The last Coordinating Conference for 2010 was held on 2<sup>nd</sup> November at Emmaus, with a wide range of matters on the agenda. 23 people from 15 assemblies attended. The official Minutes were distributed by email on 22<sup>nd</sup> November. If you require a copy please contact the Secretary, Brad Scott.

Here is a summary of some of the administrative matters discussed:-

#### 1. Incorporation.

Jim Kelly explained the basis of the proposed Constitution for the new Incorporated Association, which will be known as CCC Aust (NSW). This document had been prepared as agreed at the last meeting. (A copy is with the Minutes.) The aim is to create a legal entity to allow us to manage the business affairs of this meeting. This would allow us to employ workers, borrow and lend funds and employ servants and agents. He said the new

Association would:

i. be controlled by, and answerable to our Coordinating Conference; and

ii. would have a membership consisting of people from various para-assembly groups, the Treasurers, plus the Chairman and the Secretary of the Coordinating Conference. These positions would be elected through the Coordinating Conference.

The Charter for the operation of Treasurers had also been drafted (see copy in the Minutes) and Alex Worley (acting Chairman) asked that we all read and examine the Charter because at the next meeting the aim is to approve the document for implementation.

#### 2. Victorian Discrimination Case.

This is apparently a very interesting case. If anyone would like to read the Judge's findings they can be accessed on a web site (details are on page 25)

If you are a religious body operating a commercial enterprise, the ruling implies that you need to be 'up front' and clear in your advertising and your company objectives what you believe and stand for. In the Victorian campsite case there was nothing in the advertising that linked the campsite with the Christian organisation.

Jim Kelly suggested that churches and para-assembly groups should look at their objectives and ensure they clearly state their purposes.

#### 3. Moree Community Church.

The October issue of this magazine included a short article on the work being done amongst the aboriginal population in Moree by the small>



assembly (9 people) which meets there.

Even as we were reading about that in October, DOCS, which funded the Neighbourhood Centre, had a meeting with Erin Strahan (the Centre coordinator) and closed the Centre the next day!

Moree Assembly had been using the Centre for church meetings over the past 4 years, and even longer for their Sunday School etc. They now have nowhere to run their programs or meet for worship. Consequently they are looking for a place to meet temporarily.

Ken Clark (from Lithgow Assembly, who wrote the article) has asked Stewards to set up a Foundation for Moree assembly to allow churches and individuals to give to the Moree brethren for the purpose of purchasing land and building a facility for this ministry. A letter explaining their current ministry was attached to the Conference minutes.

#### 4. Marriage License

Bruce Buckley has interviewed Viliamu Aufai on behalf of the Marriage committee. Viliamu has been an Elder at Whalan and now heads up the work at Gracepoint Community Church, Greystanes. Bruce recommends that Viliamu be accepted as a Marriage Celebrant. The meeting agreed.

### The Door to the Crown

Every life that has been or is being lived out on Planet Earth comes under the scrutiny of its peers. Most of us live somewhat insignificant lives, but of the many greats, one life emerges as the one than has touched the hearts of multitudes.

The life of Jesus gives real meaning to the tacit sentiments lurking behind the title of a widely read book, "The Power Of One". Or the poignant well known poem, "One Solitary Life".

This life more than any other has come under the scrutiny of mankind. There are those who consider it insignificant, others who say it was a sham. But there are many who consider it to be the greatest life ever lived.

Like so many great lives it has its 'Everests'. Those definitive moments when greatness erupts through the rather thin veneer of the mundane. In all probability every moment of Jesus' life was great. But much of it was secreted amongst the shavings and sawdust of a carpenter's workshop.

To me the life of Jesus has three epochs of special significance. They all conveniently begin with the letter "C"....

- 1. The Crib.
- 2. The Cross.
- 3. The Crown.

#### 1. The Crib

As one would expect, the Crib is the most popular as it is associated with



less challenge. Most have a natural affinity to the newborn. But my credulity would be stretched beyond its limits to think that the many who, sing along with Santa, Ho Ho Ho really know know know.

But unlike others even an epoch of such magnitude was to the Lord Jesus, merely a doorway towards the next incredible step – the Cross.

