First Glance

Dear Readers, I usually approach writing this column after having just experienced again the joys, surprises and frustrations that go with the job of being an editor.

I can truly say for every past issue, when I reflected after a few days, and surveyed the weeks since the submission deadline passed, I'm always pleasantly surprised and thankful at what God has accomplished through his servants across our Christian Brethren spectrum in NSW.

However, right now, I'm in that 'middle period' – feeling a few frustrations! So, my aim is to turn these, for this June issue, into 'positives'. Let me express 3 wishes for the future, born out of my thinking about recent difficulties.

1. Try to compile 'history' better: It has been a struggle for those pulling together the 100 year history of the Waitara Assembly, and to present it in forms that could be useful and 'digestible' to people alive today. We know history can be useful. Bible study convinced me of that, even when

school didn't. But how should we record TODAY facts about our Christian activities, and the people involved, to better inform future generations? Who should do it, and how often?

2. Try to get better value from our conferences: There are a good number of Brethren sponsored conferences we could potentially attend each year. But, for various reasons, no-one can attend all that they would like to. Could those who plan, and those who attend conferences, better share the key information, teaching, ideas, etc, that emanate from those 2 or 3 days? Could we use modern technology to make it more available, at minimal cost, to those who had to 'stay home'?

3. Try to encourage brothers and sisters in Christ to write more about what they are doing – partly perhaps for 'history' reasons, but mainly for informing, empowering and encouraging our fellow Christians NOW, when we know the time is short, and our Lord could return at any moment!

The last NSW Assemblies Coordinating Conference was held on 6th May at Emmaus Bible College with many interesting things on the agenda. 28 people attended from 18 churches and four more at Raymond Terrace 'attended' by a live video hookup. This was the first live trial to an assembly too far away to expect people to travel to Sydney. We could see and hear each other, but it remains to be heard how people at the remote site felt about the experience and whether they feel they can usefully participate in discussions, questions, and voting.

At the meeting two more Home Workers were 'recognised'. Firstly Doug McNaught on the basis of a

Secondly Grant and Verna O'Donnell who were recognised a couple of years ago but without funding from the Home Workers Fund. Bruce Buckley spoke briefly on Campbelltown CCC's behalf – requesting the O'Donnells now be helped from the undesignated funds. Treasurers have recommended this be the case, and the meeting agreed.

He has since returned safely and has assembled a presentation about his experiences, illustrated with photos in PowerPoint. Giving Thanks to God for 100 years

Waitara Gospel Chapel

It was a happy and unusual Sunday Morning Service on May 30th at Waitara Gospel Chapel. The assembly which worships there marked 100 years of continuous ministry in the same physical location.

A lot of work had been done in previous weeks to re-discover the history of the building and of the ministry of the assembly over those years, but not a lot of advertising was undertaken. Nevertheless, word got around; the local paper sent a reporter and photographer early in the week and, on the day, the usual congregation virtually doubled to about 85 people. All the visitors had been in the Chapel before at some significant time in their past, a baptism, a wedding, and the like. So there was much to catch-up on with fellow believers.

Roger Weir put together a tight 55 minute 'history' program that enabled us to both praise God and be reminded of the highlights of the past 100 years. After the opening prayer and hymn (Praise my soul the King of Heaven) Roger spoke of things prior to 1910 and of Mr Francis Kemp's decision to buy the land and build the first Waitara Gospel Hall.



We then were fascinated as Mrs Cecily Carson shared her memories of youth meetings in the 30s and 40s and her marriage to Tom in this Hall. After this Pat and Ray Stanton spoke about how they came along to the assembly as young people, and of the people who turned their lives towards God.

Richard Saxby gave an overview of all the missionaries who had been commended from this assembly to the Lord's work overseas or with indigenous people in Australia.


The building changes from 1959 to 1966 were covered by Roger with the aid of old photos on PowerPoint.

Next, a relatively new member of the assembly, Mrs Olivia Yoon, told of why she and her family came and stayed in our fellowship. Colin Winrow reminded us that there were many more people who could have been mentioned and only God knows the full story of their service.

In conclusion, Frank Barnes led us in a prayer of thanksgiving and we sang "In Christ alone my hope".

