- Mr **Ross Bunyon** was re-elected unopposed to the role of Chairman for the next two years.
- There was an update presentation on JAAL (see page 13) from Steve Peach representing the Bible Society. He encouraged churches to register as soon as possible.
- Len Smith reported on Emmaus Bible College matters including the appointment of Graeme Janes as the General Manager, and of Rodney Trinidad as Youth Services Coordinator. Rodney's role is to assist and encourage youth ministries in as many of our assemblies as possible. He makes it clear that his passion is to serve local churches and would welcome invites to speak at youth events, youth camps, and at Sunday meetings anywhere in NSW!
- The Emmaus Board is still seeking a new Principal.
- Training materials are gradually being made available via the new Christian Brethren Training Site. The first component on the website relates to Child Protection legislation and associated church responsibilities.

Meredith about another new church plant as a result of reachout from the Samoan assembly at Whalan. This one is at Pendle Hill and started in October last year.

- **Stewards Foundation** reported that three directors retired last year and have been replaced by Ross Bunyon, Nathan Fredricks and Martin Watkins. Ross is the Chairman, replacing Basil Connell who served for many years.

Rob Flinders (SCFS) is thanking God for a wonderful answer to prayer. The booklet "The Gift of God' he had printed for seafarers (see our October 2007 issue) in EasyEnglish and Tagalog is to have a much wider distribution. The Naval Military and Air Force Bible Society (www.nmafbs. org) distributes Bibles and Christian literature worldwide and has agreed to take on the responsibility of printing and distributing copies of the booklet in both languages at no further cost to the SCFS!!!

Rob asks if we would please pray that, as the booklets come into the hands of more and more seafarers, and as they read the Scriptures in it, the Holy Spirit will convict them about sin and righteousness and judgement.

Andrew walks 'The Way of St James'

As I walked the rain misted, the cobbled stones were tough on my tender feet, the alleyways enticed exploration but before me was a goal I had been planning for months to reach, spent weeks in training, and now I had spent 31 days walking to reach this goal, to walk into the 13th century Cathedral in Santiago de Compostela, in north west Spain. The terrain ranged from just a couple of hundred metres above sea level to over 1500 metres (ie 5,000 feet), through valleys, over passes, through sunshine, snow and now rain.

The Camino de Santiago de Compostela, also known in English as 'The Way of St James', is a collection of old pilgrimage routes which cover all Europe. They all have Santiago de Compostela in north west Spain as their final destination. For more than one thousand years pilgrims have been walking along the Camino de Santiago. The main route which I walked is more commonly known as the Camino Frances. This part of the Camino de Santiago traditionally starts in St Jean Pied de Port in southern France and finishes in Santiago de Compostela about 780 kms later, after travelling the breadth of Northern Spain.



The first day of this Camino crosses the Pyrenes, so all those images from the Tour de France suddenly became reality as I hiked from a couple of hundred metres to the pass at 1430 metres (5,700ft). At the end of the day, after I checked into an albergue (dormitory) with 100 beds in the village of Roncesvalles I wrote in my journal, 'I am so PUMPED'. I was so excited to actually complete this first day's walking and I still felt in pretty good shape!

For a number of years I had contemplated completing this Camino. I have a relative who completed it in 2002, International Teams missionaries operated a coffee shop in Santiago for a number of years and another International Teams couple are currently researching having an accommodation place there. I did not join an organised group; I walked the Camino on my own. However there were many people around me as close to 100,000 people walk the Camino each year, most in the summer months. For me it was mid October to mid November.

It is thought that Helena, mother to Constantine made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem in 326. After Jerusalem, Rome is the second most sacred site for Christians and Santiago is the third, and has become the most popular in recent centuries. The Bible records some Bible characters doing long walks. Abram, when he left Ur; Moses as he led the children of Israel from Egypt; Paul on his various missionary journeys all involving considerable walking. We have also learnt over the >>>8

years that as followers of Jesus we are aliens in this world, in fact our citizenship is in heaven. Packing your pack before going was an exercise to remind me that I was a traveller.