#### 2. The Cross

I really can understand the Muslims, the Jehovah's Witness, and the Christadelphians who assert that the proposition that it was the Son of God, (as understood by mainstream orthodox Christianity), who died on the cross is beyond belief.

It clearly is, to think that God would send His own Son to die for me on a cross just beggars belief. But He did, which puts God's actions in a class all of their own.

Predictably the Cross is considerably less popular than the Crib. There is something quite vulgar associated with dying on a cross that is usually reserved for villains.

Nevertheless the Cross also was another doorway that Christ voluntarily went through on His way to – the Crown.

#### 3. The Crown

Our third epoch lies in the future. For the cross was also a doorway, but this time to the Crown. The day will dawn when we will see the fulfilment of God's promise as expressed by the apostle Paul:-

#### Phil 2:9-11 NIV

Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

The Babe of Bethlehem, the Man of the cross, will become the King of kings and the Lord of lords. I rather suspect that it will be much more popular to be a follower of Jesus in that day than it is now.

Bishop Phillips Brooks (1835 - 1893) wrote these words to remind us of the effect that this "One Solitary Life" had on mankind.....

#### One Solitary Life

"He was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. Until He was thirty He worked in a carpenter shop, and then for three years He was an itinerant preacher. "He wrote no books, He held no office, He was never in a big city, He never travelled two hundred miles from the place where He was born, He never did one of the things that usually accompany greatness.

"The authorities condemned His teachings. His friends deserted Him. One betrayed Him to His enemies for a paltry sum. One denied Him. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed upon a cross between two thieves. While He was dying His executioners gambled for the only piece of property He owned on earth—His coat. When He was dead He was taken down and laid in a borrowed grave.

"Nineteen wide centuries have come and gone, yet today He is the crowning glory of the human race, adored leader of millions of the earth's inhabitants.

"All the armies that ever marched and all the navies that were ever built and all the parliaments that ever sat and all the rulers that ever reigned – put together – have not affected the life of man upon this earth so profoundly as that One Solitary Life."



Every thoughtful Christian leader has at some point prayed for an experienced and godly person who would listen, understand and encourage; who would be a trusted person who would not be afraid to ask the hard questions; be someone to hold one to account in a supportive relationship; or be a wise man or woman who can draw on life experience; be a thoughtful guide on the journey to maturity or a pastoral person who cares and prays. Very few receive the mentoring they long for.



The question might be asked "why do I need a mentor?" Many of our past church leaders may not have had a mentor. There are several reasons.

The first is that the world is changing and to stay on top of one's role as a leader there is value in having a mentor who is well connected who can help the leader learn quickly and grow in their role.

The second reason is any employee is likely to change their career significantly five to six times during their lifetime (up from two or three). In the fast pace of today's world a person needs to grow into their job much more quickly than in the past, a mentor can help in this area.

Another reason is that as a society we are much more mobile and often are away from family that in the past have provided some accountability for our growth and development. This is of particular importance to the Christian as many times without suitable accountability structures our behaviour patterns can lose their cutting edge, in a complex world, leading to poor behaviours as a Christian and consequently sin.

The last reason I'll list here is that with a significant emphasis on lifelong learning in the work place today many find having a mentor a great and effective way of learning.

For the Christian we can think of the model the Apostle Paul adopted with Barnabas and Timothy. Looking back as far as Ioshua one sees how Ioshua was mentored into the role of the leader of God's people. We can look at these people, and in the case of Timothy we know he was a young man who had a propensity to fear, and Paul saw this restricting him in his ministry. Paul worked with him outlining to Timothy the things that affirmed to Paul that Timothy was God's man and that since he was the right man in the right place God would not leave him and so take courage and do what has to be done.

All of us have a life story to tell and some of that story has left wounds that affect us in our work and ministry. Like Timothy, yours might be > 12

fear, others might include, some addictive behaviours, angry responses, maybe we have been abused and that has left deep scars and now we find ourselves in leadership roles and these past things we have managed to keep hidden for so long now keep surfacing. A good mentor will help work through the process of addressing these issues that are restricting you in your ministry.

