Meet a Youth and Community Worker

A few years ago, the NorWest Community Church came to the conclusion that God wanted us to focus on relationships in the community.

In previous years we tried to buy property, but our attempts to buy land, buildings or larger church buildings ended in us either being gazumped, or the place being taken off the market.

One important question we asked ourselves was, "if we were to stop operating as a church tomorrow, who in the community of Quakers Hill would care?" The answer at that time was nobody!

The realization that God had placed us in a school community, to which we could offer a service, was an eye opener. Based on this, we started to advertise for a Youth Worker. We advertised in Christian magazines and Bible Colleges all over Australia. We didn't get one reply.

Have you ever had the experience where someone is waving at you to get your attention but you're not sure it is you they are waving at? Well, that is what I felt like when God laid on my heart the idea to go for the youth worker position. Who me?? I'm not young, I'm developing a middle age spread & I'm balding! I certainly didn't feel like youth leadership material. But there is nothing like going for a white knuckle ride on the wild side with God at the wheel.

So for the last three years I've been working two days a week at Barnier Primary School as a youth and

community worker alongside teams of other church members and parents from the school.

As a church we have seen God do some amazing work in people's lives and seen Him open many doors of opportunity, just by providing a nonthreatening service to the community. We have a team that runs 'KidZone' which is like a kids club programme where kids are taught basic truths from the Bible, in a fun and active environment. Because it's an optional lunchtime activity we are not restricted by denominational boundaries, as a result we have Catholic, Moslem & Hindu kids come along. We have around 30 kids come every week and at the end of the year we hand out Bibles to all the Year 3 children.

We've had up to 12 parents coming to 'The Chatroom' which is an informal parenting discussion group. Last year we looked at boundaries, parenting skills, depression and grief and loss. Two families have started coming to church as a result.

'Seasons for Growth' is a grief and loss course specifically for primary children. It helps children come to terms with major change in their lives. Whilst I'm not allowed to explicitly share my faith during the course, the children that come often get involved in the KidZone programme.

'Barnier Buddies' is a mentoring course for boys that promotes teamwork and social skills. This year the boys have been rebuilding billy-carts and learning how to work together.

In the third term of 2006, 16 parents participated in DPYK. 'How to Drug Proof Your Kids' is an educational, prevention and intervention parenting program developed by Focus on the Family, Australia. The course went for six weeks and helped to equip parents to steer their children away from the harmful use of drugs and alcohol.

I'm not the only one that is reaching the community. Trish Brown runs an ESL (English Second Language) class each week for parents of Barnier children in order to help parents communicate with confidence and interact with the broader school community.

'Christmas in the COLA' (which stands for Covered Outdoor Learning Area) was another highlight for the NorWest Community Church in 2006. Working in conjunction with the school and the P & C, it was a tremendous family event, building a community spirit and raising support for the new school playground equipment. Over 700 people came and celebrated the real reason for Christmas.

The opportunities are amazing. Just this week, I was asked to chase up some kids who have had a family member die, to see if they were OK. It's been amazing how the school has allowed me to be a part of their community. They have given me a school email address and help in so many ways. Still, we need to be wise how we conduct ourselves. Not every teacher is keen to have a Christian worker in the school.

As a church we've seen a difference. We've had more new faces coming through the church doors in the last year than we've ever had. We no longer just minister to a church of 100 but now we minister to a community of 650.

This year will see new challenges. I've been asked to assist with an 'all boys class' in stage 2, helping to run activities and reading. This will be where I run the mentoring course and 'Seasons for Growth'. The Chatroom and KidZone will continue to run.

As a church we are looking at the school chaplain scheme proposed recently by the federal government, so we need wisdom to know how to proceed with that.

We value your prayers for wisdom, enthusiasm and opportunities to continue to share the good news of our Lord and Saviour.

THE BEGINNING - The Himalaya Crescent shops project for the church building had finally come to a dead end – the Blacktown Council would not approve it due to the massive objections of the residents. What a let down for the members of FCC! But wait, 'Have you considered looking at a commercial building as an alternative place?' one member suggested. Oh ??? Can this be possible ??? Let us have a go at this suggestion.

