Jess will play an important role in Stewards as the first point off contact, and her role will cover a broad range of admin areas such as reception, accounts, marketing and policies.

Unfortunately, since we last compiled this bi-monthly column, there have been several major health issues which have afflicted people well known around our NSW assemblies, and beyond. They have all contributed to the content of this magazine in previous years, and I ask that we all remember them, and their families, fervently in prayer in the coming months.

We heard first of the failing health of brother George Galieh. He was in hospital for several weeks but is now at his home under palliative care. I understand he turned 90 this year.

Then, in early October, we heard that brother Doug McNaught (age 68) had a mild stroke which the hospital dealt with quickly. But tests showed he will need open heart surgery as soon as it's safe to do that! He is at home resting.

Then there is brother John North (head of AFCI) who has had surgery to remove some internal cancer tissue. I understand this went well, and he is back serving the Lord, although quite tired at times. He will of course need a

## Australia's 2019 National Prayer Breakfast

On Monday 14<sup>th</sup> October, for 6.30-9am they came to the Great Hall, Parliament House, Canberra. They came from all around Australia and beyond; from all the churches; from all walks of life. About 450 people gathered for the 30<sup>th</sup> National Prayer Breakfast on a chilly Canberra morning and enjoyed warm fellowship and inspiring messages.

Senator Amanda Stoker and Luke Gosling MP, joint chairs of the Parliamentary Christian Fellowship, kept the packed program moving along, with contributions from:—

Selina Walker (*Welcome to Country*), Milton Dick (*Grace*),

Chelsea Newman (*Prayer for our leaders*),

Andrew Noack (*Prayer for our nation*), Michael Gladwin (*Prayer for our youth and education*),

Mel Hickson (Prayer for the marginalised),

Zed Seselja (The Lord's Prayer),

Divine Clement and Worship Band, Trinity Christian School, Canberra (*The goodness of God*),

the Governor General, the Hon David Hurley (*Prayer Breakfast Address - see page 8*),

the Prime Minister, Hon Scott Morrison (Address, and book launch of 'Amen'),

the Leader of the Opposition, the Hon Anthony Albanese (*Vote of Thanks*).

In launching the book 'Amen, A History of Prayers in Parliament', the

Prime Minister said that he certainly felt at home in a gathering of people who (like himself) believed in miracles and were people of prayer, which he believes to be a good way to start each day. He said 'Prayer is important as it reminds us of our humility, our vulnerability, our human frailty.'

### A Prayer for Australia

'Our most gracious and holy God, we own Your Name but we have done so much through our selfishness and neglect of Your Word, and our failure to love You with all our heart, mind, soul and strength, and our neighbour as ourselves, that our witness before the world is so often weak and unconvincing. Give us first humility of heart, to see ourselves as You see us, and drive us to You to seek forgiveness, and then to seek Your blessings on a people who love You and seek to walk in Your ways.

'Lord, we repent and humbly pray for forgiveness that we have not put You first. We repent and ask forgiveness that we have not put building Your house first, which includes building up Your people who are the living temple You dwell in. We ask that You would help us not to be selfish and self-centred. We want to honour You Lord and we want You to take pleasure in our houses of worship and our hearts of worship.

'We acknowledge that You are the Lord of the universe; that You are the One who provides the rain to water the Earth so crops, livestock and we ourselves can flourish. We ask that in Your mercy You would send the rain. We pray for physical rain and the spiritual rain of revival to flow through our nation.

'We thank You Lord for past revivals and we pray that the latter rain would be even greater than the former rain, that You would bless the work of our hands, especially the farmers on the land, and give us peace. We thank You for renewal of our land and renewal of our faith.'

## The Governor General: Leading By Example

It has long been known that General David Hurley is a softly spoken, humble and unassuming man of the people. Christians have known, too, that he is a person of faith who is not afraid to declare that faith. Whether he is sparring with Aboriginal youths at the gym in Redfern or addressing a large gathering of Christians, General Hurley is right at home.

He was certainly right at home at the 30<sup>th</sup> National Prayer Breakfast as he shared something of his own spiritual journey and gave us encouragement as we live out our faith in our spiritually needy land – all with gentle humour and Biblical application.