Other areas that a good mentor will help with is setting up good life patterns so one can continue ministry for many years while staying in good shape mentally, emotionally, physically and spiritually.

Over the last three years I have had a mentor. This person has been invaluable, as I have made a significant ministry transition, explored what it means to be a Christian in today's world, my role as a family member has changed with our household only being Jan and myself and with some significant role changes. But I also can think of the questions and reflections my mentor has made as I have travelled through some messy stuff from life and ministry. My only regret is that I did not work more formally with a mentor earlier in my ministry. There are times I look back on nearly 30 years of ministry and feel there have been significant times where I have been travelling with the handbrake on. It would have been so much better having worked through some of this messy stuff and travelled with the handbrake off.



You might consider some of this material sounds more like the work of a counsellor. Traditionally, a counsellor deals with specific issues. A mentor will address agreed-upon learning objectives that will help the mentoree in life and ministry. In this role issues might arise for which the mentor will suggest the mentoree see a counsellor.

Looking back some of us can probably recall people, who have been in our lives for varying periods of time, who have helped us in our growth and development. Most of these have been informal relationships and very valuable to our development. Not everyone has had that blessing. Having a mentor who can help with agreed-upon objectives, one can learn many significant lessons of life and ministry.

Thoughtful Christian leaders, both men and women, pray for expertise and understanding to mentor emerging young leaders. Commencing in 2011 International Teams will be equipping 12 people to be mentors.

# The training objectives are clearly defined and are based on improving participants competencies in the following areas:

- To gain a vision for mentoring others into ministry, leadership and maturity
- To develop an understanding of the biblical basis and theology of mentoring
- To engage personal spiritual formation as a mentor
- To understand the dynamics of the mentoring relationship
- · To acquire interpersonal skills essential in mentoring
- · To implement a one year model of mentoring with two to five mentorees
- To collate and develop personal, leadership and ministry resources for use in mentoring
- To complete the action reflection learning assignments in mentoring
- To allow mentoring to be shaped under supervision
- To cultivate a personal style and ministry of mentoring

International Teams is committed to training next generation leaders. In partnership with John Mark Ministries we are offering a three-year training program in mentoring skills. The program involves a three-day residential workshop and three one-day workshops each year with individual supervision between training sessions. The trainers will be Andrew Collins and Sally Jones.

Participants in the training begin mentoring immediately and learn in an action-reflection environment. Mentor equipping has wide application to many on-going training environments in Christian organisations and is particularly suited to leadership development.

Only one tummy bug so far, so grateful for charcoal tablets! I (Rita) avoid crap, but can eat porn! (the local pronunciations) George has a cast-iron stomach.

We had two Thai ladies travel with us as team members. It's amazing how you converse with facial expressions, plus hands, the universal language. When we like the food we must say" arroy!" and when something looks nice it's "suay" with the last tone rising, if your tone lowers it means it's awful. Gotta be careful!

In two days we leave for Chaiaphum where we have more schools, also get to catch up with two missionary ladies we support. One is Irish, the other an American.

We do so very much value your prayer support. You are our spiritual team members!

At a funeral recently, I was exchanging a few words with a friend about the character of God. We were wondering about the question of whether God has favourites. I said: "God gave us a free will, because he wants us to REALLY WANT HIM". My friend surprised me by saying: "God is the arch romantic". I rather liked the idea. All we have that is not sinful comes from him; our love of beauty, our love of music, our humour. We are made in his likeness. We have no attribute that has not originated in him. But then, I began to wonder: "What exactly is a romantic?" The dic-

tionary didn't give me much help, so I decided on a woman's concept -ideally someone who is personal, close and caring. I believe that all my

life God has been trying to teach me to appreciate the reality and completeness of the love he offers. But what Biblical evidence do I have of the "personal" nature of the love of God?

Deut. 7 records how God chose Israel out of all the peoples of the earth to be his people, his treasured possession. God said it was for no other reason than that he loved them. This love was made known to Abraham and Moses, and the relationship was personal, and it was characterised by God's faithfulness. But it was conditional; it depended also on faithfulness on the part of the recipients in the keeping of God's commands.