So we came to this place at 45 Fourth Avenue in Blacktown and looked into the empty warehouses that were newly built – 5 units to select. We wondered how can this huge high warehouse be converted into a church premise for our use. Somehow, something stirred the hearts of Laurie, Juno and Sonny that this could be the right place for FCC; so we put our faith in the Lord and went forward to make more enquiries about changing the use of the warehouse. Guess what? The Blacktown Council gave us the approval for the change of use. That was the SIGNAL that we needed from the Lord; so FCC chose to purchase unit 9. The sale was discussed and it was finalized on August 2004 for \$625,000.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE DEDICATION PROGRAMME

October 7th was a beautiful day; it was a sunny day with a comfortable

temperature of 26°C. We had many visitors and friends from Samoan

Fellowship who came to support our special day; it was great to have GLO national committee people among the guest list. The service came to life with songs of praise like 'Come on and Celebrate'; it was a good reminder to the members of FCC and the guests that all good and wonderful things come from the loving hands of our great God. Hence, it was appropriate that we should give Him all the glory and honour.

A short history of FCC was presented by Sonny – from it's beginning at Baulkham Hills in year 2000. A handful of believers and GLO church planting team, under the leadership of Laurie and Margaret Cowell – total 14 members, made a move to Blacktown in March 2000. The Lord provided them with a place at Shelley Primary School to hold their worship services. It was a good venue to begin our witness for the Lord. Of course, He added more members to the Fellowship.

Laurie Cowell followed on with this presentation – 'How the warehouse was converted into a Church!' It was amazing to watch the slides - how the members of MMM did the whole work transforming the huge empty warehouse into a conducive place of worship. Many FCC members also put in their time and effort to do the painting and cleaning work. The Lord brought in many skilful Christian tradesmen to help to install the internal fittings and other jobs.

A small group of FCC singers under the care of Stephen Yew, gave us two beautiful songs from William Peterson – 'Take up your cross and follow me' and 'Christ liveth in me'. It was a good reminder to all of us that the Lord Jesus is our spiritual leader and head of the Church; as members we must always follow His words and serve Him faithfully.

Mr. Don Donsworth (GLO national committee) and Sonny Ng (FCC Elder) then prayed for the Lord's blessings upon this new building; they asked the Lord to use this building for the extension of the gospel work and the growth of His church.

We had some reports on current activities at FCC from Richard Chin – he presented the children's meetings at AWANA Club and Shelley School, youth meetings, Bible study/prayer fellowship, Sunday School work and worship services. A mission report from John & Remy Tan about their radio ministry with FEBC Manila was screened. Ding Guballa shared details about his Filipino outreach work in Blacktown.

To finish the day's programme, brother Laurie gave a Bible exhortation to challenge the congregation to serve the Lord faithfully and expect great things from His hands.

What a wonderful day it was! We gave the praise and honour to the Lord for this great miracle to provide this strategic church building for the expansion of His kingdom in the city of Blacktown.

Does God really know what He's doing?

On a beautiful spring Sunday morning some thirty-five years ago, we arrived at Bankstown Gospel Hall to celebrate the Lord's Supper. In those days, there were about 140 in fellowship, but we were delighted to notice that on this particular morning there were two visitors. One of them was Bert Gordon and the other Blanche Ferguson both from Brewarrina.

We were further delighted when Bert stood up and gave us a rundown on the work amongst the Aborigines that he and others were engaged in. Later that evening the young people had supper and a time of fellowship at the home of Neil & Ruth Moulang. We were again delighted to see Bert and Blanche there.

Listening to Bert engendered in my mind a strong desire to go to Brewarrina and see for myself what was going on there. So on, the next Easter weekend • a most memorable brothers Alf Magrath and Wal Moulang joined me in our first trip to what is called by the locals, "Bre".