With my research I learnt that you should not have a pack more than 10% of your body weight! That was less than 10kgs for me. So what did I really need for this walk for five weeks? After some of my training walks (I walked over 200kms before leaving, to help prepare my body) I came home and went through my pack to see what did I really need and what I could take out.

This happened on two occasions. I started with my pack weighing 12 kgs dry weight. I had the satisfaction of using everything in my pack that included all the clothes but also many of the Band-Aids, Dettol ointment, needle and thread (used to relieve the

pressure of blisters) and the bandage.


Looking through the Old Testament there were many times that piles of stones were left as a reminder to generations following indicating that this place was sacred. Being from a stream of Christendom that does not emphasise sacred places, I came to appreciate the sacredness of places where people had walked before me. The sacredness of the place where James the Apostle is buried (Santiago is Spanish for James) and reflect on his martyrdom; the wonder of walking a road built by the Romans and one that James may have walked and Paul may have walked if he got to Spain. Also, the sacredness of the place where millions of people have walked over the centuries - many in a quest to know God and to experience him more fully.

One thing I did not have to carry >



or need was a tent and cooking equipment. There are many locations along the pilgrimage route where you can stay, hostels called Albergues and Refugios especially for pilgrims. They varied in cost from €3-8 (A\$6-\$16) per night and a bunk bed with pillow is provided and usually a hot shower. On average there was a village every five to six kms. Often you could use the Albergue's kitchen to cook a simple meal, usually pasta with some canned fish for protein. This always was cheaper but was basic. Alternatives were the local bars and restaurants that offered a 'Pilgrim Menu' for €5-10 per person, usually it was quite a hearty three course meal.

The early pilgrims had not only the tough terrain to contend with but also robbers and there were certainly no paved roads in centuries past. For pilgrims during the middle ages the journey would have taken between six months and up to three years. I walked on a variety of surfaces including paved roads and paths, cobblestones, gravels roads and dirt, and muddy paths after any rain. Many kilometres were along farm paths that included mud and animal manure all adding to the ambience of a walk through a rural setting. I learnt to take good care of my feet being careful to walk on surfaces that did not hurt as after walking 25kms in a day I found my feet were very susceptible to the smallest stone. The distance I walked on any given day varied from about 20kms up to the 40kms I walked one day. I did get some blisters and it took me a few days



to work out appropriate care of them. With no pain from blisters I began walking some long distances and then discovered I developed tendonitis in my left leg that felt like someone had kicked me in the shin. A week from the end a German Shepherd dog ran past me and bit my right calf leaving a couple of nasty gashes, something I was able to attend to with some basic first aid.

There were several reasons I wanted to do the walk. One was to disconnect from my previous role as National Director of International Teams. The walk certainly achieved that. I did not take a mobile phone with me, I did not take an iPod; the only thing electronic that I took was my camera. I wanted to disconnect completely and not hold onto responsibilities of my previous role. The other thing I wanted to do was to be away from the office so my successor, in this case Janice, could have a free hand at establishing her role in leadership. The third reason I walked the Camino was to do something big physically while ≥10 I could. Another reason I wanted to do the Camino was to slow life down a little for myself. I have experienced life in the fast lane for a while and wanted to create some time for God to speak to me if that is indeed what He wanted to do. I appreciated the opportunity of just walking and not to have the pressure of our western lifestyle.

My wife Janice joined me for the last 111kms. This was recommended to us and certainly was a wonderful opportunity to reconnect and talk though our separate experiences. Sadly, Janice's father had passed away while I was walking the Camino. It was



a thrill to be able to have the luxury of time to be able to walk and talk with my life's companion.

What did I learn as I walked? For the past 18 months I have had a mentor and he prepared a list of questions and statements for me to think through as I walked. These questions helped me reflect on my previous ministry and helped me to prepare for my next ministry. For example, What have been the high points of my ministry? What have been the obstacles? How do I rest, calm and coast? Who is God calling me to serve? These questions can easily occupy thinking time and I reflected on them as I walked. I kept a blog while I walked (www.andrewonthecamino. blogspot.com), this was a wonderful way to keep people informed as to my progress and I loved reading people's comments, they were an inspiration to me.