How did it work out? Well, of course, Israel as a nation was not faithful; they did not keep his commands; so God left them to fend for themselves with disastrous results, involving much suffering on a recurring basis.

And how did God feel about this? Was he hardened to their distress? No. God suffered when Israel suffered, and when they repented of their sin and the waywardness of their behaviour, he sent help and rescued them. The Bible says: "He could bear Israel's misery no longer" (Jud. 10:16). There was empathy and forgiveness in his heart.

In spite of the disappointment of Israel's behaviour, when they returned

> to God, he encouraged them with the promise of an idyllic future: "I have loved you with an everlasting love. I have

He could bear Israel's misery no drawn you with loving kindness. I will build you up again"

(Jer. 31:3). Of the faithful remnant it is said: "He will take great delight in you, he will quiet you with his love, he will rejoice over you with singing" (Zeph. 3:17).

Does our relationship with God follow a similar pattern? The Bible refers to the bond between God and Israel as marriage. Isaiah and Jeremiah both speak of God as Israel's husband (Is. 54:5, Jer. 3:14). We are the individual members of God's church. Paul told the believers in Corinth: "I promised you to one husband, to Christ, so that I might present you as a pure virgin to him" (2 Cor. 11:2). Now we are linked with the remnant of Israel as God's chosen and very special people. The ≥24

longer 9

wall of petition has been broken down as Paul tells us in Eph. 2:13 16. Our closeness to God comes as the result of the sacrificial death of Jesus. "Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her" (Eph. 5:25). In this way alienation resulting from our self-will and unfaithfulness has been atoned for. Now we have the privilege of drawing near to God, and he will draw near to us (James 4:8). And he still suffers when we suffer. When Paul was persecuting the believers on his way to Damascus, God said: "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute ME?" (Acts 9:4). And the writer

to the Hebrews tells us that God is "touched with the feelings of our infirmities" (Heb. 4:15 KJV).

But the conditions of

this idyllic relationship still apply. "If we claim we have fellowship with him yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not live by the truth" (1 John 1:6). Now the Spirit of God lives in us, and is with us, and we need to open our lives to him. Paul tells us, (Eph. 16:19), that as we do, we come to understand a little, perhaps very little, of the magnitude of God's love, and so we begin to be "filled to the measure of all the fullness of God." This goes beyond my understanding, but I believe our life begins to reflect, in some small measure, the qualities of the character of God. These are presented to us in detail in various passages in the New Testament.

Does it matter to God if I respond

to his love? Jesus readily asserted that the most important commandment of all was to love the Lord our God with all our heart and with all our soul and with all our mind (Matt. 22:37). He asked Peter three times if he loved him before assigning a particular service to him, and he obviously valued the reciprocal love relationship that he experienced with Mary, Martha and Lazarus. He also readily accepted the love shown him by the women who cared about him.

I am at the great-grandmother stage now, and I am aware of God's su-

> pervision and enabling (not forgetting my need of obedience). Is that surprising? Jesus said he goes on ahead of his sheep, and they follow him (John 10), and his

strength is available in our weakness. Then, there is his provision. I feel he draws my attention to suitable clothes in a situation where there is very little in the shops suitable for a great-grandmother to wear. Is that surprising? Didn't Jesus say that he clothes the lilies of the field with splendour that surpasses Solomon's, and he will clothe us too? One by one he helps me solve the little problems I face day by day. Is that surprising? We have a high priest from whom we "receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need" (Heb. 4:16). He "nourishes and cherishes" those who belong to his church (Eph. 5:29), and rewards those who earnestly seek him" (Heb. 11:6).

So, when we feel the need of caring support, and if we are aiming at meeting the conditions, let us remember that God is the divine source of it, and his resources are always full.

Jesus is walking beside me, guiding each step of the way;

Safely he'll lead me to heaven, gladly his voice I obey.

He lovingly guards every footstep, He tenderly cares for me;

His strong arms of love are about me, my Saviour and Shepherd is he.

"Your worst days are never so bad that you are beyond the reach of God's grace.