I can still remember the trip well. I had just recently taken delivery of my first brand new car, an EK Holden automatic. I can still feel it shuddering as it hit potholes as large as swimming pools and rocks as large as house bricks. In those days the road between Byrock and Bre was unsealed and quite notorious.

We arrived there safe and sound in the mid afternoon having left Sydney around 5.00am.



Eugene Byles, Felly McHughes and Cheeko Ferguson greeted us warmly. This was to be one of the most memorable Easter weekends of my life.

The meetings were just marvellous, the Chapel was full to overflowing and many just sat on the grass outside the building near a window and joined in the singing. The "Bre Band", which was comprised of two guitarists,

one man playing the bones and another a gumleaf, accompanied the singing.

I had never heard singing like it and what is more they kept it up for about an hour or so interlaced with solos, duets, testimonies etc. Kids were lying all over the floor somehow able to get to sleep despite the loudness of the enthusiastic singing.

Several local men opened the scriptures and had a short word, we did not know what to expect and then we noticed that all eyes turned on us. After a little while Cheeko turned to me and said, "Do you want to have a

go brother". Well of course I did, but we had been going for about an hour and a half already!

So, I tentatively stood to my feet and mumbled something like, "I won't take a long time". Cheeko replied, "Take your time we haven't started yet." Therefore, I took my time and preached for about thirty minutes. It was wonderful to see fruit as a consequence of the Gospel being preached.

Later I had the opportunity to ask Eugene questions like, "What time do the meetings start". His reply was, "When we all get here". Which prompted my next question, "When

does it end". The reply was, "When we are finished".

were begun there that lasted for a large number of years. On Monday, we reluctantly got back into our car and began the long trip home. We managed to arrive safely after negotiating our way between kangaroos and emus that were everywhere

early in the morning.

Over the next five or six years or so, every long-weekend and half of my annual holidays were spent at Bre and Bourke. Then often the other half I took my entire family there. We used to spend a week each year at their Annual Itinerant Convention that began in October.

They mapped out a plan to visit many small towns and Aboriginal Camps preaching and teaching as we went.

Places like Weilmoringle, Goodooga, Enngonia, Collarenebri, and Pilliga all bring back vivid memories. At night, we slept under the stars and cooked our tucker on a small gas stove. These visits are amongst the most memorable moments of my life.

One time while camping at Weilmoringle, we ran out of water and had to drink from the Culgoa River. Two days later, I felt wretchedly ill. Some days later, we found a dead sheep in the river upstream a little from where we were camped. The illness went through two stages. In the first I thought I was going to die, and the second was even worse, I thought I

wasn't going to die.

We would drive to these camps, pull a few logs together and start a fire, get out the

guitars and in a few moments we would have 60 to 70 people listening to the Gospel. The format was the same as at Bre, lots of singing, testimonies and solos, then a message.

The thing that stood out to me in those days was the sincerity of the Aboriginal people in there devotion to the Lord. They lived in tin humpies with dirt floors and a hole in the ground for a toilet. Their women carried the water up from the river in kerosene tins and cooked over open fires. Yet, despite all of this they appeared to be the happiest people I had ever met.

They had little of the luxuries of this world that I thought were so important; their treasure was the Lord. Their attitude was a stern rebuke to me and I really coveted what they had.

Over the next 6 months or so, I went though a period of absolute misery. I wanted to pack up everything, goods and chattels, kids, and wife – the lot – and go to Bre and work fulltime amongst the Aboriginal people there.

My misery did not stem from any reluctance on my part but rather on the contrary. My prayers to God were hitting a blank wall. I was pleading with God saying, "Lord here I am, send me." God kept on saying, "I want you to stay here." I was miserable beyond comprehension.

Like most things, you accept the inevitable and get on with your life. However, I had a continuing and abiding love for the people at Bre.

About a year or so before our initial trip, we had begun a Sunday School in a Council hall very close to our home.

We called it Rose Park Sunday School. I was responsible for the senior Bible Class and used to have these students and other teenagers over to our home on a Friday night. We would play table tennis, and then have a little talk and then supper.