I also learnt to appreciate the time I have with people, never knowing if walking companions I had one day would be with me the next or even if I would ever see them again.

I met some amazing people; some had walked from near Berlin before commencing this part of the Camino, some 2100kms. One older couple from Australia were doing the walk a third time. A Canadian guy was walking the Camino for a second time and just again wanted to experience the slowness of the pace of life rather than the speed at which western life often demands us live it. Others had walked to Santiago and were actually on their return trip.

Arriving in Santiago was an exhilarating experience. After so much planning, anticipation and walking to actually arrive at the huge Cathedral, to see a statue of St James, in fact to be able to hug him, and to see the crypt where it is alleged he is buried, was a moving experience. At midday every day there is a pilgrim mass in the cathedral. To listen to the singing, to hear the Bible being read, to hear a sermon (all in Spanish of course) and then to catch up with other pilgrims who

themselves had just arrived in Santiago, was a wonderful experience.

Whilst Santiago is where most people finish, some then catch a bus to the east coast to the town and cape at Finisterre. This word means 'the end of the earth' and is the most westerly point of mainland Europe. Many burn

some of their clothes, many sit and watch the sunset, many sit on the cliffs and reflect on their journey to date and, as they look across the vast Atlantic Ocean, they wonder what the future might hold and how best to act on decisions made or act on promptings made by the Spirit of God as to future moves and directions.

I now have many memories of my walk and 1100 photos to remind me of my Camino experience. I have my 'Passport' with stamps from the places I stayed; I have my Compostela Certificate as proof that I have completed the walk.

I also have recollections of having been in a place where it was God and I – with nothing else to crowd in and interfere. Just as in our marriage there are times of quiet silence where Janice and I can rest in the contentment of our relationship, I had that time with God as I walked. It was a wonderful experience and one that I will treasure and hope to nurture.

Annual Report – 2008

As Chairman and Chief Executive of CBCS, we present this short report on behalf of the Board, highlighting significant activities for the 2007/08 financial year. This will be the last report by Ted Davis as Chairman, having completed his tenure in that position at the last Annual Meeting of the Company. Tony Folland has accepted the role of Chairman for the ensuing year.

Board of Directors

In September 2007, Sam Arnold was appointed to the Board. Sam is an accountant with extensive experience in the aged care sector.

After more than 30 years of service, Norm Polyblank resigned from the Board in December 2007. His dedicated service has been greatly appreciated by the Board. In addition to his role as Secretary/Treasurer of the Company through most of its existence, Norm also spent some time as the voluntary manager during the organisation's early days. Norm's role as Secretary/Treasurer has been taken by Sam Arnold.

Graham Kindt, who had been a Director for more than nineteen years, did not seek reappointment to the Board at the last Annual Meeting. For approximately one third of his time as a Director, Graham held the position of Chairman. We recognise and thank him for his dedicated service to the organisation and its residents.

Bethshean Nursing Home Ltd

Bethshean Nursing Home Ltd has not traded for some years. With the ownership of the nursing home being transferred to CBCS and then Bethshean being amalgamated with Yurana House to form Cherrybrook Christian Care Centre, it was decided to deregister the company. The deregistration was officially recognised by ASIC in March, but of course the tradition of quality care continues through the Bethshean Wing of Cherrybrook Christian Care Centre.

Facilities

As mentioned in our 2007 report, Carinya House, our new 60-bed aged care facility at Glenhaven, commenced operation in August 2007 and was officially opened in September of that year. The facility is owned by Stewards' Foundation of Christian Brethren and is operated under a lease arrangement by CBCS.

Also in August 2007, the Administration Offices for the company were moved from the Elouera Gardens site to an office block in the Norwest Business Park at Baulkham Hills, a location that is almost equidistant from the two sites currently operated by CBCS.

A major extension to Cherrybrook Christian Care Centre, comprised of a two-storey 28-bed wing and a large extension to the Community Room, was



completed in October 2008 at the cost of approximately \$5 million. This extension has added greatly to the amenity of the residents.