# 'Stranger' Bible study – a recommendation

by Alan Moss

Many of us are always on the lookout for good materials that can help us in our varied ministries. We (at Ballina) would like to recommend an interactive Bible study that some of you may or may not be aware of. It's called "Stranger on the Road to Emmaus" by John Cross, published by GoodSeed International.

This course was probably originally designed primarily as an evangelistic tool, but we've found it to be very helpful in giving new Christians, and even some who have been saved a long time, a fantastic overview of God's plan of redemption throughout the Old Testament. Designed along the lines of other "Creation to Christ" studies, Stranger takes a chronological overview of principal Old Testament stories that point towards the sacrifice of Christ on the cross, just as the Lord did as He spoke with the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. "And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, He explained to them what was said in all the scriptures concerning Himself." (Luke 24:27, NIV.) It is especially written with a



western worldview in mind, so it fits in well with our post-modern, some would say post-Christian, culture.

As a Bible study tool it is very easy to use – with its combination of a study book and interactive DVD, and a work book. The quality of the production is excellent, and we feel comfortable using it with people from all walks of life. For those who can't read or can't read well, the whole study also comes in a boxed, six DVD set.

The course can be used effectively in one-on-one situations or with study groups. The set out of the fifteen chapters is such that, should someone not be able to take in all of the information in a particular chapter, (some of them have a lot of information for a Biblically illiterate person,) you can easily suspend the study mid chapter and continue on the next week with no break in the continuity of the study. That makes the study extremely flexible.

In Ballina we began using the courses in evangelism around mid April of this year and one lady has been saved as a direct result of the studies while several others are in the process of doing the studies. Others who have done the studies are in no doubt as to what salvation is all about, but they aren't ready as yet to respond to the work of the Holy Spirit in their lives. Currently we are using the courses in several different home groups with most of the people in the assembly. In part it is for teaching the foundational truths of salvation

found in the Old Testament, and in part it is to prepare them to use the course with their unsaved friends and acquaintances. It doesn't take long to come to grips with the study approach that is used and within a few weeks of beginning the studies, believers are confident of using the material with others. Particularly in the case of some of our newer Christians, the course has reaffirmed the security of their salvation because it gives such a clear outline of God's redemptive plan for mankind.

The "Stranger" studies are also available in Chinese, French, German,

Portuguese, Russian, Spanish and Korean. Goodseed also publish a similar Bible study aimed at Moslem people called "All that the Prophets have Spoken." It is also available in Arabic, French and Turkish. Another study called "By this Name" has been designed for a wide ranging group of cultures from New Age to Hindus, Buddhists and Jehovah's Witnesses. All of this information and more can be found in a small publication titled, "and beginning with Moses," also written by John Cross and published by Goodseed. Because their desire is to serve the Lord and His people, we have also found that all of GoodSeed's publications are very reasonably priced.

# Concord Gospel Chapel - being rebuilt

Concord Community Church, an assembly which meets in the Concord Gospel Chapel (see the cover of this magazine) in a suburb of Sydney, is at a very interesting and exciting stage of their church building project.

In October we reported that the DA had been approved by the local Council and the church was seeking tenders to build the new church.

Also in that month, their three elders wrote a letter to the Assemblies to explain why they are in urgent need of a new building. It said the current chapel is 'leaning' and has cracked walls, toilets that block frequently, collapsing floors, and a very poor electrical system!

Each Sunday, the church offers services to two distinct groups. At 2 pm there is a service in English for about 20 people and then at 4 pm there is a Hindi/Urdu service for about 40 people. There are also prayer meetings on the first and third Friday of each month.


The leaders envisages that with better facilities they will be able to provide other outreach activities such as – Sunday School classes, youth programs, teaching English to new migrants, cooking classes, etc.

The assembly has already raised \$80,000, but the whole project will cost over \$500,000, so they hope that others will join with them in prayer and financial support.

Since the letter was mailed, they report "We have received a few heartening letters from the Assemblies around Australia, encouraging us in our effort. Although their own numbers are getting smaller, they praise the Lord that Concord Community Church is taking a huge leap of faith. Gifts from the Lord's people are coming in."
