The last CCCAust(NSW) Coordinating Conference (CC) was held on Thursday, 1st November. The Minutes of that meeting will be issued shortly by the Secretary, Brad Scott.

Meanwhile the monthly "Helping Churches" email was circulated to CCCAust (NSW) affiliated churches and assemblies on 30<sup>th</sup> Nov. It contained several important news items, including the sad fact that the warehouse used by the Hands & Feet organisation was burgled in the last week of November. The thieves damaged the office door and stole two of the trucks and have taken keys to all the other vehicles.

One truck was later involved in an accident and rolled over. The trucks that were stolen were the two new trucks that we just obtained. They also went through our other Toyota van and dam-

aged Paul's truck (one of our driver's vehicle) that was parked on site. Please pray for Brad and the volunteers as they grapple with on-going inconveniences and costs in the coming weeks.

In accordance with advice from the Attorney General's Office, CCCAust applied to change the Name under

which we marry couples.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> October, they received confirmation that our Name has been changed on the Marriage Register at the last Proclamation.

Thus from the 27th November all Marriage Applications and Certificates need to be identified under the Name "Christian Community Churches of Australia". CCCAust now fully complies with all requirements the AG's Office has for registration as a "denomination" which can marry couples.

"We had a break in last night (29 November) at the warehouse. The thieves damaged our office door and stole two of our trucks and have taken keys to all our vehicles.

"The Pantech that was rolled has significant damage to the cool room and it is probably to be written off. It is sitting in a holding yard at Mt Druitt waiting for the police to go over it.

"The Toyota refrigerated van is still missing but hopefully it will be found in good condition and not burnt out somewhere.

"There is one set of CCTV cameras on site which filmed the thieves but they were wearing masks and are unidentifiable.

"The thieves also broke into our neighbour's unit and stole nappies, eight (8) pallets of them, and then used the H & F vehicles as transport.

"Please pray for wisdom as we work with the police to try and identify those responsible, and also for us to be able to continue to collect and deliver food to the churches we supply who help people in need in their communities."

Hands & Feet (H & F) had its annual Fund raiser on Thursday, 18<sup>th</sup> October, at Club Central in Hurstville. It was a wonderful night, full of food and friendship, when we heard about the incredible work that's being done by the different parts of Hands & Feet.

Paul & Erin and their team in Moree. as they work with the indigenous communities to positively impact lives through programs such as tutoring. The tutoring program has given Indigenous kids in Moree the chance catch up to their fellow students and also to be encouraged to continue their schooling past year 12 and into tertiary education. We also heard from Titilia, our warehouse manager, about the amazing work that is happening through our City Care and Community Care Programs. These provide people in need with food but, more importantly, they are used to build relationships with people from all walks of life and connect them to Christians who are able to share Christ's love with them.

We heard from Merilyn, a passionate volunteer, about the work in Myanmar through the Christian-run orphanage and school, where we were given the opportunity to sponsor children that are facing tough and unfortunate circumstances. Those attending the Dinner have helped to sponsor 9 children from Myanmar.

A lot of the work that H & F does might seem disconnected from the Gospel, but we are about so much more than the food and services we share with those in need. We understand that the real need is not food or education or shelter. The real need, that each person has, is to be connected back to God. Hands & Feet uses our services and programs to help make that happen.

We would like to say a massive THANK YOU for their support to everyone who gave generously on the night and to those that support us but were unable to make it to the dinner. We also want to thank God for His awesome and constant provision, every time our team gets together we can see how God has worked in this ministry.



We both join in the regular monthly Prayer Suppers and we have just had a very encouraging time at GLO Expo and at Family and Friends at Wollongong where well over a hundred from all over Australia and many overseas countries joined in three days of Bible Teaching (Andrew Cowell) and a great array of mission information, challenge and great fellowship.

In recent years I have found it difficult to take up the many invitations for overseas ministry owing to health issues making it inadvisable to fly but we have a prayer and support ministry to a number of workers in Africa (such as Malawi and Egypt) and India, Philippines etc. However, we can still drive and because of downsizing were able to get a more suitable vehicle for the longer trips (a Subaru Outback) which has been a blessing. This year so far we have been to WA and QLD as well as several NSW country areas.

We took two months to visit WA – calling into Dubbo and Adelaide en route. While I did not intend speaking a lot in WA yet I soon found myself speaking 8 times, plus twice en route. One of our reasons for this trip was to visit Ken's expanding family – over 40 of whom were at a reunion on Easter Saturday – and to introduce a book that I had written on my Father's life. This was well accepted and some who remembered Dad, who died 54 years ago, were very keen to get a copy.