Despite many setbacks, construction of a further 60-bed facility at Cardiff Heights in the Newcastle area appears to be nearing commencement. An amended Development Application was finally approved by Lake Macquarie Council in May 2007 and detailed planning and documentation commenced immediately. An agreement was reached between the Stewards' Foundation and CBCS for CBCS to purchase the land for the facility from Stewards' and the purchase took place in October 2007. CBCS is now working with our architects to finalise the plans for the facility and to select a builder for the project. It is expected that construction will commence in the second quarter of 2009.

Operations

A significant concern to the Board continues to be the level of vacancies in self-care units at Elouera Gardens. Throughout the year we have had an average of approximately 10% of our units vacant. This appears to be a common experience throughout the industry, but we are not prepared to accept that as an excuse for continuing vacancies. A number of new marketing strategies have been and will be introduced in order to attract new residents. One of these strategies has been the introduction of rental agreements for some of our units.

The Federal Government introduced a new funding system for residential aged care in March 2007. A stated aim of the Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI) is to move funding more in favour of high care residents than low care residents. Although CBCS has fared reasonably well from the new system so far, the future may not be so bright for us unless further changes are made to the way Government subsidises care and the way it permits providers to charge residents to cover the costs of building new facilities. The increasing trend for people to take advantage of Community Aged Care Packages and stay in their homes is also starting to have an effect on the number of enquiries for low care admissions, and although we are not yet seeing significant vacancies, we expect that like many other facilities, we will start to experience vacancies in coming months unless appropriate policy changes are made by Government.

Speaking of Community Care, CBCS has again decided to apply for an allocation of packages in the latest allocation round from the Government. It is hoped that we will be able to commence a service in 2009 if, within the will of God, we are allocated the places.

Quality of care continues to be a major consideration in aged care. The Accreditation Agency has made four visits to Carinya House and three to Cherrybrook in the last year. Although these visits can be stressful for staff, it is very pleasing to report that following every visit we have received very favourable reports and we continue to operate facilities that comply with all expected outcomes under the Accreditation Standards. As part of our commitment to provide quality care, our facilities regularly participate in a national quality



benchmarking program and our results are usually in the top grouping.

Finance

The Company recorded an operating loss of \$443,867 for the year. This disappointing result was largely due to the establishment and start-up costs associated with opening Carinya House. The mix of residents and their length of stay did not meet the expectations that had moulded our budget and underpinned our staffing strategy. It was not until the end of the financial year that we were able to have the new facility operating at near break-even level. However, it is pleasing to report that Carinya House is now showing a positive financial result.

The non-operating income that helped give us an overall surplus was due to the fact that the bed licences at Carinya House were brought to account as an asset worth \$2.1 million.

Overall, the Company continues to be in a strong financial position, with net assets of almost \$22 million. However, our continuing financial viability is a major concern of the Board, considering the current world economic climate and the increasing gap between costs of providing accommodation and care and the regulated levels of income that we face. The Board is actively pursuing ways to ensure that we are able to continue providing quality care into the foreseeable future.

Staff

Unfortunately, with the financial pressures at Carinya House, we were faced with the difficult decision of having to implement redundancies of staff throughout the year. We were sorry to lose some very talented staff, but are thankful to those who continue with us for taking up the challenge of changed work responsibilities. The original manager of Carinya House, Robyn Worsley, who had done a wonderful job of setting up and running the facility, decided to leave us in June. Her replacement is Gail Summers, who is also proving to be a very capable manager.

We wish to express our sincere thanks to all the staff of CBCS, both paid and voluntary. Without such dedicated staff we would not be able to provide the high quality care for which we are known. We pray that together, as "Christ's love compels us", we will be able to continue to offer care to many more elderly in the future.

Conclusion

Having a strong membership of the Company is important to the future of CBCS. As we look to God for His continued blessing of CBCS, we take this opportunity to invite you to support the ministry by becoming a member of the Company.

However, what I appreciate the most about this college is that, while we are taught many different points of view and interpretations of the Bible, the teaching and doctrine are solid and clear.