Why God wanted me to stay at Bankstown was beginning to take shape in my mind.

One by one, we saw these teenagers come to know the Lord. We encouraged them to be baptised and they all came to Bankstown with us. It was a bit of an art getting up to twelve young people into a station sedan.

The majority of these people are still living vibrant meaningful Christian lives. Their own children are grown up and many of them are believers.

Does God really know what He is doing? Experience has taught me that He does.

Camp Toukley - Outreach Camps

It's all about the 'ones'! There's a certain ring of truth in that old cliché "just make a difference in one person's life"... whoever claimed authorship was obviously impacted by the 'ones'.

When you look at Camp Toukley Outreach Camps you could easily be dazzled by the numbers of children who pass through each holiday. In the past 12 months alone 210 kids have accepted Jesus into their lives. Just reflecting on this number is fair reward and worthy of celebration. But camp is about so much more than a number, it's about that one kid who gets under your guard that leaves a lasting impression. It's about making a difference through the gospel message in the lives of the next generation. Every camp is hallmarked by significant moments of impact as the truth of the Cross finds a home in the hearts of children.

At 'one' outreach camp 'one' camper walked into my office to make 'one' phone call and it was in that 'one' moment, in the exchange of conversation with his mother, that my heart melted into 'one' great big puddle on the floor. This was my most enduring memory of camp and having spoken with numbers of other leaders, they too have their own scrapbooks of warm stories filled with the 'ones' to take home.

Leading at a camp is a valuable opportunity for any person who wants to truly make a difference. You undoubtedly hone leadership potential, add to your skills resume, and make lasting friendships, but you get so much more. Our leaders have come to live out these words of Mother Theresa in their every encounter with children "I believe in person to person. Every person is Christ for me, and since there is only one Jesus, that person is the one person in the world at that moment."

Our Evangelists – where are they?

This question has been on my mind recently, in two contexts. Firstly, in my local assembly (Waitara) when we were considering our Easter Services this year. We realised of course what a special time this is to emphasise the Gospel of Jesus Christ in all its power and force.

But we did not feel we had a local brother who could eloquently do this to a crowd we hoped would include many new residents in our district. So we asked ourselves "who are the evangelists in NSW we can invite?"

The second context was in relation to starting a new series of 'main' articles for this magazine. For over three years we've had a series featuring individual NSW Home Workers and their families. In doing some thinking about this with people associated with the NSWAEM, one brother suggested we feature evangelists for the next year or so. Great idea! Let's make a list.

Now, in both contexts, we ran into a big snag. Only one evangelist came easily to mind. Now, that's a short list!

Well, it was actually a family we thought of—George and Rita Galieh, and their son Michael, who has helped many times with their musical items. They are excellent as evangelists and have been for many years. They are itinerant in NSW and other Australian states and also regularly get invited overseas, especially to Thailand where they have toured for eleven years.

They are past students of Emmaus Bible College and well known around our assemblies and other churches in NSW and beyond. We printed their story early in the series on NSW Home Workers – the December 2003 issue.

Thankfully, this sole evangelistic team has solved Waitara's problem because, amazingly, they were not booked for this Easter – until I telephoned!

Based on my experience, it seems that there's a need to provide a simple link between our NSW evangelists and local assemblies. Therefore, I would like to publish the names of evangelists who serve local assemblies – so that other local assemblies can contact them to either minister at their assembly or to learn from their failures and successes.

Additionally, we will be asking them some simple questions for publication in the magazine to more formally allow them to share their experiences. Note that such folk may well prefer to be contacted via their local assembly and we will respect that wish if desired.

What would I like local assemblies to do therefore? I'm asking them to please let me know who they ask to perform this function of evangelism. I'm thinking that it is someone who the Holy Spirit has marked out distinctly as an evangelist in the same way as He has marked out teachers, pastors and apostles in Acts 21:8 and Eph 4:11. This might be a 'platform speaker' like the late Fred McMinn or, say, Bill Newman. Alternatively, it could be a one-to-one evangelist or a small group evangelist. The emphasis is on the ability to tell out the Gospel in a way that is clear. Would assemblies please send the names and contact details of such a person (or persons) to myself by 16 March.