In earlier life David Hurley had belonged to other Christian traditions, but later he and his wife Linda settled into the Presbyterian Church, where in the Providence of God he was nurtured in the faith first by the Rev Dr Graham Miller of Hurstville, who pointed him to the sermons on Romans by Dr Martyn Lloyd-Jones, then by the Rev Dr David Mitchell, who planted the Presbyterian Church in Tuggeranong after retiring from a distinguished legal career. He referred to Presbyterians as being 'chosen frozen', though to me he seemed to be more like 'warm Reformed'.

More importantly, in asking at various times in life he has come to know that 'things don't just happen randomly' as he has pondered the question, 'Why do certain things happen?' For example, when invited to become Governor of New South

Wales and later, Governor General, he discussed these invitations with his wife and family. They prayed and committed these matters to the Lord: 'Into Your hands' in the spirit of Psalm 32.

General Hurley sees his present role as being the nation's Chief Carer in the context of engagement with people all over Australia and across the breadth of their interests.

During his military career, General Hurley spent a year studying in the USA. The school's assessment of the world situation was summarised in four words: Volatility; Uncertainty; Complexity; Ambiguity.

David Hurley met that with his own prescription: **Stability** (through faith in the unchanging God – Revelation 1.8); **Certainty** (assurance of salvation – Romans 8.28-30); **Simplicity** (simple faith – John 14.6); **Clarity** (the clear call of Jesus – Matthew 11.28-30).

The Governor General seeks to work according to Christ's clear warning: 'Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all.' – Mark 9.35. He is confident that God is 'working all things together for good ...' His final words: 'Into Your hands.'

Praise God for giving us such a man for such a time as this.

Hi Friends,

I've come up with a new slogan: "25 years of saying inappropriate things on campus." By inappropriate I mean unexpected, breaking with polite clichés and challenging thoughtless assumptions. Let me share with you my latest experience that occurred while coaching a Bible college student in practical evangelism skills.

I glanced up as Phillip arrived, and noticed he was hugging his backpack a little tighter this morning. "Are you ready?" I asked, "Jackie will take you out." Jackie is a new missionary with us and a beautiful, gentle soul. "I thought it would be best if I could do a role-play first if I'm going to lead the conversation," Phillip replied. I agreed, and Phillip led a practice discussion with me using Perspective Cards. I played a typical university student unconcerned about God because life is OK and Jesus doesn't seem relevant. Phillip, supported by Jackie, occasionally hesitated, listened respectfully and apologised if he offended me with his questions. As the conversation ended I said,"Phillip, I know you're supposed to ask me if I want to meet again but can I just say right now that this

was so boring that, although I like you, I wouldn't want to meet again." His eyes widened. Had anyone ever spoken to him like that before? I don't think I'd ever said that to someone before. "You need to add some spice to the conversation to make it interesting," I continued. "You don't want to bore people with the gospel. Now go and practice your opening line a few times with Jackie and then have a go in real life."

I met up with Jackie later that afternoon where she reported that they'd met a girl whose father and brother had walked away from the faith but now she was at university she is interested in exploring things further for herself. After her conversation with Phillip and Jackie, she was keen to meet again. My two reflections on this episode are:

- 1. Evangelism is easier in real life than in role plays. Real people are easier to find points of engagement with than actors;
- 2. Inappropriate statements are sometimes necessary to state a point in a way that will strike home. They're useful in training, but they're also useful in evangelism.

US Trip: Philip had just finished Year 7 (2014-15) when we last travelled to the US to catch up with our ministry partners in Indiana, Colorado and Arizona, and now he is finishing high school. It's been an intense time getting the movement at the University of Sydney re-established but we had hoped and prayed that we could travel this summer and we made tentative plans. We were just about to pay for tickets

### **CALENDARS**

A substantial part of the work over the past three months has been processing the calendar orders and establishing prison numbers. This is now complete and our order is with the printer. We have a concern for this year with prison numbers as a new prison is being built at Grafton for 1500 prisoners. The completion date is expected to be November this year. Unfortunately this means if it is completed on time prisoners will be transferred from many other prisons and our numbers of calendars for those prisons will not be correct. The cost to print 1500 calendars for Grafton with the uncertainty that exists and no expected increase in the overall prisoner numbers is not warranted.