Then, the speaker, whowas Martin Watkins, a previous elder at WGC, now at WPHCC, gave a challenging message from

Ephesians ch 2. After which we

Waitara Assembly - a brief history

Waitara Gospel Chapel (WGC) began its existence as a wooden building (Waitara Gospel Hall) at its current location on Edgeworth David Avenue just over 100 years ago. In fact the first worship service and Lord's Supper were held there on 29th May 1910, see page 11.

Preparing for the Centenary Thanksgiving Service caused us to go looking for facts about our assembly's history. This has not been easy but has proved "interesting". No one alive remembers those early days, but things are gradually being uncovered to fill some of the 'gaps' in current research and to tie up some 'loose ends'. We may produce a history booklet and DVD (of photos) later in the year, but here are some of the key facts that were shared with the con-

gregation on the 30th May.

Mr Francis Kemp, born 1857 in England, sailed to Australia in 1881. He married Agnes Milne in New Zealand in 1885 but they made their home in Sydney. Mr Kemp started his own business in pharmaceutical supplies.


A Christian from his youth, in belief and practice, Mr Kemp met Dr Northcote Deck at Burwood and became impressed by the

Open Brethren. He moved his family to Wahroonga in 1900 and Christian meetings were started in their home.

It was Mr Kemp who bought the land in Edgeworth David Avenue (then part of Junction Road) on which WGC now sits. In 1910 he then built, at his own expense, the original wooden Gospel Hall. The area was mainly bushland and orchards, no street lighting and very few cars. That original Gospel Hall was enhanced in 1935 by adding a front lobby and toilets.

In those early days the Kemp family largely conducted the Sunday School – by that time they had four daughters. God greatly blessed the work and soon there was a growing Assembly.

Banners inside the Hall declared "We preach Christ crucified", "Behold the Lamb of God", and "Behold I come quickly". These summarise the message of the Gospel the assembly preached. Later one of the elders, Mr J.C. Morton, reported that Mr Kemp said 'This is a place where Christians can meet



simply, in the name of the Lord, where all who belong to Him will be welcomed'.

Soon three meetings were held every Sunday in the Hall – the Lord's Supper at 11 a.m., Sunday School at 3 p.m. and a Gospel Meeting at 7 p.m., before which an Open Air meeting was held at 6 p.m. in the surrounding streets of Waitara and Hornsby.

Of course there was no electricity supply – the hall was originally lit by gas lamps. People walked to the Hall from Wahroonga and Waitara stations, or their homes, via bush tracks and across vacant land. In the evening, >14

especially in winter, they had to carry hurricane lamps (run on kerosene) to light the paths.

In the 1930s an Open-Air Sunday School was started on vacant land in Junction Road, Wahroonga, which led to a small hall being erected. This Sunday School continued until the 1960s.

Miss Kemp (as she was known to most people), Mr Kemp's third daughter and a longstanding member of the assembly, inherited ownership of the building from her father when he died in 1940 at the age of 83.

In the mid 1950s Miss Kemp donated the building and land to the assembly and it was placed in the hands of a group of Trustees, who were elders. Some years later it was decided to place the trusteeship with Steward's Foundation, which is still the arrangement today.

After the Second World War, more Sunday School outreach programs

were started - one in Asquith in the Scout's Hall, one in Turramurra in a house garage and one in West Pennant Hills on someone's back veranda. These efforts eventually grew into new assemblies – one is now West Pennant Hills Community Church, built in 1952; and another was Asquith Gospel Chapel, in 1955 in a hired hall until the chapel was erected in 1956/57. Partly from the Sunday School in Turramurra another assembly was started in St Ives in 1962. It was known as Kuringai Gospel Chapel, and has since evolved into St Ives Community Church, with the inclusion of a thriving assembly from Belrose.

In the early 1960s a large hall and new kitchen, all built in brick, were added to the back of the Waitara Gospel Hall. This project (taking several years) was efficiently managed by Mr Baines, using tradesmen sub-contractors and, where possible, other work was done by assembly members volunteering time and muscle. Due to faithful and generous giving there was no need to borrow money as the work proceeded.

Sunday School and Youth groups were well attended through the 1940s, 50s, 60s and 70s. During the early 1950s a boy's club was held for teenage boys. A monthly youth meeting NDYR >>

(Northern Districts Youth Rally) was held on a Saturday night from about 1955 and was very popular with young people from Sydney's northern region. This continued until the late 1960s. During the 1960s Boys and Girls Rallies on Friday nights reached many children.