We visited several of the WA
Assemblies and caught up with many
old and new friends. At Lynwood – our
main commending assembly 40 years
ago – where I spoke, Swan where we
have many old friends, Victoria Park
where my Father was well known and
loved, and Duncraig where we caught
up with many dear friends such as Alan
Mears, David Smith and Tom and Anna
D'Andrea – long-time GLO workers in
Italy and Albania. We visited relatives
and friends in Albany and Esperance
on the way home ... but this is becoming
another book!

After returning from WA we had booked to visit Bundaberg to speak at the Ann Street Conference (3 times). That was a precious time of fellowship. In addition we visited with ex-missionaries, Christian workers, Parents of missionaries, old contacts and relatives (as far away as Rockhampton) and spent an evening with dear friends who are seeking to establish a new assembly in their area.

We are sometimes asked about our support: No, we are not on any support list by our own choice; rather we choose to trust God for our needs over and above the pension. Assemblies and the Lord's people where we minister are very generous and we find that nearly half of our ministry expenses are met by these dear friends and our God is faithful as we trust Him. Recently, we were seriously short of funds for the workers we support but we went ahead anyway. Within 48 hours gifts came in for almost the exact amount of that shortfall. God is no man's debtor. So we go on serving as able and trusting as we have done for the last 55 years since I first went to Emmaus Bible School in Epping, NSW.

On November 2<sup>nd</sup> we celebrated our 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary and we can only say that the God who brought Daphne to WA to meet me 53 years ago has kept us both and our family by His grace – as our Jehovah Jireh and will do so until He calls us home.

As for our family; David is manager for Asia and Oceania, based in Singapore for his Company, Alison is a manager for the Sydney West area health services and Rachel is a piano teacher, concert pianist etc. All seem to be fulfilled in their work and church life. Our two granddaughters; Emma doing Vet. Science in Kansas State Uni, and Erin doing year 12 in Singapore, are both doing well also.

Our warmest greeting to all who read this and please remember us at the place where God invites us to come for mercy and grace to help in time of need.

"For years I wondered why, of all the attributes of God, Jesus chose **mercy** for the fifth beatitude?

There is a logical progression to the beatitudes – they are not random statements. Nobody teaches, or makes a point, by way of random statements. Neither did Jesus.

Taken together, in order, they describe the character traits of a heart into which the kingdom of God has come. They are the Christian's character reference. They are profound.

The heart that has been touched by God has been changed in its attitude to self. It creates *poverty of spirit* – not pride, self-love, or even self-confidence.

Why? Because God dwells in two places. He is the "One who is high and lifted up, who inhabits eternity, whose name is holy...." and His two dwelling places are, "...the high and holy place, and also with him who is of a contrite and humble spirit." (Isaiah 57:15).

The humble heart is God's home.

"Theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

That heart then *mourns* as Jesus mourned – over the death of Lazarus; over the rebellion of Jerusalem; over sin. A realistic attitude to self quickly exposes our sinfulness and poverty.

It brings us to nothing and points us to repentance – hence,

"they shall be comforted."

Repentance is the gateway to salvation. Comfort indeed!

Such a posture of humility and selfabrogation turns a person outside of themselves. They look out and up, not within.

They say with the Psalmist, "I lift up my eyes to the hills. Where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth." (Psalm 121:1)

In other words, they are *meek*. Humble, but strong. Humble because self is burned to ashes; strong because their strength is not their own. Their whole posture has changed forever. As they know more of self, so they look more to God alone.

And so, having moved through a progression of *poverty of spirit, mourning*, and *meekness*, Jesus has described the emptying; the breaking down; the bringing low of a person before God.

Martin Luther described it this way, "God made the universe out of nothing... and He brings us to nothing, because so long as we are nothing, He can make something out of us."

That "something" begins with a change in appetite. A craving for *righteousness* that is outside of self; that is from God.

That appetite must be *filled*, and indeed it is filled. God sees it, and obliges.

The evidence of that filling comes with stunning character traits. It is shown in a person who is *merciful*, *pure in heart*, and a *peacemaker*.

Merciful. In that particular beatitude, Jesus is capturing something of the essence of God's very nature. He is saying that we will be so filled full of >

that which comes from God that His character will begin to be displayed in our lives.