### FINANCIAL ACCOUNTS

Our other focus has been finalisation of the annual accounts. It's evident that it hasn't been a good year financially although we are very pleased with the number using our courses and with the many who have made a commitment to be a follower of Jesus.

### **COURSES**

We have previously reported on our decision together with Qld to use the two smaller courses as free introductory courses this year. We have not seen any problems to date with this move and will continue it into 2020.

Freight costs and postage continue to rise and are having a major impact

on financing the work, but thankfully not on the spiritual aspect. This is in God's hands and we continue to see many deciding to be a follower of Jesus.

We expect another rise in postage charges in the New Year.

### STUDENTS

We've had a number of our students released from prison in recent months and are very pleased with the number who have requested to continue with their studies. We've had three who were deported on completion of their sentence. Two of them we've been able to link up with ECS offices overseas. The third we have often written about during his years of imprisonment. He is now back in his home country and has been reunited with family. He has also been offered an opportunity to work with Prison Fellowship amongst prisoners in his home country. He has regularly contacted his marker here, via Face Time. The marker was in the office recently when the call came through and we were all able to speak with this ex-prisoner. His face was just beaming and his expression of gratitude for our work more than makes it all worth while.

### **VOLUNTEER WANTED**

You might notice that we have recently advertised for more volunteers for the work. Initially we would like someone to take over the control of the calendars work, and the finances, but with a view to longer term involvement as Registrar in NSW.

## Sharing your story

Have you ever taken a photo of a beautiful landscape and later looked at that picture and thought, "What in the world was I taking a picture of?" or "Why did I take that picture?"

Sometimes our experiences of nature are so beautiful that we just have to take photographs because we want to share them and to remember them. However a photo rarely does justice to the beauty we saw because it is so hard to capture the 'experience'—the joy of the beauty, and the 'feeling' that the moment created just for you!

In a similar way, our words never really do justice to our experiences of God. It is very difficult to put into words how we experience God's peace in a moment of chaos; or the feeling of being used as a vessel of God's grace; or the experience of knowing that God has carried us through a tragic time in our lives.

Note however – though our photos cannot help another experience exactly what we experienced, we do keep taking photos!

In the same way, though our words cannot help another person experience exactly what we experienced, we keep telling our story—it's called 'giving our testimony' or 'being a witness'.

(1 John 5:11 "And this is the testimony: God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son." NIV).

Both the pictures and the words of our God-experiences may lead another person to want to experience God as we do. But also **we benefit** in the sharing of the pictures and the re-telling of our experiences. We are effectively re-living our experiences and the joy as well.

We each have a story — a testimony — to give. What's yours today?

Don't keep it to yourself; share your testimony. It will do somebody good! Maybe, many more than one person will be blessed!

Luke records in his gospel (chapter 10:1,2) '... the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them two by two ahead of Him to every town and place where he was about to go. He told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field.'

Jesus gave them several instructions on how to conduct themselves and concluded with the reassuring words in verse 16 "Whoever listens to you listens to me; whoever rejects you rejects me; but whoever rejects me rejects Him who sent me."

Later the scripture says (v17) The seventy-two returned with joy and said, "Lord, even the demons submit to us in your name".

  - someone to talk to when lonely or troubled.


### Ladies Auxiliary

This ambitious study seeks to recognise the influence of 'the public opening up of the word of Christ to the world', 'to tell the truth about his influence' on Australia's social and cultural history, and to show that evangelical Christianity continues to be as much a public ethic as a personal creed.

## 'Take all the people of war with you' Joshua 8:1 NKJV

The Word for Today

When you're under spiritual attack, you need to surround yourself with 'the people of war'. They are experienced in spiritual warfare and know how to deal with the enemy. They have proven strategies for victory and a tenacious faith that rises up and says, 'If God be for us, who can be against us?' (Romans 8:31 KJV) The truth is, the people of war are the people of the Word. They know how to take the sword of the spirit, which is the Word of God, and use it to defeat the enemy (see Ephesians 6:17). They're not hesitant about marching into the enemy's camp and taking back everything he has stolen from them (see 1 Samuel 30:8).