In 1964, work began on rebuilding the main Gospel Hall. It was done in a 'novel' way, surrounding the old hall, whose timbers were reused where possible. This project was also coordinated by Mr Baines, using similar labour arrangements, and again without borrowing money. The church activities ran in the rear hall during this period.

The new place of worship, renamed Waitara Gospel Chapel, was officially opened on 5th March 1966.

An after-church 'Coffee Shop' proved very popular during the late 60s and early 70s. The chapel was packed with young people from the district, enjoying local bands. An after-school children's activity 'Friday Club' in the 70s and 80s attracted many from the area. In the 90s this was replaced by a Thursday afternoon 'Kid's Club' that brought young and older members together to reach out to children with God's love.

Since 2001, major changes have come to Waitara when the high-rise, highdensity, housing developments began. As the new buildings were populated, a 'mission field' arrived from many countries. We started 'Speak English' (or ESL) classes which are held in the rear hall on Monday morning during school terms. These attract new local people nearly every week. Some have joined us at Sunday worship. Some also join in our Bible Studies during the week.

On May 30th, we recognised and gave thanks for God's blessing and guidance over the 100 years. The challenge now for this church is do we consider that God's best blessings have all been in the past, or will we continue to reach out to the new residents with the Gospel message?

We are currently having discussions with Developers about the possibility of swapping what we have for a new chapel on the ground floor of a new apartment block, built where our chapel and two adjacent houses sit at the moment. There are significant issues to be resolved before a satisfactory agreement is reached. Meanwhile, we have the right (100 years worth!) to remain as we are, if we wish. Please pray that we will have wisdom from God – to move on in His timing, bringing glory and honour to Him in all that the assembly does.

Footnote: A major part of the Waitara Assembly's ministry, from its first year, has been to commend, support and pray for missionaries. Some details were covered by Mr Richard Saxby at the Thanksgiving Service but the full story would take many pages to tell. Sadly it couldn't be included here. — Ed.

Update from Grant & Verna O'Donnell by Grant O'Donnell

Thank you for the opportunity to share with you all through this magazine. We trust this article will give you a bigger picture of the ministry Verna and I are involved in with your support. Our sincere thanks to all who are praying for us – it is much appreciated!

We have a wonderful church family at Campbelltown, where we've been for twelve years. There are some incredible people there who have encouraged and enabled us in our growth as a family and as ministers of the gospel, especially in the absence of our own families (Verna's are all overseas, and mine are all up in the Promised Land – Queensland!).

We are very grateful for their friendship and fellowship over these many years. A large part of that support has indeed included financial provision during my time at SMBC, through to my most recently-completed course, Certificate IV in Christian Chaplaincy & Pastoral Care.

One of the reasons I recently undertook the course in pastoral care was to become better equipped for chaplaincy work. I had already done a Sports Chaplaincy course last year, which was very interesting, and I was able to get some hands-on experience at the World Masters Games here in Sydney last October.

Another part of this ministry has been at Campbelltown hospital, specifically in the Oncology Unit. This has allowed for many meaningful conversations with patients and their families. It's been a real insight getting to know how people are dealing with the effects of living with cancer, often providing me with a small window for sharing about the greatness of our God.

Over the past few years I've been teaching Scripture at three of our local primary schools. Having worked at Teen Ranch (a youth camp in this area) for a number of years prior, I find Scripture classes have a similar mission: getting the gospel out to school children. It's quite a challenge, as many of you would know, but also a ministry that brings great joy and satisfaction.

Speaking engagements take me to other congregations on occasion, and I do really enjoy visiting and sharing the word with fellow believers in this way. This has also been a means to get to know people in various assemblies in the Sydney area.

At present, I am still looking for more opportunities in chaplaincy work, if the Lord sees fit to use me in this way. I would again appreciate your prayers pertaining to this.

Verna ministers at our church in a variety of ways. Because we still have a pre-schooler (Rory, our 4-year-old), she has been involved in helping to run the playgroup, where a number of mums come along from the community. It has been a great connection to our church neighbourhood, and we continue to pray that conversations and relationships will testify to the power of God to change lives. >18

The music ministry is also one of Verna's passions. There is a fantastic group of musicians involved with her, and it's been very exciting to see their growth both musically and spiritually. It's an area of ministry that can take a lot of time and effort, but can be such a joy as well – especially with such a willing and talented team.