He has written to inform most assemblies of this service and, at the Glenhaven information session after the Stewards Foundation AGM in November 2006, was asked to give a brief overvie

Who we are and What we believe

Except for the Introduction, this is a virtual reprint of a leaflet written by Mr Ian McDowell many years ago. The only change has been to quote one Scripture from the NIV.

Introduction

Mr McDowell began with "Those who are not familiar with our manner of gathering may wonder what is distinctive about people who meet in a 'Gospel Chapel' rather than in a 'church'. The purpose of the following is to explain this."

With the passage of time, many Assemblies do now meet in buildings with a sign '... Church' outside. However the editors of this magazine believe the distinctives of Christian Brethren Assemblies do align very closely with the rest of what he wrote and, as such, we hope this reprint may be a help to many young in the faith or new to our Assemblies.

Membership

Every person who has received the Lord Jesus Christ as his or her own personal Saviour (John 1:12; Rev. 3:20), is a member of 'the church, which is His body' (1 Cor. 12:13; Eph. 1:22-23; Col. 1:18). The Bible also speaks of local churches (Acts 9:13; Rom. 16:16; Philem. 2). These churches reproduce locally the characteristics of the whole church when their membership is open to Christians and only Christians (Romans 15:7).

This raises the problem that although "the Lord knows those that are His" (2 Tim. 2:19), local church leaders cannot be so sure. Hence we are justified in maintaining in membership only those persons who are

Godly in life (1 John 1:6-7), loving in their attitude to others (1 John 2:9-10), and sound in essential doctrine (1 John 2:23-24), no matter what claims they might make.

Notwithstanding the restriction on membership, all are welcome to attend our meetings (Matt. 11:28).

Major Beliefs

Our major doctrinal beliefs are those of traditional evangelical Christianity. We consider that the Bible is the Word of God and is fully inspired (2 Tim. 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:21). We believe in one God who is eternally existent in three persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit (Matt. 28:18; 2 Cor. 13:14). The Father is God (Gal. 1:1); the Son is God (Heb. 1:8-9); and the Holy Spirit is God (2 Cor. 3:17-18).

In addition, the Son is Man (Acts 2:22; 1 Tim. 2:5). We are sinful (Rom. 3:23), but He is sinlessly perfect and morally glorious (John 13:31-32; Rom. 1:4; Heb. 5:8-9). Our sin would separate us eternally from God (Is. 59:2), but the Lord Jesus died for our sins (1 Cor. 15:3; 1 Pet. 2:24), so that a full and free salvation is now offered to all who trust Him (John 3:16; Rom. 5:8; 2 Cor. 5:17).

Salvation has its outcome in discipleship (Luke 9:23-26) and victorious Christian living (Rom. 6:11) as we walk in the enjoyment of the presence of the living Christ within us (Eph. 3:17; Col. 1:27; 2:6, 9-10). ➤20

The Place of Meeting

It is good to have a tasteful building (1 Tim. 6:17). But this is the 'House of God' only in the sense that it is set apart for Christian worship and service. The true House of God is the Assembly of Christians who meet there (1 Tim. 3:15). There is no 'altar' or 'sanctuary' where the presence of the Lord might be sought: rather, He is found in the midst of His people (Matt. 18:20).

The Form of Meeting

We have no clergyman; our ministry is according to gift (Eph. 4:7-8; 11-13) and is available to all local churches; subject to this, we follow the New Testament pattern of liberty of utterance in meetings of Christians so that the Holy Spirit can speak through whom He will and gifts may be manifested to all (1 Cor. 14:29-30; 2 Cor. 3:17).

Every Christian is a priest (1 Pet. 2:5,9), which confers on him or her the right to enter the presence of God at any time (Heb. 10:19-22), whether for prayer (Heb 4:16) or for praise (Col. 1:12), as led by the Holy Spirit (Rom. 8:14).