Anybody can stand with you in the good times, but when you find somebody who can stand with you in the bad times, treasure them and build a relationship with them. The Bible says, 'A brother is born for adversity.' (Proverbs 17:17 KJV) Did you get that? They're born for battle! They're not just strong in faith, they're strong in fight. And you won't necessarily find these people in pulpits and choir lofts; they blow no trumpets, wave no banners, and demand no applause. But they know how to boldly approach the throne of grace and claim the promises of God (see Hebrews 4:16).

After Joshua conquered Jericho, God said to him, 'Take all the people of war with you, and arise, go up to Ai. See, I have given into your hand the king... his people... his city, and his land.'

So if you are in a battle today, take 'the people of war with you.'

## History is linear, not circular

Author and theologian, Robert Farrar Capon, has written several books. In one he writes about Jesus' teaching concerning His return. Jesus wants people to be ready for His return in the future.

Capon reflects on a particular passage in the Bible and reminds us that history is linear not circular: "The course of the world and the course of God's action in it are like an arrow shot towards a target, not like a planet endlessly pursuing an unchanging orbital course."

History often *feels* circular. At the start of each year it feels like another

go around the circuit of life – it will all come around again. The news feels circular, same old same old, just another set of names involved. We can feel like there is no rush or pressure on any choice we make because they will also all come around again.

Capon's point is that this is **not** the case. There will be a time when the arrow hits the target and it will be too late. The choices you have made will be fixed, even eternally fixed.

There is an end point to all of our lives and to history, so be sure you are prepared for it.

### When to talk to someone about God?

In 1 Peter 3:15 it says 'But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the **hope** that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect.'

There is such an outcry for **hope** in our world today. Not something wishy washy...but a **hope** based on the unwavering truth of God's Word. A hope that is living and active. A **hope** powerful enough to transform, heal, and set the captives free.

Bev came to a gathering in the community centre. She was very prickly, angry and lonely. We talked for maybe 5 minutes. I did not say anything profound. I simply accepted her and told her God loves her. The following week Bev came again. Her words astonished me. She was quite emotional as she said, 'Last week I was going home to commit suicide. But because of what you said .. that God loves me .. I didn't go ahead with it. Thank you.' We had many conversations after that. Bev gave her life to Jesus and lived to serve him. She was transformed into a warm. generous and loving person.

Ellie was struggling with anorexia. She was a very private person. As we entered into a conversation, her inner turmoil became very apparent. I asked her if I could pray with her. She was happy for that. As we did, she became quite emotional and shared that she had gone through an abortion. The shame and guilt were robbing her of her life. I was able to share with her how Jesus gave his life for her and for her sin and shame. That He would forgive

her, wash her clean and set her free, if she was willing to confess to Him. Ellie responded to Christ's invitation. As we waited on the Lord, again deep tears raked through her body. I asked her what was happening, and she said 'Jesus has just given me a picture of my daughter with Him. He has forgiven me!" Her relief and gratitude were astounding.

There are many 'Bevs' and 'Ellies' in our world. People who are hiding their pain and grief and struggle. People whom God loves with a profound love. People He puts in our pathways, because He knows we have the answer for anyone who is in need of His transforming hope. Sometimes we let fear of rejection rob us of the opportunity God gives us through His Spirit, to speak life into the lives of those who are struggling. What amazing opportunities we miss out on, when we allow darkness to rob us of His Light. If Jesus through His Spirit brings people into our pathway, it is because we are invited to be part of the process to leading them to the Giver of HOPE. We are a part of His plan for their lives.

As we press into Jesus in our own lives, learning to listen for the Spirit's voice and are ready to give the reason for the **hope** that lives in us; a **hope** based on the Truth of Him, we will have the awesome privilege of witnessing God's amazing miracle of redemption at work in the lives of others!!! ## Three ideas for responding to angry people

## How to keep a lid on your temper when others lose theirs.

Anger is draining the joy and life out of many people nowadays.