Well, that alone might be enough to make some people want to read "Babylon the Great"! But if you prefer more information before making a purchase, the author has kindly provided a summary of the plot and his reasons for wanting to write this story. Paul Howell said:

I Have A Dream - Luke chapter 16

Who was it that said, "I Have A Dream"? It was the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr, in Washington, USA, on 28th August 1963. In a nutshell, what was his dream? His dream was the abolition of racial discrimination. Unfortunately, he was assassinated in 1968 with much of his dream unfulfilled.

The Apostle Peter said (Acts 2:17 NIV) "In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams."

We tend to think that we are approaching or even in the "Last Days", and if we are, we should be having dreams and visions, but are we? Have we stopped dreaming dreams?

Have you ever had a dream similar to this? One Sunday morning you arrive at the Chapel at about one minute past ten, and the people at the door greeting say, "I am sorry, but there are no seats left inside, but you can listen in from the youth hall." Do you dream those kinds of dreams?

Have you discovered that it is much easier to dream dreams than to actualise them? Generally speaking, dreams are not our main problem, but translating them into action is.

My 1st cousin four times removed, George McIntosh, had a dream. Let me tell you how he went about putting it into action. George was born in 1833. His family were of good Anglican stock and early pioneers living at Gordon, NSW. But even the best of families



have the odd 'black sheep'. Amongst other things, George had the reputation of being quite a handy bare-knuckle boxer.

But strange forces are often at work in our lives and at the age of 44, George left the "Canvas" for the "Cloth"; he became an Anglican minister. His first appointment was to a Church at Kurri Kurri.

George and his family duly settled in, and bright eyed and bushy-tailed he turned up to take his first Sunday service. There was literally a man and his dog there. But George had a dream, so he decided on a plan to bring it to fruition.

In those early days Kurri was a coalmining town and the lads were big on boozing. So on Saturday afternoon, George went down to the local pub, stood up on a chair and called for attention. He introduced himself as the new minister of the Anglican Church. Then he asked the men, who was the best fighter in the town? There didn't appear to be any doubt about the answer, and they said, "Big Fred". George reached into his pocket and pulled out a fiver and put it on the bar. Then George said, "Come on Fred, outside, and if you are the one

left standing the fiver is yours, but if I am the one left standing you have to come to Church next Sunday".

When it comes to a stoush the amateur is no match for the Pro, and George disposed of Big Fred in no time at all. From that time until George was moved to another church he preached to a congregation with standing room only. What did George do? He got the men of Kurri to play the game according to his strengths, not theirs, and it worked for George.

I am not going to suggest that we get someone relatively fit and pack him off to the pub to take on the world. In fact I'm not going to suggest anything, but I am going to show you something that Jesus suggested.

(Luke 16:1-8 NIV) Jesus told his disciples: "There was a rich man whose manager was accused of wasting his possessions. So he called him in and asked him, 'What is this I hear about you? Give an account of your management, because you cannot be manager any longer.' The manager said to himself, 'What shall I do now? My master is taking away my job. I'm not strong enough to dig, and I'm ashamed to beg — I know what I'll do so that, when I lose my job here, people will welcome me into their houses.' So he called in each one of his master's debtors. He asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' 'Eight hundred gallons of olive oil,' he replied. The manager told him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it four hundred.' Then he asked the second, 'And how much do you

owe?' 'A thousand bushels of wheat,' he replied. "He told him, 'Take your bill and make it eight hundred.' The master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly. For the people of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own kind than are the people of the light."

The Parable

Basically the parable that Jesus told is one of a commercial nature. It is about some dialogue between an owner of a business and his manager. It had been brought to the owner's attention that his manager was the Jim Selim of Jerusalem, and he was not doing a good job, he was wasting the owner's possessions. So to use an old Aussie idiom, he gave the manager the "hammer and tack".

Have you ever been given the sack? It can be quite a traumatic experience, and so it was for the manager. His plight is emphasised in verse 3.

(Luke 16:3 NIV) The manager said to himself, 'What shall I do now? My master is taking away my job. I'm not strong enough to dig, and I'm ashamed to beg—'

Because of his incompetence he believed that it would be very difficult to pick up another job. So what did he desperately need? He needed friends!

At least he had learned a very important lesson, if you want to have friends in business, you have to splash the money about a bit. Long lunches, gifts, etc. they are all calculated to win friends. It puts you in a position of

power to have people owing you a favour.