This will come true of us: "Be holy, for I am holy." (1 Peter 1:16)

But within God's holiness, there are so many attributes. Love, grace, kindness, goodness... Why mercy?

I think it's because mercy is totally other-worldly.

I have never in all my life heard someone complimented for their merciful nature, or a comment crafted along the lines of, "that person is so merciful."

Why?

Because it's so foreign to our default frame of reference. We don't naturally think of it.

Neither do we naturally model it.

When Jesus commanded us to "be merciful, even as your Father is merciful," he said we would be "sons of the Most High." (Luke 6:35-36)

In other words, we will bear the family likeness. As children of God, the DNA of our heavenly family has been planted in our hearts and it will show in our lives. The traits will be evident.

A supreme trait, which comes only from God Himself, is mercy.

The impulse to treat someone in a way that has no bearing on what they deserve or is in no way in response to what they have done is completely unnatural. In fact, that is *precisely* the thing that governs our behaviour towards others.

But it is totally natural to God. It is His nature.

He does not deal with us according to our sins, nor repay us according to our iniquities. For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is his mercy toward those who fear him. (Psalm 103:10-11)

Other than Christ Himself, surely the finest example of mercy is Joseph.

His brothers would have left him for dead. They hated him without a just cause. They sold him to slave-traders with no regard for his life. At roughly 17 he was carried away into a foreign, oppressive, racist, inhumane regime. He would, naturally speaking, never again see anyone he ever knew or loved.

He faced years of slavery, a false accusation, was forgotten in prison... that's a lot of time to think, to resent, and to develop a hard heart.

And then he met them. He came face to face with those who tried to destroy him.

If one reads the story of Joseph with empathy, it is nothing short of staggering to observe his dealings with his brothers.

He does not deal with them according to their sins or their iniquities.

Every move he makes is intended not to mete out what they deserve, but to serve their true highest and best interests.

His mercy is astounding!

In recent days, news broke of two shocking religious freedom cases in Australia.

White Magazine was hounded out of business after activists became ≥18

suspicious that they were yet to feature a same-sex wedding. Media coverage, physical threats, advertisers pulled out... The founders Luke and Carla have exited the industry. They have closed their very successful labour of love.

Photographer Jason Tey was sued after he disclosed a 'conflict of belief' to a lesbian client in case she wanted to take her business elsewhere. He did not refuse service – in fact, he offered to do the job despite his conflict. The conciliation conference failed, and he is now before the State Administrative Tribunal.

These cases cross a concerning threshold. They are not for overt actions which may be considered discriminatory. They are for two things previously deemed part of our inherent freedoms: in the case of White, for doing nothing. For their silence. In the case of Tey, for merely stating his beliefs. Nothing more than that.

The Apostle Paul warned us that a Romans chapter 1 society will crave nothing less than affirmation (Rom 1:32). They will not only seek to live their own way, but they will consider affirmation of their choices to be critically important.

And that is where we have arrived. Anything short of overt celebration will not be tolerated. Even silence is not enough.

If scripture is correct, these kinds of cases (and there are others) are just the first fruits of the revenge we can expect

from some of those whose actions we cannot affirm and celebrate.

But notice a stark contrast.

Joseph suffered real and overt injustice at the hands of people serving wicked desires, but what did he do? He was merciful.

An activist, who suffers nothing, but discovers they are speaking with a person who can't wholly agree with them. What do they do? They exact painful retribution.

See how foreign mercy is to the human condition. See how mercy, in these times, will set apart those who are "children of the Most High."

But we will never be merciful unless we start where Christ Himself started:

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. (Matt 5:3 to 7)

If we don't see ourselves as God sees us, and truly know how we have been showered in His great mercy, then we will not be witnesses to Christ in this crucial way.

Let's pray for mercy – that we may receive it from God and show it to others.

Many readers would have heard by now that Franklin Graham (son of Billy Graham) is coming to Australia in February 2019 to preach at a series of "crusade" meetings in our capital cities.

Next year is the 60th anniversary of the 1959 crusades which Billy Graham conducted here which bore very significant fruit for the Kingdom of God.

Franklin will begin in Perth on 9<sup>th</sup> February and conclude in Sydney on the 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>, and we will soon be hearing more details of all these events from the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association (BGEA) and our local church organisations.

It might be useful if we reviewed some historical facts about Franklin and BGEA and its main staff.