Verna is also participating in a mums' prayer group from our children's school who meet and pray regularly for the school community; in particular, for opportunities to reach out to the many non-churched families. We do pray that we might more boldly pursue this avenue of evangelism.

Our eldest son Hudson is in year 5, and our daughter Kelsey is in year 2; both are doing well at school and are learning plenty about Christian living. They both have had a number of situations over the past few months where they have had to translate what they 'know' about their faith, to how they can live it out within the family and on the school playground. Sometimes it can be hard to watch them struggle, but when they've been able make decisions for themselves based on what God wants them to do, that's when we can see how their faith is becoming their own.

Recently we had mentioned the need for a bit of a break; no sooner had we asked for this in prayer when Verna's family in Canada was able to arrange a trip for us. We leave on 28th June and will be away for 5 weeks.

Cardiff Heights



Dawn Goodfellow – Gospel Singer

George Galieh recently wrote to various assemblies mentioning that he and Rita are frequently asked to recommend the ministries of Christian performers to various churches for special outreach events. In this context, a friend of theirs, Dawn Goodfellow came to mind.

George said, in part, "Communicator and songstress, Dawn combines her talents in an inspirational program of songs together with a PowerPoint presentation. She has released eight solo albums over the years, the latest being *Watch the Lamb*. Her programs are highly recommended for such outreaches as seniors' functions, women's conventions/retreats; coffee/dinner evenings; special Church services and at retirement villages."

[Given this recommendation, we contacted Dawn for a fuller resumé which is printed below... Ed]

Dawn first began her singing career with the Christian Broadcasting Association in Sydney, Australia. She was seventeen, and as a nurse she would take time off, and with her guitar, back herself musically for the programme then put to air.

She became well known all over Australia through the Sunshine Hour, CBA's most popular programme during that time.

As a teenager Dawn sang for many special people. Dr. Oswald Smith, the founder of the People's Church in Toronto, Canada, and Bishop David Shepherd, the famous English



cricketer, during his visit to Australia to talk to teens. It was during this time that she completed her two certificates in nursing.

Pastor Richard Wurmbrand of the Voice of the Martyrs said of Dawn when she sang for several of his meetings here in Australia: "What a delightful girl our singer is. I have travelled the world and heard the best voices. She is the very first singer I ever saw who disappeared and let you see Jesus".

During the seventies, Dawn was on the singing team for special programs promoting the Billy Graham Crusade in shopping centres, schools and colleges.

Since then Dawn has toured India and Sri Lanka for 'Youth for Christ', and Singapore – working in most denominations with Canon James Wong and Rev David Wee.

One of her passions in ministry is the prisons. When in Singapore, she always visits Changi prison and sings for the inmates, also in the drug rehabilitation centre. Dawn has taught > 26



music in Sydney Prisons for many years and so is quite at ease there.

Another highlight in Singapore was being the guest singer for the Methodist Festival of Missions. Some of the speakers were Dr. Hudson Taylor III and Dr. Paul Kauffman.

Dawn has toured Africa singing for Victory Ministries in Zambia and the Pan-Africa Christian Women's Alliance Conference in Malawi. She has also returned to Africa to sing for Prison Fellowship International, presenting concerts to raise money for soap for prisoners.

In India, Dawn spent many hours singing for the patients in the Leprosy Hospital in Karagiri, and conducted a concert for the staff in the Dr. Ida Scudder Christian Medical College Hospital Vellore. She also spent time singing in a Leper village in Chennai.

In 2007, Dawn graduated with a Diploma in Education (Music Edu.) at Monash University, Melbourne, sponsored by the Corrective Services Department.

In March 2009, Dawn was invited to sing at a Christian Jewish Conference in Zavelstein in Germany and the Evangelical Freechurch in Schluchtern. Money was raised from selling her CD's for an orphanage in Jerusalem and work amongst street kids in Germany.

It is her deepest desire that Christ be uplifted through her music and precious lives be renewed and restored into the fullness of His amazing love. As George Galieh mentioned, Dawn is available to perform at a range of functions including church services, dinners, women's meetings or concerts. Please contact her to discuss how she could help you or your church's ministry.

She has released eight solo albums over the years. The latest is "Watch the Lamb" which has 18 tracks.