Let me tell you it is a lot easier to splash the money around, when the money isn't yours. I have found that people are most generous when they are giving money away that is not theirs!

So the manager devised a rather shonky plan to urgently win some friends. As far as I could see there was no thought that these debtors could not, in the normal time frame, pay their entire debt. But the manager decided to conduct a 'fire sale' and offer discounts to all and sundry.

We must clearly understand why he did this. As we have seen, there was no thought that the debtors could not pay the entire amount, so he was not motivated by compassion. He obviously didn't have the owner's interests in mind, for he was giving his money away, so he was not motivated by astute stewardship. It seems clear that he had his own interests at heart.

By offering them discounts he was trying to buy some urgently needed friends. Friends he could call on to provide the badly needed job. Anything was better than digging ditches or worse still, begging. So off he went offering discounts of between 50% and 20%.

Now we come to a minor difficulty, (verse 8) "The master commended the dishonest manager". The question is, "Who is the master" here? Some think it was Jesus because Luke used the Greek word "Kurios" which is generally translated "Lord". (KJV)

But it is also translated; owner, master, Sir, etc (NIV). It was a general term of respect. The meaning here is put beyond doubt by Jesus' words in verse 9. He said, "I tell you use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourselves, so that when it is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings."

With these words Jesus was contrasting what someone else said with what He was about to say. So Jesus was not the one making the commendation, it was the owner of the business.

One must ask, what did the owner find in this devious manoeuvre to commend the manager for his "shrewdness"? The thought here is one of cleverness, or clever like a fox. We admire the fox for his cleverness, but who wants a fox for a friend? But notice the owner had no intention of re-hiring him. So it appears to be more of an "observation" than it is a "commendation".

Note the sentence, (verse 8) "For the people of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own kind than are the people of the light." This serves as the bridge that is used to cross over from the parable to the Lord's explanation of it. The Lord is going to talk about the management of our resources in respect to winning friends.

But the meaning of this phrase is quite clear, Jesus is saying, that the people of the world use their assets better to win friends than the Christians do.

The Explanation. Verses 9 – 13:

The first thing Jesus would have us understand about "Worldly wealth" is that it's not meant to be stored up, and only used for yourself, for one day it will be left behind. Wealth can serve a much more nobler purpose.

The purpose that Jesus had in mind, is for us to use "Worldly wealth" (or, our resources) to make friends that can be helped into the Kingdom of God.

The phrase, verse 9, "So that when it (the money) is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings" simply can't mean that by so doing you buy your way into Heaven. Then what does it mean? Quite a few translate the words "You will be welcomed" this way, "They will welcome you"; "They" being the people you have helped to get into the Kingdom. These are the words of Samuel Rutherford;

Fair Anworth by the Solway,
To me thou still art dear,
E'en from the verge of Heaven,
I drop for thee a tear.
Oh! If one soul from Anworth
Meet me at God's right hand
My Heaven will be two Heavens,
In Emmanuel's land.

The question that Jesus was putting to the disciples in verses 10 - 12 is, could they be trusted to follow His teaching and example, and also would they demonstrate the shrewdness that the manager did in the parable and use money to win friends for the kingdom?

(Luke 16:10-12 NIV) "Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? And if you have not been trustworthy with someone else's property, who will give you property of your own?"

The Lord's use of this incident as an example to the disciples is the second difficulty we have to address. But the emphasis is not on the manager's underhandedness or duplicity, but on his "use" of the money – to win friends. So Jesus commended his "motive" not his "method."

Jesus summarises his application of the parable with these words: (Luke 16:13 NIV) "No servant can serve two masters. Either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Money."

There is no doubt what the Lord means here, "Worldly wealth" can either be used to extend the Kingdom of God, or it can be used to further one's own interests. The choice is ours – God or money? It can't be both.

Conclusions:

Think: In what ways can I use what I have to win friends for the Kingdom? Then when you come up with some answers, convert them from dreams into action.

It's not what you'd do with a million If riches should e'er be your lot, But what you are doing at present with the dollar and quarter you've got.