Franklin is the eldest son of Billy Graham, his famous evangelist father who was actually named William Franklin Graham Ir. when he was born November 7, 1918. He became an ordained Southern Baptist minister in the USA and became well known internationally in the late 1940s, as an American evangelist, and a prominent evangelical Christian figure. One of his biographers placed him "among the most influential Christian leaders" of the 20th century. In his life-time Billy wrote about 34 books, before he died at the age of 99 on February 21, 2018).

Wikipedia tells us that the BGEA organisation was founded in 1950 by Billy Graham in Minneapolis, during

his time in the region; it later moved to Charlotte, North Carolina.

The BGEA is a registered non-profit organization that exists to share the Christian Gospel through every effective means available. It has a variety of outreach ministries including internet evangelism, the Decision America Tour, The Billy Graham Channel on SiriusXM, "crusade-style" events in cities around the world, disaster response through the Billy Graham Rapid Response Team, television broadcasts, podcasts and audio programs, Decision magazine, and evangelism training.

The BGEA also includes the Billy Graham Training Center at the Cove in Asheville, North Carolina, and the Billy Graham Library in Charlotte, North Carolina.

In August 2018, six months after Graham's death, the BGEA partnered with Sirius XM Holdings to create a permanent Billy Graham Channel featuring Graham's past sermons. The organization was originally known for its radio program, The Hour of Decision, which was first broadcast in 1950 and continued for more than 60 years.

Franklin is now the President and CEO of the BGEA. Before he came into this role, he was the President of the Samaritan's Purse humanitarian aid organisation since 1979.

Franklin made headlines in 2016 when he visited all 50 state capitals in the USA. More than 230,000 people >20

attended the 2016 tour meetings, according to the BGEA. Several times a year, Franklin Graham and his oldest son, Will Graham, preach at evangelistic crusade events in different parts of the world. The events are modelled after the crusades Billy Graham was known for holding, many of which were broadcast on national television.

The BGEA's internet evangelism ministry, **Search for Jesus**, was launched in 2011. The outreach is aimed at sharing the Christian Gospel with people around the world through websites in multiple languages. More than 50 million people have visited the websites since 2011, according to the BGEA.

The organization produces a new television special each month, which is broadcast on TV stations across the United States and posted online. The organization also publishes Decision magazine monthly.

The BGEA began an international evangelism project in 2002 called **My Hope**, in which local believers invite friends, neighbours and relatives to their homes to watch a national telecast featuring Billy or Franklin Graham, but translated into their language. BGEA claims that the project saw more than 9.8 million people "make decisions for Christ."

Billy Graham and his ministry were also instrumental in founding Christianity Today Magazine, the Lausanne Committee for World Evangelization, and the Internet Evangelism Coalition.

BGEA's Charlotte headquarters is the site of the Billy Graham Library, which was formally dedicated on May 31, 2007, with former U.S. Presidents Jimmy Carter, George H. W. Bush, and Bill Clinton in attendance. Former U.S. Presidents George W. Bush, Bill Clinton, and sitting President Donald Trump visited the Billy Graham Library to pay their respects following Billy Graham's death.

# Women's Mission Convention 2018

When He (Jesus) saw the crowds, He had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

(Matthew 9:36-38)

Our Lord Jesus Christ has a heart for the harvest. What about you?

'Hearts for the Harvest' was the theme of this year's NSW Women's Mission Convention held at Campbelltown Christian Community Church on Saturday, 23<sup>rd</sup> June. Women from across Sydney gathered to hear five missionary speakers share their hearts for the harvest.

First of all, Belinda Lamprecht shared the heart that God has given her for the unreached and the orphans of Africa. Based in South Africa, Belinda and her husband, Herman, support the work of Operation Mobilisation (OM) across Africa, a continent with over 1,000 unreached people groups. As well as this, Belinda and Herman have adopted and fostered orphaned children and are advocates for adoption in a country with 3 million orphans.

Leann Buckley has a heart to support the women of Nepal who are not valued but are treated as non-persons. Together with her husband Ian, she has been working in Nepal since 2015. Their vision is to set up an oasis for women and girls in Dhulikhel which



will include a coffee shop, bakery, beauty parlour and travel agency to give them jobs and skills. But the real vision is to see lives transformed from the inside out.

The keynote speaker was Lara Penrose who shared how having a heart for the harvest does not come naturally. After her husband Ben had an "overnight vision" that they should go to the Muslim world, it took over a year of prayer for God to gradually fill up her own heart. It was a two way process – she sought a heart for the harvest and God gave it.