In Loving Memory of



Heather Eva Peterson 22nd June 1923 -12th March 2010 and William Alfred Peterson 'Bill'

17th February 1924 - 1st April 2010



The following is a summary of the lives of Dr William Peterson and his wife Heather. They had retired to Gerringong NSW about six years ago. For the past three years brother Bill was cared for in a Nursing home at Kiama close to Gerringong. Unhappily, earlier this year Heather had a stroke and after two weeks was called Home to the Lord, followed by her husband Bill exactly three weeks later.

Dr Peterson, affectionately know as 'Bill" to whom all of God's people are heavily indebted, was widely known in Australia and other countries for his ministry and outreach in the Gospel, especially to the Jewish people. He was truly a great man of God being an example to all believers and having the following qualities; deep devotion to His Lord, consistent faithfulness to biblical doctrines, personal discipline in his own life, dedication in his ministry of writing, teaching, and preaching, selfless duty towards the saints of God and showing the Lord's love for lost souls in many countries.

Bills' father was a professional boxer and trained Bill in the rudiments of that 'art'. All that direction in life changed when he was saved in his early teens. At the age of 17 years he was preaching the gospel. Older believers wondered at his youthfulness as the Spirit of God used the preaching to awaken souls.

Bill studied at the Sydney Technical College and graduated as an Industrial Chemist and Chemical Engineer. He continued in his profession for a few years and married Heather Eva Woods in 1947 – commencing a life together of devoted service to the Lord. They had just celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary before their deaths. In the early days of their marriage, they were in fellowship with the Glanton brethren in Petersham, and later commenced an outreach Sunday School in the Fairfield area with over a hundred children.

In 1950 they left for Bathurst where Bill took up the position of Chief Chemist of Gordon Edgell Canning Company.

They moved back to Sydney in 1952 with their two children Robert and Carole, and fellowshiped at Eastwood Gospel Hall. Continuing to work as a chemist, Bill was convinced that the Lord wanted him for other work and so after much prayer and soul search->28



ing Bill and Heather were commended by Eastwood assembly for full time ministry among Assemblies in 1962. Subsequently he was invited to minister the Word in all States of Australia and further afield in Europe, Singapore, Middle East and Bible lands.

For some time Bill was greatly concerned about the Jewish people (Romans 10v1) and after his first trip to Israel his love for them deepened. In 1972 his commendation was extended to include Jewish people. He visited them in their homes, became good friends with the Rabbis and was invited to their various celebrations and Synagogues. The Lord blessed the work, and Bill saw a small number of Jewish people come to the Lord. These folk encouraged him to visit Israel, and in 1976 he commenced Bible Lands Tours with Christians from Australia, New Zealand, and Singapore. These tours continued until 1997, and extended to other Middle East countries. In 1992 his commendation was extended to include "Focus on Bible Lands" (originally called "Jewish Outreach") and the "Spotlight on Israel " magazine was commenced, and then radio broadcasting, which was received in many countries through Trans World Radio.

He also wrote some books: 'The Dignity of Belonging to Christ' (1969), and being interested in prophecy - 'In the Days to come' (1966) and 'Watching for the morning' (1990) were much appreciated. He also wrote many small booklets to assist with requests coming from listeners to the radio broadcasts.

During these years Bill also studied by correspondence and received awards

for Radio Broadcasting, literature and a Doctorate in Divinity for his thesis on the "Typology of Solomon's Temple". All who knew and loved him felt a great sense of loss when in 2007 he had to close the spiritually enriching and instructive area of magazine ministry.

Written by his own hand in red, inside the front cover of his Bible, were words that summarised his life's work ambition –

'AMPLIUS '- ONWARD Phil. 3v14 'I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.'

Bill's ministry was unique. His intonation of voice, and interpretation of scripture were peculiarly his own. He had only three objectives in life – the Lord's Glory, the welfare of fellow saints and the salvation of souls – all these occupied his whole life in this one grand direction.

Heather was a very dedicated wife and mother and, although Bill was away frequently, she was always there for the children. Later she travelled with Bill being quietly supportive in the work. Like Bill, she could say as the Psalmist in 116 v12-14. 'What shall I render unto the LORD for all His benefits toward me? I will take the cup of salvation, and call upon the name of the Lord. I will pay my vows unto the LORD now in the presence of all His people'.
