surrounding Bulli area. At every event the aim is to share the gospel of Christ with participants. Activities may include Bible stories, craft and singing for children, testimonies, invited speakers to deliver a gospel message, church services held on the Beach or just getting beside someone and sharing your faith.

This year we are asking churches to commit to pray for BBFM in the lead up to the mission as well as throughout the mission.

The Great Commission (Matthew 28:16 to 20)

In the April 2013 issue of this magazine, we began a series of articles about things that occurred in the 40 days after Jesus Christ's resurrection.

Here is the last article in the series

A simple reading of Matthew's gospel may lead us to believe that these events happened almost straight after the resurrection but if we look at the four gospels we can get a better understanding of the time frame.

The Lord Jesus Christ was crucified on a Friday and buried before sunset on that day. That was the first day, the Saturday was the second day and then the Sunday was the third day (see Acts 10:40).

In verse 10 of Matthew chapter 28 we read that the Lord Jesus Christ told the women who came to the tomb to tell His disciples to go to Galilee. We also know that He met Mary Magdalene outside the tomb, then He walked along the Emmaus Road with two people and He saw ten of His disciples in a closed room in the evening. Eight days after that the Lord saw the remaining eleven of His disciples in the same room. At this stage they were still in Jerusalem. However they did return to Galilee and John 21 relates the incident when some of the disciples went fishing in the Lake.

Luke's gospel doesn't mention the Lord's ascension but Luke does discuss it in Acts 1. We discover that the Lord ascended to heaven forty days after His resurrection (Acts 1:3).

These forty days are very important because some people try to say that the

Lord Jesus Christ didn't rise from the grave. In Matt 28:11-13 we discover that some people said that the Lord's disciples stole His body from the grave even though soldiers guarded it. Other people say that the early Christians knew that He was really dead but they felt like He was still alive in their hearts so they made up the resurrection story. However we see that Luke, who interviewed eyewitnesses and decided to write an orderly account (Luke 1:2, 3), said that the Lord showed many proofs that He was alive and did this over a period of forty days. Each of the other theories is wrong - because the people who made up the first story just had to find the body, while the people who made up the second story didn't do it until much later in history.

In Luke 24:49-53 we find that the Lord Jesus Christ went out to Bethany, near Jerusalem, to ascend into heaven. Mary, Martha and Lazarus lived in Bethany and it was about 3.2 km away.

This means that the Lord Jesus Christ and His disciples went up to Galilee and then came back down to Jerusalem during the forty days that He was alive. This would allow many more people to see that He had risen from the dead and that the disciples hadn't stolen His body.

There are actually three different versions of the Great Commission given >

in the Bible. The Great Commission that we read from Matthew 28:19, 20; in Mark 16:14, 15 we find the second version, and in Acts 1:8 we find the third version. However, there is no contradiction between these three versions because the Matthew version was given on a mountain near Galilee, the Mark version was given while they were eating a meal in Jerusalem, soon after the Lord rose from the grave, and the Luke version was given just before the Lord Jesus Christ ascended into heaven at Bethany.

The first issue to notice about this episode on the mountain is the fact that the disciples worshipped the Lord Jesus Christ and He

accepted their worship. In Rev 22:8, 9 we see that John wanted to worship the angel but he would not accept John's worship. However, God is qualified to accept worship from men and women so this shows us that the Lord Jesus Christ is God.

The Lord Jesus Christ told His disciples that all authority on heaven and earth had been given to Him. This was not a result of His death and resurrection but because He was already God before the world was created (see John 1:1) we can compare this with Phil 2:5, 6. It is very important for us to understand that we serve the true and living God.

It is interesting to notice that some disciples doubted at that time. The Lord Jesus Christ still commanded them to do the job that He had for them because He knows that the force of the message doesn't rely on our doubts, or on us, but on the work that He has already done.

The Lord Jesus Christ came down from heaven to earth to save sinners. In order to do this He became a man so that He could die for our sins. However, as a man, He was restricted in time and space so He didn't travel all over the world to tell everyone the gospel. Instead, He

trained His disciples so that they could do that job for Him. He did this because He is gracious and knew that we all need to have purpose in our lives.

The Matthew version of the Great Commission is the strongest of the three. The Acts version is just a matter of showing by our lifestyle that our Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ, died and rose again, He went back to heaven, is alive today and is coming back to take us to be with Himself forever. There is a challenge in this because we are witnesses whether we show the truth of His sacrifice in our lives or not. In fact, if we are not careful we can drive people away from everlasting life rather than drawing them towards the Lord Jesus Christ. Preaching the gospel is just the first step in satisfying the Great Commission. This was given by the Lord while He was eating with His disciples soon after He had risen from the grave. He didn't put too >26

much pressure on them, at that stage. They were happy that He was alive and He told them to make sure that they let everyone know that He had died and was now alive. After all, there were still nearly forty days for Him to give them further instructions.

Some versions say that the Lord commanded His disciples to teach all nations while others say that he commanded them to make disciples of all nations. In practice there isn't much difference between these two

statements. A disciple is someone who is under discipline. That is, they are following a set of principles. The Lord Jesus Christ had the authority to command this because all authority had been given to Him. After a person has heard the

gospel message and accepted it, then this message should make a difference to their lives, that is, they should become disciples.

A person who is being taught is also a disciple. When the Lord sent Moses to set His people free from slavery in Egypt He told Moses "Now therefore go, and I will be with thy mouth, and teach thee what thou shalt say." (Exodus 4:12) Moses had to change his behaviour and the way he talked.

The Great Commission, is all about training people who have believed in the Lord Jesus Christ as their Saviour to accept Him as their Lord as well. He has authority to command us what to do but we have to be taught what to do before we can do it. He gave the commandment first and we are to keep the message going all over the world.

The Lord Jesus Christ said, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Luke 9:23). Self-denial involves changing our attitudes from self indulgence to one of obeying His commandments but taking up our crosses is an outward demonstration

of an inward change. Being baptised is part of the process of letting the people around us know that we have decided to become one of the Lord Jesus Christ's disciples.

Not only are we to make disciples, we are to teach Christians to observe whatever the

Lord has commanded us. We have all His teaching written down so we don't have to rely on our memories.

And note – the Lord Jesus Christ didn't just leave them alone to do the job; He promised them that He would be with them until the end of the world.