Lara reminded us that the harvest belongs to the Lord. People sow but God makes it grow and then people have the privilege of partnering with >22

God in the harvest. The three main ways we can partner with God in His harvest are to pray, to give and to go. We were encouraged to open our eyes and see that the harvest is there and it is ripe.

We then heard from Merryn Fawsett about her heart for her Muslim neighbours in the UK. Merryn's husband Tim worked with the Feast, a Christian charity in Birmingham, which brings Christian and Muslim high schoolers together to talk faith, make friends and change lives. Churches in Birmingham have also started baby clinics and English classes for socially isolated Muslim women. Merryn reminded us that God is bringing the harvest to our doorsteps.

Parila Qurbanpur was born into a Muslim family in Afghanistan. By video, she shared her testimony of coming to faith and the heart that she and her husband Farid have for sharing the good news with their people group. They now live in Brisbane and are members of an OM team reaching out to Muslims in Australia.

Finally, Anna Southcott spoke of the heart for the harvest that both she and her husband Tim have had since they were young. They are currently preparing to go to Timor-Leste with Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) in January 2019, where Tim will be a pilot and Anna has potential opportunities to use her skills as a child and family health nurse. Anna shared that Timor-Leste is a poor country with many needs, the biggest of which is Jesus.

It was a joy and privilege to hear from our sisters who have a heart for the harvest and have been in the field. But we all have a role to play in God's harvest. Pray for a heart for the harvest. Pray for the Lord to raise up more workers. Pray for the Lord to give you a heart to support His workers in the field. And pray for the Lord to give you a heart to pray for the harvest.

# How will you make your Christmas meaningful this year?

definitive perspective on how it would change me. However, God knew. And I can't thank Him enough.

EvangelismShift has not changed what I know so much as what I do with the knowledge and strength of God. A change to a more physical and visible ministry mindset means that the encounters I have during the everyday are met with a joyous conviction of having been sent into that encounter by God. Because of this, I am more intentional about the opportunities God gives to me as every single interaction has purpose.

And the added blessing is that this gift of EvangelismShift is a journey undertaken with others. The relationship between myself and those who've journeyed with me this year through EvangelismShift is one of such close unity. This opportunity has been a gift from God, all I had to do was take it. And I can't thank Him enough."

Several times he refers to EvangelismSHIFT as "a gift from God" that has changed his life and his witness for Christ. I want you to know that the impact on his life is also a gift from our donors, as their giving has partnered with God's purpose to activate him and hundreds of other church leaders this year as vibrant witnesses for him.

And this is not only happening here in Australia. We launched EvangelismSHIFT a couple of years ago in the Philippines, where it is already spreading rapidly.

Next year we will be launching in three new nations—Fiji, USA and Canada — and we already have National Coordinators in each of those nations.



Dr John Dickson, founding director, Centre for Public Christianity, is quoted as saying "Thinking seriously about science is important for all of life but especially important for those thinking about the bigger questions of our existence. No organisation in Australia does it better than ISCAST. Everything >30 from ISCAST is worth reading."

ISCAST is an Australian organisation dedicated to exploring the interface between science and Christianity.

Many of its members are professional scientists, theologians, and philosophers, who have a commitment to the Christian faith.

ISCAST—the Institute for the Study of Christianity in an Age of Science and Technology—is the oldest and largest science and religion organisation in Australia, having been established under the ISCAST name in 1987. The early years were focused on promoting the message that science and the Christian faith need not be enemies. At that time the organisation was dominated largely by Protestant evangelicals who worked within the physical sciences.

Over the years the focus of ISCAST broadened to include social, political, medical and ecological sciences as well as specialists in technology, theology and philosophy. ISCAST's membership also broadened to include both Roman Catholic and Protestant scientists, theologians and people from other fields. An effort is also being made to recruit younger people, women, and non-Caucasian scientists—all groups that were historically underrepresented.

ISCAST continues to be committed to the need for scientific and Christian thinking to be integrated into the daily lives of those Christians working within the various sciences, and in the lives of clergy, theologians and indeed all Christians, who find themselves immersed in the modern technoscientific world.

Have you heard of CMA (Christian Ministry Advancement Ltd) which is a not-for-profit charity, seeking to help the Christian sector in Australia become more effective? If not, have a look at its website:—

CMA was founded because of a belief that the spiritual gifts of administration (including governance, leadership and management) had been neglected in much of the Christian sector, and that therefore, the front-line mission of the church was suffering.