Leadership

Our rule is by elders who combine ministry gifts with those of administration (Heb. 13:7,17,24). These brethren show first by their interest and use of gift, their desire to serve (1 Tim. 3:1). Their elders recognise their qualifications by comparison with Scriptural requirements (1 Tim. 3:2-7; Titus 1:6-9), and in fellowship with them, the new elder begins his

work. The Holy Spirit makes the actual appointment (Acts 20:28), and this is verified by the spiritual fruit that follows (Matt. 7:20).

The Ordinances

We cherish the ordinances in their apostolic simplicity. These are baptism by immersion in water of believers (Matt. 3:13-17; 28:18-20; Acts 2:37-38; 8:37-38; Rom. 6:3-6), and remembrance of our Lord Jesus Christ in the breaking of bread (Luke 22:19-20; Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 10:16; 11:23-30). It has been well said that a Bible, a pool, and a table with bread and wine on it are the only essential furnishing which a place of meeting for Christians requires.

What are we called?

For legal reasons, and for convenience generally, we are called 'Christian Brethren'. Both words are Scriptural (Matt. 23:8; Acts 11:26). Their use does not mean that we think that believers who are not members of our churches are not Christian brethren, and we regret the necessity to imply the distinction.

Outreach

We have described our belief and practices concerning the local church. At the same time, we are a Gospelloving people who will take all steps possible to secure the salvation of men and women (Acts 1:8; 20:20-21; Rom. 1:15; 10:10; 1 Cor. 1:18). We are missionary-minded (Mark 16:15; Rom. 15:19-20) and, in our Lord's name, ready to engage in social work (Matt. 25:35-40).

Conclusion

We believe that the foregoing principles will characterise all local churches which conscientiously seek the Lord's path for them in this present day.

Because there is a minimum of formal control, experience has shown

that a very high degree of spirituality is required on the part of brethren and sisters. It is emphasised in closing that all must strive, with the Lord's help, to maintain this (Luke 22:27; 1 Cor. 13:2; Gal. 6:1-2; Phil. 2:3; 1 John 3:18).

through this medium.



on over 250 stations a week, in Australia, TWR and HCJB, overseas. George and Rita do a great job in preparing scripts and voicing the program. I sometimes get to write as well, but I am fully involved in the production, as well as the 'one minute spots' on 2CBA.

Irene and I have had a great year in our schools doing Scripture. Irene teaches in two local Primary schools. I have 9 classes on Mondays and Tuesdays at a local Christian school. For the past 20 years, I have taken Scripture to the whole School Assembly, monthly, in a local Primary school.

The local Church of Christ has offered Scripture teachers for that school next year. Please pray that the school will agree. We have a tentative 'Yes' but it's not locked in. I have many opportunities to talk with kids. Some have big problems, others asking about becoming a Christian, and 'D' who asked me how she can be a stronger Christian.

At the end of lessons, I sometimes ask them to ask me hard questions about God and the Bible. The questions are fantastic and it's been a forum where they can ask about the things they always wanted to ask about. I also go out to the playground. It's amazing how many kids will ask deep and meaningful questions. The main aim is to present our Creator God, as the real God, especially to those from other religious backgrounds. Please pray for Irene and myself, that the Lord will help us to communicate that Jesus is the ONLY way. Pray that the Lord will work in the lives of these children.

We thank the Lord for relatively good health, strength and the privilege of still being of some use to Him. Ruth had



a full knee replacement last November, and has recovered remarkably well, without having to go to rehab. We are still fellowshipping happily at West Pennant Hills Community Church. reach out to the wider Sydney for Christ. I need more people ... it seems this is a time of harvest.



a 'slide show' with messages based on a poem. It's best if you have broadband to reduce the time needed to load each photo. You will also need Macromedia Player, but many PCs have this free utility pre-loaded already.

CRS (Christian Resource Specialities) launched a new web site in September 2006:-