We've all seen a 2-year-old throw a tantrum. We all know about road rage. But the volume of hostility in our culture (particulary in big cities) seems to be rising.

Employers worry that a fired employee might return with a gun and do something horrible.

Neighbours fear talking to the man next door about his dog's constant barking for fear of a violent reaction.

You don't dare use your horn to even gently honk at the person not paying attention when the light turns green because you never know what they might do. (How dare I interrupt the person's texting!)

Recently, I was on my way to an appointment, and for the better part of three blocks, I was driving at about 52km/h. Most residential streets in my area are 50km/h, not 60km/h, even though that's not typically what most drivers do. The driver behind me was riding my bumper so closely I couldn't see the car's headlights. I could, however, see his eyes, and he was fuming. I wasn't in a hurry, but apparently, he was, so I pulled over to the side of the road to let him pass. As he accelerated and roared past me, he yelled out his window with anger and swore at me. Seriously? Was that really necessary? What if I had one of my grandkids in the car?

So what can we do in angry times? Here are three ideas to try.

### 1. Don't take it personally

Sure, sometimes I do something stupid, and I might deserve a little rage because of a poor choice. Occasionally, it is personal, and somebody hates me and everything about me. But more often than not, it's truly not about me. Someone is having a bad day, and I just happen to be within shouting range.

One of the best ways to let a person's anger go is to simply not let it bother you because it's probably more their problem than yours. If you have done something wrong, own it. If you haven't, then don't get rattled, and move on.

## 2. Keep in mind that angry people are often hurt people

When I stop and realize that I don't know all that's happened in another person's life to lead them down an angry path, it gives me compassion.

What if the person I called an "Internet troll" is actually a lonely alcoholic who doesn't have a friend in the world?

Maybe the driver who yelled at me grew up in an abusive home. Maybe it was someone who's struggling to make ends meet, and was late for work. Maybe the anger was the result of a fight with their partner or spouse.

I don't know. I can't say. But if I pause and give the angry person the benefit of my compassion, perhaps I can change the course of their day.

I wish I had the ability to see into a person's soul and know the **why** behind the **what**. But what I can do is choose the path of peace and give others mercy when they vent on me.

### 3. Try to respond rather than react

A wise leader named Solomon once wrote, "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger" (Proverbs 15:1. NIV). There's something about a humble smile and a soft response to a harsh word that disarms people.

Perhaps by nature, when I'm pushed, I push back. When I'm yelled at, I yell back. But it truly is a relational marvel to see what happens when I respond with kindness rather than tit-for-tat.

With my words, I can escalate or deescalate a situation. No matter what has happened or why, I have incredible potential to impact the outcome by either being harsh or gentle in my response. I think that's why Solomon also said "The tongue has the power of life and death, and those who love it will eat its fruit." (Proverbs 18:21 NIV)

So, the next time someone "goes ballistic" at you ... stop. Breathe. Try not to react, and remember, there's probably something else going on deep in their soul, and maybe you can respond as a bit of a healer for those who yell at you.

"Blessed are the **peacemakers**, for they will be called children of God."

- Matthew 5:9 NIV

## **Adjusting your sights**

Jim, a close friend, went target shooting the other day. He doesn't hunt but he does love to go to the target range and shoot. When he showed me his target, he pointed out that the first couple of shots missed the mark because the sights needed to be adjusted. Once he made that adjustment, his shots were right on target. Sometimes in life we need to adjust our sights. Our eyes are drawn to things of this world-money, fame, power, beauty, baubles, glitz, and glamour—causing us to miss the mark. Sin is actually defined as missing the mark. When we miss the mark, our relationship with the Lord is hindered

because we've lost sight of God and His will. When we recognize that our sight needs to be adjusted and we refocus our eyes on God (Hebrews 12:1-2), our relationship with Him will be more on target. Our relationship with God may not be perfect, but as long as we continue to make the sight adjustments and maintain our spiritual disciplines, the relationship will grow, deepen, and flourish. Jim didn't become a marksman without practice. We won't grow our relationship with God without practice. Have you adjusted your sights lately?

Maybe we all should.






